476.1300, 476.1302, 476.1304, 476.1306, 476.1308, 476.1310, 476.1313, 509.520, 565.240, RSMo	SS SCS SB 72 Underlying Bill	Trent	<p>Creates the “Judicial Privacy Act,” which specifies that a judicial officer’s personal information cannot be posted or publicly displayed by a government agency.</p> <p>Specifies that personal identifying information must be provided in a confidential information filing sheet for pleadings, attachments, or exhibits filed with the court.</p> <p>Amends the offense of unlawful posting of certain information over the internet to create a D felony when the offense results in bodily harm or death to the person or his or her immediate family member.</p>
37.725, 43.539, 43.540, 67.145, 70.631, 170.310, 190.091, 193.265, 195.817, 307.018, 307.175, 491.075, 492.304, 547.500, 550.125, 556.021, 558.031, 566.151, 567.030, 569.010, 569.100, 570.010, 570.030, 575.205, 579.021, 579.022, 589.401, 589.403,	HCS HBs 1108 & 1181	Hicks	<p>Modifies various provisions related to public safety.</p> <p>Makes changes to the sex offender registry, including moving all offenses that are sexual in nature and committed against a minor to tier III of the registry.</p> <p>Creates the offenses of delivery of a controlled substance causing great bodily harm and the offense of delivery of a controlled substance causing death (HB 1181).</p> <p>Includes HB 677, related to disclosure by Office of Child Advocate when the request is made by a law enforcement agency as part of an investigation.</p> <p>Includes the HCS for HB 669, related to the Rap Back program.</p> <p>Includes HB 567, related to adding telecommunicator first responders to the definition of first responder.</p> <p>Specifies that no fee shall be collected for a certification of birth, death, or marriage if the request for certification is made by a prosecuting attorney, circuit attorney, or the Attorney General.</p> <p>Includes SB 464, requiring background checks for people involved with marijuana facilities.</p> <p>Includes HB 305, related to warrants for failure to appear or pay a fine on infractions issued for certain traffic citations.</p> <p>Includes HB 1228, related to search and rescue teams being able to use lights and sirens when en route to an emergency.</p> <p>Includes HB 454, related to raising the age of adult to 18 in relation to statements made by a child or vulnerable person.</p> <p>Allows the Missouri Office of Prosecution Services to create a conviction review unit to investigate claims of actual innocence (HB 1086 with changes).</p> <p>Includes HB 83, related to change of venue for capital cases. Includes language related to credit for time served and specifies that time begins being counted after the offense occurred, not after conviction.</p>

Includes HB 86 , related to tampering with electronic monitoring equipment. Adds HB 856 , related to the crime victims' compensation fund. Amends the Sunshine Law, allowing certain security measures implemented at schools to be closed records.
115.133 561.026	HB 248 with changes	Stinnett	Currently, a person on probation or parole for a felony conviction is not entitled to vote until he or she is discharged from probation or parole, as is a person confined under a sentence of imprisonment for any offense. This bill changes the provision so that a person convicted of a felony is not entitled to register or vote while confined.
208.247	Part of HB 719	Riley	Specifies that a person convicted under state or federal law of a felony offense involving possession, distribution, or use of a controlled substance will be exempt from the prohibition contained in 21 USC 862a(a) against eligibility for the supplemental nutrition assistance program for such conviction.
211.453	HB 1001	Hicks	Currently, in termination of parental rights cases, the court cannot require service in the case of a parent whose identity is unknown and cannot be ascertained or located. This bill repeals that provision from statute.
347.143	One section from HB 85	Veit	Adds to the reasons an LLC may be dissolved involuntarily: (1) When it is reasonably necessary for the protection of the rights or interests of the complaining members; (2) When the business of the LLC has been abandoned; (3) When the management of the LLC is deadlocked or subject to internal dissention; or (4) When those in control of the LLC have been found guilty of persistent and pervasive fraud; mismanagement, or abuse of authority.
431.204	HB 902	Hardwick	This bill creates provisions related to covenants not to compete between business entities and owners/former owners of the entity.
435.014, 435.300, 435.303, 435.306, 435.309, 435.312	HB 82	Veit	Establishes an alternative dispute resolution (ADR) process. The process is non-binding unless the parties agree in writing that it be binding. If the court has not referred a case to a non-binding ADR process and the parties themselves do not enter into a written agreement to resolve their differences using the process, the process the parties use will be considered settlement negotiations and will be subject to rules of confidentiality that generally apply to such negotiations.
455.010, 455.035, 455.513, 475.050, 476.055, 485.060, 487.110, 488.426,	Perfected HCS HB 994 with changes	Parker	Raises the age of an adult from at least 17 to at least 18 as used in Chapter 455. Modifies language relating to exemptions for individuals seeking appointment as a guardian or conservator. Excludes a grandparent seeking guardianship or conservatorship from the requirement to undergo a home assessment unless the home assessment is requested by another party to the proceeding (HB 1204). Repeals the sunset on the court automation fund. It also adds two municipal employees who work full time in a municipal division of the court to the court automation committee (HB 90). Modifies provisions related to court reporter salaries (HB 537).

If there is no evidence that a testator signed an electronic will and neither an electronic will nor a certified paper copy of the electronic will can be found after the testator's death, there will be a presumption that the testator revoked the electronic will even if no instrument or later will revoking the electronic will can be located. The provisions apply to the will of decedent who dies on or after August 28, 2023.</p> <p>Specifies that certain estate planning documents executed between April 6, 2020, and December 31, 2021, when there was a state of emergency because of Covid will be deemed to have satisfied the physical presence requirements specified in the bill.</p>
476.1025	HCS HB 371	Falkner	Allows a parent, spouse, child, or personal representative of a person who was convicted of a misdemeanor offense to file a motion with the court in which the person was convicted to have the record of the offense made confidential in any automated case management system if the person has been deceased at least six months.
494.430	HB 493 with minor change	Burger	Lowers the age a person may request to be excused from jury service from 75 years old to 70 years old.

552.020	HB 1082 with changes	Thompson	Requires the report on a pretrial examination ordered by a judge for an accused person who the judge has reasonable cause to believe lacks mental fitness to proceed to contain recommendations as to whether the accused, if found to lack mental fitness to proceed, should be committed to a suitable hospital for treatment or if treatment can be provided in a county jail or other detention facility.
559.125	HB 776 with changes	Cook	Specifies that, except in criminal proceedings, information and data obtained by a probation and parole officer shall be privileged information and shall not be receivable in a court.
570.030			Adds as a class E felony the offense of stealing a letter, postal card, package, bag, or other sealed article delivered, or left to be collect for shipment, by a common carrier or delivery service.
578.712	HB 405	McGaugh	Creates the offense of tampering with an elected county official, which is a class D felony, unless the violation results in bodily injury or death to the official or a member of the official's family, in which case it is a class B felony.
579.065, 579.068	HB 1176	Perkins	Removes from the offense of drug trafficking in the first degree when a person knowingly distributes, delivers, manufactures, produces, or attempts to distribute, deliver, manufacture, or produce more than 8 grams of a mixture or specified substance that has a cocaine base. Removes from the offense of drug trafficking in the second degree when a person knowingly possesses more than 8 grams of a mixture or specified substance that has a cocaine base.
650.058	SCS SBs 253, 146 & 446 with changes	Williams	Currently, only individuals exonerated by DNA evidence may receive restitution. This bill specifies that any person who was convicted and then later found to be actually innocent, either in a habeas corpus petition or a motion under section 547.031 may be paid restitution. Increases the maximum amount of restitution allowable to \$65,000 for each fiscal year.
