Dear Chair Murphy and Members of the Committee: My name is Christy Inskip. I was born and raised in Missouri, plan to raise my family here, and I support both HB 124 and HB 517. I used to work for a local public health department in another state providing technical assistance to local jurisdictions that wanted to adopt evidence-based tobacco prevention ordinances, including Tobacco 21, to protect the children in their communities from the predatory tactics of the Tobacco Industry to hook the next generation and sentence them to a lifetime of addiction. Our children have the right to grow up in a community where they can live healthy, prosperous lives free of addiction. Vaping has risen at an alarming rate in Missouri - over 91% among high school students from 2017-2019. More than 1 in 5 are vaping. My 13 and 15 year old nephews told me it seems like most of their classmates are vaping. My 13 year old nephew said that kids vape in class as a game to see how many times they can "hit" the vape without getting caught. Many of the youth who use nicotine products acquire a lifelong, debilitating, and deadly addiction. About 128,000 kids currently under age 18 in Missouri will die early from tobacco, contributing to what tobacco is costing Missourians every year - \$3.5 billion in health care costs, \$693 million in Medicaid costs, and \$7.1 billion in lost productivity, all related to tobacco. Due to the limitations and inadequacy of the federal Tobacco 21 law, not all tobacco retailers are checked for compliance with minimum legal sales age laws, and those that are checked are not checked every year. Therefore, many tobacco retailers in Missouri continue to sell addictive tobacco products to underage children, and 30 local jurisdictions sought to address this by adopting a Tobacco 21 ordinance, which allows them to hold tobacco retailers accountable who sell to underage children. However, these 30 jurisdictions tend to be in more urban areas, leaving children in more rural areas unprotected. A state Tobacco 21 law could hold all tobacco retailers accountable for breaking the law and stop them from selling deadly, addictive products to underage children across Missouri. While a state Tobacco 21 law is essential to protect our children, it is important that it does not preempt or take control away from local jurisdictions from adopting additional tobacco sales restrictions that will help them further protect the children in their communities from the predatory tactics of the Tobacco Industry. It is also important to simultaneously adopt tobacco retail licensing, which would provide license fees to fund implementation and enforcement of the Tobacco 21 and licensing programs and a penalty structure to hold law-breaking retailers accountable. Both HB 124 and HB 517 have elements of an effective policy, include tobacco retail licensing, and they would not preempt local jurisdictions from passing additional tobacco sales restrictions to protect their children.HB 124 and HB 517 would also update Missouri's outdated, confusing minimum legal sales age law of 18, which still requires posting of no sales under age 18 signage, even though federally the age is 21 and age 21 signs are required, further confusing retailers, and bring Missouri in line with the federal law and the 41 other states that have already passed Tobacco 21. HB 124 and HB 517 have the same language and could be combined. I strongly urge you to support the language in House Bills 124 / 517. Thank you for your

I attended the hearing this morning but had to leave before reconvening due to academic obligations. I am in support of both of these tobacco bills because they will finally align the state of Missouri's legislation with federal and local policies. When I was 17, I was part of a local movement in Joplin, MO (my hometown) to raise the age from 18 to 21. The reason I joined this movement in the first place was that I have personally witnessed the significant toll that vaping and e-cigarette usage has taken on my generation. Throughout high school, I saw peers start vaping as sophomores in high school because a senior (who was 18) handed them a device. I have seen these devices increase symptoms of anxiety and depression in my close friends. Also, as a current medical student, I have extensive concern over the ingredients in the vapes and their flavors, let alone combustible products. These ingredients are toxic and abrasive to the lungs and can cause no shortage of diseases. One thing that I wanted to address from the committee's questions is that increasing the age and ensuring that retailers ID their clients can provide very significant deterrents against usage. I have friends who ended up guitting because it was so much harder for them to find nicotine products, and they decided that it wasn't worth driving so far away or spending more money to get them. Decreasing access is even more important because it attempts to compensate for the years of targeted tobacco corporation marketing toward my generation. A generation that was supposed to be the first nicotine-free generation. I hope for these reasons that you will move this legislation forward so we can finally be in alignment with federal protocol and protect adolescents in our state from the impact of tobacco and nicotine products.

The identical bills are far more about unreasonably regulating a lawful product, with the ultimate long term goal of prohibition, than they are about Tobacco 21.
