1	AMEND Senate Substitute No. 2 for Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 727, Page 37,
2	Section 160.415, Line 295, by inserting after all of the said section and line the following:
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4	"160.518. 1. (1) For all school years ending before July 1, 2026, consistent with the
5	provisions contained in section 160.526, the state board of education shall develop, modify, and
6	revise, as necessary, a statewide assessment system that provides maximum flexibility for local
7	school districts to determine the degree to which students in the public schools of the state are
8	proficient in the knowledge, skills, and competencies adopted by such board pursuant to section
9	160.514. The statewide assessment system shall assess problem solving, analytical ability,
10	evaluation, creativity, and application ability in the different content areas and shall be performance-
11	based to identify what students know, as well as what they are able to do, and shall enable teachers
12	to evaluate actual academic performance. The statewide assessment system shall neither promote
13	nor prohibit rote memorization and shall not include existing versions of tests approved for use
14	pursuant to the provisions of section 160.257, nor enhanced versions of such tests. After the state
15	board of education adopts and implements academic performance standards as required under
16	section 161.855, the state board of education shall develop and adopt a standardized assessment
17	instrument under this section based on the academic performance standards adopted under section
18	161.855. The statewide assessment system shall measure, where appropriate by grade level, a
19	student's knowledge of academic subjects including, but not limited to, reading skills, writing skills,
20	mathematics skills, world and American history, forms of government, geography and science.
21	(2) (a) For the 2026-27 school year and all subsequent school years, the state board of
22	education shall select an available existing statewide assessment that satisfies the federal pupil
23	testing mandates in effect under Pub. L. 114-95, as amended, and any applicable modifications or
24	waivers approved under such federal law, for each school year.
25	(b) The assessments shall:
26	a. Be aligned to state standards;
27	b. Provide access to national norms;
28	c. Measure student growth; and
29	d. Assess student performance relative to grade level.

(c) Except as otherwise provided in this section or section 160.522, results from assessments
 created under this subsection shall be used only for the purpose of compliance with the requirements
 of such federal law and for no other purpose.

4 (d) As permitted by federal law and applicable waivers, the state board of education shall
5 ensure that standardized assessments are administered to the minimum extent practicable and reduce
6 instructional time to the minimum extent practicable while still appropriately and effectively
7 assessing the academic achievement of students.

8 [2.The statewide assessment system shall only permit the academic performance of students 9 in each school in the state to be tracked against prior academic performance in the same school.

The state board of education shall suggest, but not mandate, criteria for a school to 11 demonstrate that its students learn the knowledge, skills and competencies at exemplary levels 12 worthy of imitation by students in other schools in the state and nation. Exemplary levels shall be 13 measured by the statewide assessment system developed pursuant to subsection 1 of this section, or 14 until said statewide assessment system is available, by indicators approved for such use by the state 15 board of education. The provisions of other law to the contrary notwithstanding, the commissioner of education may, upon request of the school district, present a plan for the waiver of rules and 16 17 regulations to any such school, to be known as "Outstanding Schools Waivers", consistent with the

18 provisions of subsection 4 of this section.

4.For any school that meets the criteria established by the state board of education for three 20 successive school years pursuant to the provisions of subsection 3 of this section, by August first 21 following the third such school year, the commissioner of education shall present a plan to the 22 superintendent of the school district in which such school is located for the waiver of ru-les and 23 regulations to promote flexibility in the operations of the school and to enhance and encourage 24 efficiency in the delivery of instructional services. The provisions of other law to the contrary notwithstanding, the plan presented to the superintendent shall provide a summary waiver, with no 25 conditions, for the pupil testing requirements pursuant to section 160.257, in the school. Further, the 26 provisions of other law to the contrary notwithstanding, the plan shall detail a means for the waiver 27 28 of requirements otherwise imposed on the school related to the authority of the state board of 29 education to classify school districts pursuant to subdivision (9) of section 161.092 and such other 30 rules and regulations as determined by the commissioner of education, excepting such waivers shall 31 be confined to the school and not other schools in the district unless such other schools meet the 32 criteria established by the state board of education consistent with subsection 3 of this section and 33 the waivers shall not include the requirements contained in this section and section 160.514. Any

34 waiver provided to any school as outlined in this subsection shall be void on June thirtieth of any

35 school year in which the school fails to meet the criteria established by the state board of education

36 consistent with subsection 3 of this section.

5.The score on any assessment test developed pursuant to this section or this chapter of any
 student for whom English is a second language shall not be counted until such time as such student

1	has been educated for three full school years in a school in this state, or in any other state, in which
2	English is the primary language.]
3	2. (1) For the 2026-27 school year and all subsequent school years, local school districts
4	and charter schools shall develop or adopt curriculum-embedded measures of student learning that
5	are authentic and relevant to a student's learning and experiences. Such measures may include
6	portfolios, performance-based assessments, and projects with public demonstrations.
7	(2) School districts and charter schools shall create local measures of student learning that
8	are:
9	(a) Authentic to student discipline-specific learning, experience, and the demonstration of
10	performance-based learning;
11	(b) Anchored in challenging and relevant curricula and designed to enhance student
12	involvement through engaging tasks and opportunities for students to document their learning;
13	(c) Evaluated and graded in a manner that provides the student with meaningful feedback
14	that can be used for academic improvement;
15	(d) Developed by teachers in consultation with school administrators, students, parents, and
16	the community; and
17	(e) Available for demonstration and community inspection.
18	(3) Local assessments and assessment systems shall be created in conjunction with teachers,
19	administrators, students, parents, and the community to reflect a complete picture of student
20	learning and shall also be reflective of statewide academic standards. School districts and charter
21	schools are encouraged to support communities of practice and provide the time and resources
22	necessary to create such assessments.
23	(4) School districts and charter schools shall create multiple school quality indicators
24	aligned to core areas of school quality and function and appropriate measures for each indicator.
25	(5) Local assessments and school quality indicators may be submitted to the department for
26	review and comment. The department shall, by rule, establish a process for such review and
27	comment. The department may support local development of curriculum-embedded assessments by
28	developing model units with embedded assessments, which school districts and charter schools may
29	adopt or adapt to develop their own assessments. The department may also identify and catalog
30	high-quality curricula that include embedded assessments.
31	(6) Any local assessment or assessment system or local school quality indicator submitted to
32	the department may be used by any school district or charter school and results may be added to the
33	school report card along with any technical comment from the department's review.
34	[6.] 3. The state board of education shall identify or, if necessary, establish one or more
35	developmentally appropriate alternate assessments for students who receive special educational
36	services, as that term is defined pursuant to section 162.675. In the development of such alternate
37	assessments, the state board shall establish an advisory panel consisting of a majority of active
38	special education teachers residing in Missouri and other education professionals as appropriate to
39	research available assessment options. The advisory panel shall attempt to identify preexisting

developmentally appropriate alternate assessments but shall, if necessary, develop alternate 1 2 assessments and recommend one or more alternate assessments for adoption by the state board. The 3 state board shall consider the recommendations of the advisory council in establishing such alternate 4 assessment or assessments. Any student who receives special educational services, as that term is 5 defined pursuant to section 162.675, shall be assessed by an alternate assessment established 6 pursuant to this subsection upon a determination by the student's individualized education program 7 team that such alternate assessment is more appropriate to assess the student's knowledge, skills and 8 competencies than the assessment developed pursuant to subsection 1 of this section. The alternate 9 assessment shall evaluate the student's independent living skills, which include how effectively the 10 student addresses common life demands and how well the student meets standards for personal 11 independence expected for someone in the student's age group, sociocultural background, and

12 community setting.

[7.] <u>4.</u> The state board of education shall also develop recommendations regarding alternate
 assessments for any military dependent who relocates to Missouri after the commencement of a
 school term, in order to accommodate such student while ensuring that he or she is proficient in the
 knowledge, skills, and competencies adopted under section 160.514.

A district that has not 19 obtained accreditation under this subdivision shall not be considered unaccredited or provisionally accredited for any purpose of law; 20 21 (10) Make an annual report on or before the first Wednesday after the first day of January to 22 the general assembly or, when it is not in session, to the governor for publication and transmission to 23 the general assembly. The report shall be for the last preceding school year, and shall include: 24 (a) A statement of the number of public schools in the state, the number of pupils attending 25 the schools, their sex, and the branches taught; (b) A statement of the number of teachers employed, their sex, their professional training, 26 27 and their average salary; 28 (c) A statement of the receipts and disbursements of public school funds of every
- 29 description, their sources, and the purposes for which they were disbursed;
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- (d) Suggestions for the improvement of public schools; and
- (e) Any other information relative to the educational interests of the state that the law
 requires or the board deems important;
- (11) Make an annual report to the general assembly and the governor concerning
 coordination with other agencies and departments of government that support family literacy
 programs and other services which influence educational attainment of children of all ages;

 37 secondary education, on or before the thirty-first day of August of each year, reports containing
 38 information the board deems important and desires for publication;
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(13) Cause fifty copies of its annual report to be reserved for the use of each division of the
 state department of elementary and secondary education, and ten copies for preservation in the state
 library;

4 (14) Promulgate rules under which the board shall classify the public schools of the state 5 subject to the limitations of subdivision (9) of this section; provided that the appropriate scoring guides, instruments, and procedures used in determining the accreditation status of a district shall be 6 7 subject to a public meeting upon notice in a newspaper of general circulation in each of the three 8 most populous cities in the state and also a newspaper that is a certified minority business enterprise 9 or woman-owned business enterprise in each of the two most populous cities in the state, and notice 10 to each district board of education, each superintendent of a school district, and to the speaker of the 11 house of representatives, the president pro tem of the senate, and the members of the joint 12 committee on education, at least fourteen days in advance of the meeting, which shall be conducted 13 by the department of elementary and secondary education not less than ninety days prior to their application in accreditation, with all comments received to be reported to the state board of 14 15 education: 16 (15) Have other powers and duties prescribed by law."; and 17
