FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of Administration** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note.

Oversight notes, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL):

“In the last five years, 19 states have enacted legislation or passed resolutions to provide for year-round daylight saving time, if Congress were to allow such a change, and in some cases, if surrounding states enact the same legislation. Because federal law does not currently allow full-time DST, Congress would have to act before states could adopt changes. The 19 states are:

- *Colorado, Kentucky (resolution) (2022)*
- *Alabama, Georgia, Minnesota, Mississippi and Montana (2021).*
- *Idaho, Louisiana, Ohio (resolution), South Carolina, Utah and Wyoming (2020).*
- *Delaware, Maine, Oregon, Tennessee and Washington (2019).*
- *Florida (2018; California voters also authorized such a change that year, but legislative action is pending).”*

Two states – Arizona and Hawaii – and the U.S. Territories of the American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands observe permanent standard time.”

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

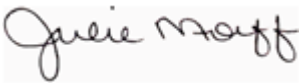
FISCAL DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation appears to have no direct fiscal impact.

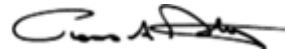
This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
