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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

§§320.111, 320.116 and 320.147 – Provisions governing fireworks

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety (DPS)** – **Division of Fire Safety (DFS)** state the DFS took the average revenues over the past three fiscal years and figured the 80/20 percent split. This would cause a decrease in revenues to the Firefighter Training Fund of approximately \$32,924 annually but an increase to the Fire Safe Cigarette fund of the same amount.

Oversight has no information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will present the fiscal impact of this proposal as provided by DPS-DFS. Oversight notes the decrease in revenues to one fund are offset by the increase in revenue to the other fund, so the net fiscal impact is \$0.

Officials from the **Department of Natural Resources**, the **DPS - Missouri Highway Patrol**, the **Missouri Department of Transportation** and the **City of Kansas City** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note.

Rule Promulgation

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** assume this proposal is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact beyond its current appropriation.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** note many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$5,000. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with its core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Oversight only reflects the responses received from state agencies and political subdivisions; however, other cities, various county officials, and fire protection districts were requested to respond to this proposed legislation but did not. A listing of political subdivisions included in the Missouri Legislative Information System (MOLIS) database is available upon request.

FISCAL IMPACT – Small Business

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation provides that eighty percent of all fees collected for permits issued are to be deposited into the fire education fund and twenty percent is to be deposited into the cigarette fire safety standard and firefighter protection act fund. (§320.111)

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This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
