#### AN ACT

To repeal sections 135.341, 136.055, 190.142, 210.109, 210.201, 210.211, 210.221, 210.252, 210.275, 210.560, 210.841, 210.1505, 211.038, 211.221, 211.326, 302.178, 302.181, 337.618, 452.375, 452.705, 452.730, 452.885, 455.010, 455.035, 455.513, 487.110, 487.200, 491.075, 491.641, 492.304, 566.151, 567.030, and 590.050, RSMo, and section 56.265 as enacted by senate bill no. 672, ninety-seventh general assembly, second regular session, and section 56.265 as enacted by senate bill no. 275, ninetieth general assembly, first regular session, and to enact in lieu thereof one hundred six new sections relating to the protection of vulnerable persons, with penalty provisions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

  - 27.170. 1. There is hereby established the "Committee on Sex and Human Trafficking Training".
    - 2. The committee shall consist of the following members:
- 4 (1) A representative of the attorney general's office who is involved in the office's 5 anti-trafficking efforts appointed by the attorney general;
  - (2) A representative of the department of public safety with experience in human trafficking investigations appointed by the director of the department of public safety;
  - (3) A representative from a child advocacy center appointed by the director of a statewide nonprofit organization that advocates for the protection of children;
- 10 (4) A juvenile officer appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court of 11 Missouri;
  - (5) A representative from an agency providing victim services appointed by the director of the department of social services;
- (6) A representative from a child abuse medical resource center, as defined in 15 section 334.950, appointed by the director of the department of health and senior services; and 16
- 17 (7) The executive director of the Missouri office of prosecution services or his or 18 her designee.
- 3. The member who represents the attorney general's office shall serve as chair 20 of the committee.
  - 4. Members of the committee shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for actual expenses necessary to the performance of their official duties for the committee.
- 5. The committee shall annually evaluate, and establish guidelines for, the sex and human trafficking training, to be produced and distributed in a digital platform, 26 required under sections 56.265, 190.142, 198.082, 211.326, 337.618, and 590.050.
  - 6. Any board, department, or agency that regulates any profession for which sex and human trafficking training is required as described in subsection 5 of this section may provide such training. Funding for the training shall be subject to appropriations.

## 7. The provisions of this section shall become effective on January 1, 2025, and shall expire on December 31, 2029.

[56.265. 1. The county prosecuting attorney in any county, other than in a chartered county, shall receive an annual salary computed using the following schedule, when applicable. - 2. Two thousand dollars of the salary authorized in this section shall be payable to the prosecuting attorney only if the prosecuting attorney has completed at least twenty hours of classroom instruction each calendar year relating to the operations of the prosecuting attorney's office when approved by a professional association of the county prosecuting attorneys of Missouri unless exempted from the training by the professional association. The professional association approving the program shall provide a certificate of completion to each prosecuting attorney who completes the training program and shall send a list of certified prosecuting attorneys to the treasurer of each county. Expenses incurred for attending the training session may be reimbursed to the county prosecuting attorney in the same manner as other expenses as may be appropriated for that purpose.
- 3. As used in this section, the term "prosecuting attorney" includes the circuit attorney of any city not within a county.
- 4. The prosecuting attorney of any county which becomes a county of the first classification during a four-year term of office or a county which passed the proposition authorized by subsection 1 of section 56.363 shall not be required to devote full time to such office pursuant to section 56.067 until the beginning of the prosecuting attorney's next term of office or until the proposition otherwise becomes effective.

- 5. The provisions of section 56.066 shall not apply to full-time prosecutors who are compensated pursuant to subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section.]
  - 56.265. 1. The county prosecuting attorney in any county, other than in a chartered county, shall receive an annual salary computed using the following schedule, when applicable. The assessed valuation factor shall be the amount thereof as shown for the year immediately preceding the year for which the computation is done.

- 2. Two thousand dollars of the salary authorized in this section shall be payable to the prosecuting attorney only if the prosecuting attorney has completed:
- (1) At least twenty hours of classroom instruction each calendar year relating to the operations of the prosecuting attorney's office when approved by a professional association of the county prosecuting attorneys of Missouri unless exempted from the training by the professional association. The professional association approving the program shall provide a certificate of completion to each prosecuting attorney who completes the training program and shall send a list of certified prosecuting attorneys to the treasurer of each county. Expenses incurred for attending the training session may be reimbursed to the county prosecuting attorney in the same manner as other expenses as may be appropriated for that purpose; and
- (2) One hour of sex and human trafficking training each calendar year consistent with the guidelines established in section 21.170. The provisions of this

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- subdivision shall become effective on January 1, 2025, and shall expire on December 31, 34 2029.
- 3. As used in this section, the term "prosecuting attorney" includes the circuit attorney of any city not within a county. 36
- 4. The prosecuting attorney of any county which becomes a county of the first 38 classification during a four-year term of office or a county which passed the proposition authorized by section 56.363 shall not be required to devote full time to such office pursuant 40 to section 56.067 until the beginning of the prosecuting attorney's next term of office or until the proposition otherwise becomes effective.
- 42 5. The provisions of section 56.066 shall not apply to full-time prosecutors who are 43 compensated pursuant to subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section.
  - 135.341. 1. As used in this section, the following terms shall mean:
  - (1) "CASA", an entity which receives funding from the court-appointed special advocate fund established under section 476.777, including an association based in this state, affiliated with a national association, organized to provide support to entities receiving funding from the court-appointed special advocate fund;
  - "Child advocacy centers", the regional child assessment centers listed in subsection 2 of section 210.001, including an association based in this state, affiliated with a national association, and organized to provide support to entities listed in subsection 2 of section 210.001;
    - (3) "Contribution", the amount of donation to a qualified agency;
  - (4) "Crisis care center", entities contracted with this state which provide temporary care for children whose age ranges from birth through seventeen years of age whose parents or guardian are experiencing an unexpected and unstable or serious condition that requires immediate action resulting in short-term care, usually three to five continuous, uninterrupted days, for children who may be at risk for child abuse, neglect, or in an emergency situation;
    - (5) "Department", the department of revenue;
    - (6) "Director", the director of the department of revenue;
    - (7) "Qualified agency", CASA, child advocacy centers, or a crisis care center;
- (8) "Tax liability", the tax due under chapter 143 other than taxes withheld under 20 sections 143.191 to 143.265.
  - 2. For all tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2013, and ending on or before December 31, 2023, a tax credit may be claimed in an amount equal to up to fifty percent of a verified contribution to a qualified agency and shall be named the champion for children tax credit. For all tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2024, the amount of the tax credit claimed shall not exceed seventy percent of the amount of the verified contribution to a qualified agency. The minimum amount of any tax credit issued shall

- not be less than fifty dollars and shall be applied to taxes due under chapter 143, excluding sections 143.191 to 143.265. A contribution verification shall be issued to the taxpayer by the agency receiving the contribution. Such contribution verification shall include the taxpayer's name, Social Security number, amount of tax credit, amount of contribution, the name and address of the agency receiving the credit, and the date the contribution was made. The tax credit provided under this subsection shall be initially filed for the year in which the verified contribution is made.
  - 3. The cumulative amount of the tax credits redeemed shall not exceed one million dollars for all fiscal years ending on or before June 30, 2019[, and]; one million five hundred thousand dollars for all fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2019, and ending on or before June 30, 2024; and two million five hundred thousand dollars for all fiscal years beginning on or after July 1, 2024. The amount available shall be equally divided among the three qualified agencies: CASA, child advocacy centers, or crisis care centers, to be used towards tax credits issued. In the event tax credits claimed under one agency do not total the allocated amount for that agency, the unused portion for that agency will be made available to the remaining agencies equally. In the event the total amount of tax credits claimed for any one agency exceeds the amount available for that agency, the amount redeemed shall and will be apportioned equally to all eligible taxpayers claiming the credit under that agency.
  - 4. Prior to December thirty-first of each year, each qualified agency shall apply to the department of social services in order to verify their qualified agency status. Upon a determination that the agency is eligible to be a qualified agency, the department of social services shall provide a letter of eligibility to such agency. No later than February first of each year, the department of social services shall provide a list of qualified agencies to the department of revenue. All tax credit applications to claim the champion for children tax credit shall be filed between July first and April fifteenth of each fiscal year. A taxpayer shall apply for the champion for children tax credit by attaching a copy of the contribution verification provided by a qualified agency to such taxpayer's income tax return.
  - 5. Any amount of tax credit which exceeds the tax due or which is applied for and otherwise eligible for issuance but not issued shall not be refunded but may be carried over to any subsequent tax year, not to exceed a total of five years.
    - 6. Tax credits may not be assigned, transferred or sold.
  - 7. (1) In the event a credit denial, due to lack of available funds, causes a balance-due notice to be generated by the department of revenue, or any other redeeming agency, the taxpayer will not be held liable for any penalty or interest, provided the balance is paid, or approved payment arrangements have been made, within sixty days from the notice of denial.
  - (2) In the event the balance is not paid within sixty days from the notice of denial, the remaining balance shall be due and payable under the provisions of chapter 143.

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- 64 8. The department may promulgate such rules or regulations as are necessary to administer the provisions of this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined 65 66 in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if 67 applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the 68 powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the 69 effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2013, 71 72 shall be invalid and void.
  - 9. Pursuant to section 23.253, of the Missouri sunset act:
  - (1) The program authorized under this section shall be reauthorized as of [December 31, 2019,] August 28, 2024, and shall expire on December 31, [2025] 2030, unless reauthorized by the general assembly; and
  - (2) This section shall terminate on September first of the calendar year immediately following the calendar year in which the program authorized under this section is sunset; and
  - (3) The provisions of this subsection shall not be construed to limit or in any way impair the department's ability to redeem tax credits authorized on or before the date the program authorized under this section expires or a taxpayer's ability to redeem such credits.
  - 10. Beginning on March 29, 2013, any verified contribution to a qualified agency made on or after January 1, 2013, shall be eligible for tax credits as provided by this section.
  - 136.055. 1. Except as provided in subsection 8 of this section, any person who is selected or appointed by the state director of revenue as provided in subsection 2 of this section to act as an agent of the department of revenue, whose duties shall be the processing of motor vehicle title and registration transactions and the collection of sales and use taxes when required under sections 144.070 and 144.440, and who receives no salary from the department of revenue, shall be authorized to collect from the party requiring such services additional fees as compensation in full and for all services rendered on the following basis:
  - (1) For each motor vehicle or trailer registration issued, renewed or transferred, [six] **nine** dollars and [twelve] **eighteen** dollars for those licenses sold or biennially renewed pursuant to section 301.147;
    - (2) For each application or transfer of title, [six] nine dollars;
- 12 (3) For each instruction permit, nondriver license, chauffeur's, operator's or driver's 13 license issued for a period of three years or less, [six] nine dollars and [twelve] eighteen 14 dollars for licenses or instruction permits issued or renewed for a period exceeding three 15 years;
- 16 (4) For each notice of lien processed, [six] nine dollars;
- 17 (5) Notary fee or electronic transmission per processing, two dollars.

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- 2. The director of revenue shall award fee office contracts under this section through a competitive bidding process. The competitive bidding process shall [give priority] provide at least five percent of evaluation credit to organizations and entities that are exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3), 501(c)(6), or 501(c)(4), except those civic organizations that would be considered action organizations under 26 C.F.R. Section 1.501 (c)(3)-1(c)(3), of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, with [special consideration] at least five percent of evaluation credit given to those organizations and entities that reinvest a minimum of seventy-five percent of the net proceeds to charitable organizations in Missouri, and political subdivisions, including but not limited to, municipalities, counties, and fire protection districts. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the director of revenue shall not award any fee office contract under this section to any entity affiliated in any manner with a current employee of the department of revenue or with a former employee of the department of revenue for the one-year period following the former employee's termination of employment with the department. For purposes of this subsection, "affiliated in any manner" includes owning the entity that is applying for a fee office contract, or serving as an officer or board member of such entity. The director of the department of revenue may promulgate rules and regulations necessary to carry out the provisions of this subsection. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this subsection shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2009, shall be invalid and void.
- 3. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 9 of this section, all fees authorized under this section collected by a [tax exempt organization] contract fee office may be retained and used by the [organization] entity operating the contract fee office, and all fees authorized under this section collected by a fee office operated by the department of revenue shall be considered state revenue.
- 4. All fees charged shall not exceed those in this section. The fees [imposed by] authorized under this section shall be collected by all [permanent] contract fee offices and shall be collected by all full-time or temporary offices [maintained] operated by the department of revenue.
- 52 5. Any person acting as agent of the department of revenue for the sale and issuance of registrations, licenses, and other documents related to motor vehicles shall have an

- insurable interest in all license plates, licenses, tabs, forms and other documents held on behalf of the department.
  - 6. The fees authorized by this section shall not be collected by motor vehicle dealers acting as agents of the department of revenue under section 32.095 or those motor vehicle dealers authorized to collect and remit sales tax under subsection 10 of section 144.070.
  - 7. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, the state auditor may audit all records maintained and established by the fee office in the same manner as the auditor may audit any agency of the state, and the department shall ensure that this audit requirement is a necessary condition for the award of all fee office contracts. No confidential records shall be divulged in such a way to reveal personally identifiable information.
  - 8. The fees described in subsection 1 of this section shall not be collected from any person who qualifies as a homeless child or homeless youth, as defined in subsection 1 of section 167.020, or as an unaccompanied youth as defined in 42 U.S.C. Section 11434a(6). Such person's status as a homeless child or youth or unaccompanied youth shall be verified by a letter signed by one of the following persons:
  - (1) A director or designee of a governmental or nonprofit agency that receives public or private funding to provide services to homeless persons;
  - (2) A local education agency liaison for homeless children and youth designated under 42 U.S.C. Section 11432(g)(1)(J)(ii), or a school social worker or counselor; or
    - (3) A licensed attorney representing the minor in any legal matter.
  - 9. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, one dollar of any fee authorized and charged under subdivision (1), (2), (3), or (4) of subsection 1 of this section by a fee office not operated by the department of revenue shall be remitted to the license office distribution fund established under subsection 10 of this section. Moneys remitted to the license office distribution fund under this subsection shall be held in trust for the entities awarded fee office contracts under this section and shall not be considered state revenue. In the event a court of competent jurisdiction issues a final judgment specifying that moneys remitted under this subsection are subject to Article IV, Section 30(b) of the Missouri Constitution, the provisions of this subsection shall be null and void.
  - 10. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "License Office Distribution Fund", which shall consist of moneys collected as provided under subsection 9 of this section. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and shall be used solely for the purposes specified in this subsection.

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- 90 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys 91 remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the 92 general revenue fund.
  - (3) The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.
- (4) Beginning after December 31, 2025, but no later than February 15, 2026, 97 quarterly disbursements shall be made from the fund to the fee offices awarded contracts under this section. Except as otherwise specified in subdivision (5) of this subsection, the disbursement to each fee office shall be equal. The total funds disbursed following each quarter shall be equal to the amount of funds received by the fund under subsection 9 of this section during the quarter.
  - (5) Quarterly disbursements under this subsection shall be distributed to the entity holding each fee office contract when the quarterly disbursement occurs; provided that, in the case that a contract fee office transitions between two contractors during the quarter, the disbursement for that fee office shall be divided between the contractors in proportion to the number of transactions the office processed under each contractor during the quarter for which the transfer is taking place.
    - (6) Quarterly disbursements under this subsection shall be made as follows:
  - (a) Disbursements for transactions occurring from January first to March thirty-first shall occur no later than May fifteenth of each year;
  - (b) Disbursements for transactions occurring from April first to June thirtieth shall occur no later than August fifteenth of each year;
  - (c) Disbursements for transactions occurring from July first to September thirtieth shall occur no later than November fifteenth of each year; and
  - (d) Disbursements for transactions occurring from October first to December thirty-first shall occur no later than February fifteenth of the following calendar year each year.
  - 190.142. 1. (1) For applications submitted before the recognition of EMS personnel licensure interstate compact under sections 190.900 to 190.939 takes effect, the department shall, within a reasonable time after receipt of an application, cause such investigation as it deems necessary to be made of the applicant for an emergency medical technician's license.
- 5 (2) For applications submitted after the recognition of EMS personnel licensure interstate compact under sections 190.900 to 190.939 takes effect, an applicant for initial licensure as an emergency medical technician in this state shall submit to a background check by the Missouri state highway patrol and the Federal Bureau of Investigation through a process approved by the department of health and senior services. Such processes may

- include the use of vendors or systems administered by the Missouri state highway patrol. The department may share the results of such a criminal background check with any emergency services licensing agency in any member state, as that term is defined under section 190.900, in recognition of the EMS personnel licensure interstate compact. The department shall not issue a license until the department receives the results of an applicant's criminal background check from the Missouri state highway patrol and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, but, notwithstanding this subsection, the department may issue a temporary license as provided under section 190.143. Any fees due for a criminal background check shall be paid by the applicant.
- 19 (3) The director may authorize investigations into criminal records in other states for 20 any applicant.
  - 2. The department shall issue a license to all levels of emergency medical technicians, for a period of five years, if the applicant meets the requirements established pursuant to sections 190.001 to 190.245 and the rules adopted by the department pursuant to sections 190.001 to 190.245. The department may promulgate rules relating to the requirements for an emergency medical technician including but not limited to:
    - (1) Age requirements;
  - (2) Emergency medical technician and paramedic education and training requirements based on respective National Emergency Medical Services Education Standards and any modification to such curricula specified by the department through rules adopted pursuant to sections 190.001 to 190.245;
- 31 (3) Paramedic accreditation requirements. Paramedic training programs shall be 32 accredited as required by the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians;
  - (4) Initial licensure testing requirements. Initial paramedic licensure testing shall be through the national registry of EMTs;
    - (5) (a) Continuing education and relicensure requirements.
  - (b) The department shall require each emergency medical technician or advanced emergency medical technician, including each paramedic, to receive four hours of sex and human trafficking training produced by the committee on sex and human trafficking training pursuant to section 27.170 or training already produced and approved by the committee on sex and human trafficking training pursuant to section 27.170 as part of the continuing education requirements for relicensure every five years. The provisions of this paragraph shall become effective on January 1, 2025, and shall expire on December 31, 2029;
  - a. Licensees who submit an application for renewal prior to January 1, 2026, shall be required to receive one hour of sex and human trafficking training consistent with the guidelines established in section 27.170;

- b. Licensees who submit an application for renewal on or after January 1, 2026, but prior to January 1, 2027, shall be required to receive two hours of sex and human trafficking training consistent with the guidelines established in section 21.170;
  - c. Licensees who submit an application for renewal on or after January 1, 2027, but prior to January 1, 2028, shall be required to receive three hours of sex and human trafficking training consistent with the guidelines established in section 21.170;
  - d. Licensees who submit an application for renewal on or after January 1, 2028, but prior to January 1, 2029, shall be required to receive four hours of sex and human trafficking training consistent with the guidelines established in section 21.170; and
    - (6) Ability to speak, read and write the English language.
  - 3. Application for all levels of emergency medical technician license shall be made upon such forms as prescribed by the department in rules adopted pursuant to sections 190.001 to 190.245. The application form shall contain such information as the department deems necessary to make a determination as to whether the emergency medical technician meets all the requirements of sections 190.001 to 190.245 and rules promulgated pursuant to sections 190.001 to 190.245.
- 4. All levels of emergency medical technicians may perform only that patient care which is:
  - (1) Consistent with the training, education and experience of the particular emergency medical technician; and
    - (2) Ordered by a physician or set forth in protocols approved by the medical director.
  - 5. No person shall hold themselves out as an emergency medical technician or provide the services of an emergency medical technician unless such person is licensed by the department.
  - 6. A hearing shall be conducted by the department within fifteen days from the date the appeal is filed. The immediate suspension shall continue in effect until the conclusion of the proceedings, including review thereof, unless sooner withdrawn by the department or stayed by a court of competent jurisdiction.

All buildings and premises used by a child-care facility to care for more than six children except those exempted from the licensing provisions of the department of elementary and secondary education pursuant to subdivisions (1) to [(15)] (16) of subsection 1 of section 210.211, shall be inspected annually for fire and safety by the state fire marshal, the marshal's designee or officials of a local fire district and for health and sanitation by the department of elementary and secondary education or the department's designee, including officials of the department of health and senior services, or officials of the local health department. Evidence of compliance with the inspections required by this section shall be kept on file and available to parents of children enrolling in the child-care facility.
  - 2. Local inspection of child-care facilities may be accomplished if the standards employed by local personnel are substantially equivalent to state standards and local personnel are available for enforcement of such standards.
  - 3. Any child-care facility may request a variance from a rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to this section. The request for a variance shall be made in writing to the department of elementary and secondary education and shall include the reasons the facility is requesting the variance. The department shall approve any variance request that does not endanger the health or safety of the children served by the facility. The burden of proof at any appeal of a disapproval of a variance application shall be with the department of elementary and secondary education. Local inspectors may grant a variance, subject to approval by the department of elementary and secondary education.
  - 4. The department of elementary and secondary education shall administer the provisions of sections 210.252 to 210.256, with the cooperation of the state fire marshal, the department of health and senior services, local fire departments and local health agencies.

Any program licensed by the department of elementary and secondary 2 education pursuant to this chapter providing child care to only school-age children [that is located and operated on elementary or secondary school property shall comply with the 4 child-care licensure provisions in this chapter; except that, for safety, health and fire purposes, all buildings and premises for any such programs shall be deemed to be in compliance with 5 the child-care licensure provisions in this chapter.
  - 210.560. 1. As used in this section, the following terms shall mean:
- 2 (1) "Child", any child placed in the legal custody of the division under chapter 211;
- 3 (2) "Division", the children's division of the department of social services of the state 4 of Missouri;
- 5 (3) "Money", any legal tender, note, draft, certificate of deposit, stocks, bond or 6 check;

Money so received shall be governed by this section to the extent that laws and regulations governing payment of such benefits provide otherwise.

If the child is already receiving the benefits before being placed in the division's custody or if the division applies for the benefits on behalf of the child, then the division shall identify, in consultation with the child and the child's legal representative, a representative payee in accordance with 20 CFR 404.2021 and 20 CFR 416.621 and shall apply to become the representative payee only if no other suitable candidate is available. The division shall annually review if someone other than the division is available, if in the best interests of the child, to apply to assume the role of representative payee.
  - (3) The division shall annually review cases of children in the division's custody to determine whether a child may have become eligible for benefits after the division's initial assessment.
  - 4. Any money received by the division on behalf of a child shall be accounted for in the name of the child. Any money in the account of a child [may] shall not be expended by the division for care or services for the child, including, but not limited to, foster care maintenance payments, as defined in 42 U.S.C. Section 675(4)(A), and any special

The division shall by rule adopted under chapter 536 establish procedures for the accounting of the money and the 55 56 protection of the money against theft, loss or misappropriation.
- 5. The division shall deposit money with a financial institution. Any earnings attributable to the money in the account of a child shall be credited to that child's account. The division shall receive bids from banking corporations, associations or trust companies which desire to be selected as depositories of children's moneys for the division. The child's account shall be established in a manner consistent with federal and state asset and 62 resource limits and may include a special-needs trust, a pooled special-needs trust, an ABLE account, as defined in section 209.600, or any other trust account determined not to interfere with asset limitations for any state or federal benefit program for which the child may be eligible.

The executive director shall serve under the supervision of the attorney general who shall provide necessary office space.

- (8) A violation of section 566.040, 566.070, or 566.090 as such sections existed prior 13 14 to August 28, 2013; or

For all other violations of offenses in chapters 566 and 568 not specifically listed in subsection 1 of this section or for a violation of an offense committed in another state when a 18 child is the victim that would be a violation of chapter 566 or 568 if committed in Missouri, 20 the juvenile court may exercise its discretion regarding the placement of a child under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court in a home in which a parent or any person residing in the home has been found guilty of, or pled guilty to, any such offense.

If the juvenile court determines that a child has abused another child, such abusing child shall be prohibited from returning to or residing in any residence located within one thousand feet of the residence of the abused child, or any child care facility or school that the abused child attends, until the abused child reaches eighteen years of age. The prohibitions of this subsection shall not apply where the alleged abuse occurred between siblings or children living in the same home.

The juvenile court shall not refuse to reunify or otherwise place a child with a parent who, or in a home in which the parent or any person residing in the home, is utilizing medication-assisted treatment, as such term is defined in section 487.200, for opioid or other substance misuse or dependence because of the use of such treatment or otherwise require such parent or person to cease utilizing or complete such treatment prior to reunification or placement of the child.

In placing a child in or committing a child to the custody of an individual or 2 of a private agency or institution, the court, children's division, or any child-placing agency 3 contracting with the state to provide foster care services shall, whenever practicable, 4 select either a person, or an agency or institution governed by persons of the same religious 5 faith as that of the parents of such child, or in case of a difference in the religious faith of the

#### 211.326. 1. The state courts administrator shall:

Any person between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years who is qualified to obtain a license pursuant to sections 302.010 to 302.340 may apply for, and the director shall issue, an intermediate driver's license entitling the applicant, while having such license in his or her possession, to operate a motor vehicle of the appropriate class upon the highways of this state in conjunction with the requirements of this section. An intermediate driver's license shall be readily distinguishable from a license issued to those over the age of eighteen. All applicants for an intermediate driver's license shall:
  - (1) Successfully complete the examination required by section 302.173;
  - (2) Pay the fee required by subsection 4 of this section;
  - (3) Have had a temporary instruction permit issued pursuant to subsection 1 of section 302.130 for at least a six-month period or a valid license from another state; and
- 12 (4) Have a parent, grandparent, legal guardian, or, if the applicant is a participant in a 13 federal residential job training program, a driving instructor employed by a federal residential 14 job training program, sign the application stating that the applicant has completed at least 15 forty hours of supervised driving experience under a temporary instruction permit issued

pursuant to subsection 1 of section 302.130, or, if the applicant is an emancipated minor, the person over twenty-one years of age who supervised such driving. For purposes of this section, the term "emancipated minor" means a person who is at least sixteen years of age, but less than eighteen years of age, who:

- 20 (a) Marries with the consent of the legal custodial parent or legal guardian pursuant to section 451.080;
  - (b) Has been declared emancipated by a court of competent jurisdiction;
- 23 (c) Enters active duty in the Armed Forces;

  - (e) Through employment or other means provides for such person's own food, shelter and other cost-of-living expenses; **or**
  - (f) Qualifies as a homeless child or homeless youth, as defined in subsection 1 of section 167.020, or as an unaccompanied youth as defined in 42 U.S.C. Section 11434a (6), and whose status as such is verified as provided under subsection 10 of this section;
  - (5) Have had no alcohol-related enforcement contacts as defined in section 302.525 during the preceding twelve months; and
  - (6) Have no nonalcoholic traffic convictions for which points are assessed pursuant to section 302.302, within the preceding six months.
  - 2. An intermediate driver's license grants the licensee the same privileges to operate that classification of motor vehicle as a license issued pursuant to section 302.177, except that no person shall operate a motor vehicle on the highways of this state under such an intermediate driver's license between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. unless accompanied by a person described in subsection 1 of section 302.130; except the licensee may operate a motor vehicle without being accompanied if the travel is to or from a school or educational program or activity, a regular place of employment or in emergency situations as defined by the director by regulation.
  - 3. Each intermediate driver's license shall be restricted by requiring that the driver and all passengers in the licensee's vehicle wear safety belts at all times. This safety belt restriction shall not apply to a person operating a motorcycle. For the first six months after issuance of the intermediate driver's license, the holder of the license shall not operate a motor vehicle with more than one passenger who is under the age of nineteen who is not a member of the holder's immediate family. As used in this subsection, an intermediate driver's license holder's immediate family shall include brothers, sisters, stepbrothers or stepsisters of the driver, including adopted or foster children residing in the same household of the intermediate driver's license holder. After the expiration of the first six months, the holder of an intermediate driver's license shall not operate a motor vehicle with more than three passengers

- 53 who are under nineteen years of age and who are not members of the holder's immediate 54 family. The passenger restrictions of this subsection shall not be applicable to any 55 intermediate driver's license holder who is operating a motor vehicle being used in 56 agricultural work-related activities.
  - 4. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 302.177 to the contrary, the fee for an intermediate driver's license shall be five dollars and such license shall be valid for a period of two years. Such fee shall be waived for any person qualifying as an emancipated minor under subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this section.
  - 5. Any intermediate driver's licensee accumulating six or more points in a twelvemonth period may be required to participate in and successfully complete a driverimprovement program approved by the state highways and transportation commission. The driver-improvement program ordered by the director of revenue shall not be used in lieu of point assessment.
  - 6. (1) An intermediate driver's licensee who has, for the preceding twelve-month period, had no alcohol-related enforcement contacts, as defined in section 302.525 and no traffic convictions for which points are assessed, upon reaching the age of eighteen years or within the thirty days immediately preceding their eighteenth birthday may apply for and receive without further examination, other than a vision test as prescribed by section 302.173, a license issued pursuant to this chapter granting full driving privileges. Such person shall pay the required fee for such license as prescribed in section 302.177.
  - (2) If an intermediate driver's license expires on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, such license shall remain valid for the five business days immediately following the expiration date. In no case shall a licensee whose intermediate driver's license expires on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday be guilty of an offense of driving with an expired or invalid driver's license if such offense occurred within five business days immediately following an expiration date that occurs on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.
  - (3) The director of revenue shall deny an application for a full driver's license until the person has had no traffic convictions for which points are assessed for a period of twelve months prior to the date of application for license or until the person is eligible to apply for a six-year driver's license as provided for in section 302.177, provided the applicant is otherwise eligible for full driving privileges. An intermediate driver's license shall expire when the licensee is eligible and receives a full driver's license as prescribed in subdivision (1) of this section.

No person upon reaching the age of eighteen years whose intermediate driver's license and driving privilege is denied, suspended, cancelled or revoked in this state or any other state for any reason may apply for a full driver's license until such license or driving privilege is fully reinstated. Any such person whose intermediate driver's license has been

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- 90 revoked pursuant to the provisions of sections 302.010 to 302.540 shall, upon receipt of reinstatement of the revocation from the director, pass the complete driver examination, apply 91 92 for a new license, and pay the proper fee before again operating a motor vehicle upon the 93 highways of this state.
- 94 8. A person shall be exempt from the intermediate licensing requirements if the 95 person has reached the age of eighteen years and meets all other licensing requirements.
  - Any person who violates any of the provisions of this section relating to intermediate drivers' licenses or the provisions of section 302.130 relating to temporary instruction permits is guilty of an infraction, and no points shall be assessed to his or her driving record for any such violation.

  - 302.181. 1. The license issued pursuant to the provisions of sections 302.010 to 302.340 shall be in such form as the director shall prescribe, but the license shall be a card made of plastic or other comparable material. All licenses shall be manufactured of materials and processes that will prohibit, as nearly as possible, the ability to reproduce, alter, counterfeit, forge, or duplicate any license without ready detection. The license shall also bear the expiration date of the license, the classification of the license, the name, date of birth, residence address including the county of residence or a code number corresponding to such county established by the department, and brief description and colored digitized image of the licensee, and a facsimile of the signature of the licensee. The director shall provide by administrative rule the procedure and format for a licensee to indicate on the back of the 10 license together with the designation for an anatomical gift as provided in section 194.240 the

- name and address of the person designated pursuant to sections 404.800 to 404.865 as the licensee's attorney in fact for the purposes of a durable power of attorney for health care decisions. No license shall be valid until it has been so signed by the licensee. If any portion of the license is prepared by a private firm, any contract with such firm shall be made in accordance with the competitive purchasing procedures as established by the state director of the division of purchasing.
  - 2. All digital images produced for licenses shall become the property of the department of revenue.
  - 3. The license issued shall be carried at all times by the holder thereof while driving a motor vehicle, and shall be displayed upon demand of any officer of the highway patrol, or any police officer or peace officer, or any other duly authorized person, for inspection when demand is made therefor. Failure of any operator of a motor vehicle to exhibit his or her license to any duly authorized officer shall be presumptive evidence that such person is not a duly licensed operator.
  - 4. The director of revenue shall not issue a license without a facial digital image of the license applicant, except as provided pursuant to subsection 7 of this section. A digital image of the applicant's full facial features shall be taken in a manner prescribed by the director.   - (1) Present a form provided by the department of revenue requesting the applicant's photograph be omitted from the license or nondriver's license due to religious affiliations. The form shall be signed by the applicant and another member of the religious tenant verifying the photograph or digital image exemption on the license or nondriver's license is required as part of their religious affiliation. The required signatures on the prescribed form shall be properly notarized;

- (1) "Custody" means joint legal custody, sole legal custody, joint physical custody or sole physical custody or any combination thereof;
- (2) "Joint legal custody" means that the parents share the decision-making rights, responsibilities, and authority relating to the health, education and welfare of the child, and, unless allocated, apportioned, or decreed, the parents shall confer with one another in the exercise of decision-making rights, responsibilities, and authority;
- (3) "Joint physical custody" means an order awarding each of the parents significant, but not necessarily equal, periods of time during which a child resides with or is under the care and supervision of each of the parents. Joint physical custody shall be shared by the parents in such a way as to assure the child of frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with both parents;
- (4) "Third-party custody" means a third party designated as a legal and physical custodian pursuant to subdivision (5) of subsection 5 of this section.
- 2. The court shall determine custody in accordance with the best interests of the child. There shall be a rebuttable presumption that an award of equal or approximately equal 16 parenting time to each parent is in the best interests of the child. Such presumption is 17 rebuttable only by a preponderance of the evidence in accordance with all relevant factors, including, but not limited to, the factors contained in subdivisions (1) to [8] (9) of this subsection. The presumption may be rebutted if the court finds that the parents have reached an agreement on all issues related to custody, or if the court finds that a pattern of domestic 22 violence has occurred as set out in subdivision [(6)] (7) of this subsection. When the parties have not reached an agreement on all issues related to custody, the court shall consider all relevant factors and enter written findings of fact and conclusions of law, including, but not 24 limited to, the following:
  - (1) The wishes of the child's parents as to custody and the proposed parenting plan submitted by both parties;
  - (2) The needs of the child for a frequent, continuing and meaningful relationship with both parents and the ability and willingness of parents to actively perform their functions as mother and father for the needs of the child;

- 31 (3) The interaction and interrelationship of the child with parents, siblings, and any 32 other person who may significantly affect the child's best interests;
  - (4) Which parent is more likely to allow the child frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with the other parent and the willingness and ability of parents to cooperate in the rearing of their child, to maximize sharing information and minimize exposure of the child to parental conflict, and to utilize methods for resolving disputes regarding any major decision concerning the life of the child;
  - (5) The child's adjustment to the child's home, school, and community and the child's physical, emotional, educational, and other needs. The fact that a parent sends his or her child or children to a home school, as defined in section 167.031, shall not be the sole factor that a court considers in determining custody of such child or children;
  - (6) The mental and physical health of all individuals involved, including the mental health or substance abuse history experienced by either parent;
  - (7) Any history of abuse of any individuals involved, including domestic and child abuse. In determining whether the presumption is rebutted by a pattern of domestic violence, the court shall consider the nature and context of the domestic violence and the implications of the domestic violence for parenting and for the child's safety, well-being, and developmental needs. If the court finds that a pattern of domestic violence as defined in section 455.010 has occurred, and, if the court also finds that awarding custody to the abusive parent is in the best interest of the child, then the court shall enter written findings of fact and conclusions of law. Custody and visitation rights shall be ordered in a manner that best protects the child and any other child or children for whom the parent has custodial or visitation rights, and the parent or other family or household member who is the victim of domestic violence from any further harm, whether physical, verbal, emotional, or psychological;
    - [(7) The intention of either parent to relocate the principal residence of the child; and]
  - (8) [The unobstructed input of a child, free of coercion and manipulation, as to the child's custodial arrangement] The distance between the residences of the parents seeking custody, including consideration of any relocation which has occurred or an intent to relocate; and
  - (9) The reasonable input of the child as to the child's custodian, if the court deems the child to be of sufficient ability, age, and maturity to express an independent, reliable preference and that such input is in the best interests of the child and will not be emotionally damaging, with due consideration of the influence that a parent may have on the child's input.
- 3. (1) In any court proceedings relating to custody of a child, the court shall not award custody or unsupervised visitation of a child to a parent if such parent or any person

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- residing with such parent has been found guilty of, or pled guilty to, any of the following offenses when a child was the victim: 69

- (2) For all other violations of offenses in chapters 566 and 568 not specifically listed in subdivision (1) of this subsection or for a violation of an offense committed in another state 80 when a child is the victim that would be a violation of chapter 566 or 568 if committed in Missouri, the court may exercise its discretion in awarding custody or visitation of a child to a parent if such parent or any person residing with such parent has been found guilty of, or pled guilty to, any such offense.
  - 4. The general assembly finds and declares that it is the public policy of this state that frequent, continuing and meaningful contact with both parents after the parents have separated or dissolved their marriage is in the best interest of the child, except for cases where the court specifically finds that such contact is not in the best interest of the child, and that it is the public policy of this state to encourage parents to participate in decisions affecting the health, education and welfare of their children, and to resolve disputes involving their children amicably through alternative dispute resolution. - 99 (1) Joint physical and joint legal custody to both parents, which shall not be denied 100 solely for the reason that one parent opposes a joint physical and joint legal custody award. 101 The residence of one of the parents shall be designated as the address of the child for mailing 102 and educational purposes;

- 103 (2) Joint physical custody with one party granted sole legal custody. The residence of 104 one of the parents shall be designated as the address of the child for mailing and educational 105 purposes;
  - (3) Joint legal custody with one party granted sole physical custody;
  - (4) Sole custody to either parent; or
    - (5) Third-party custody or visitation:
  - (a) When the court finds that each parent is unfit, unsuitable, or unable to be a custodian, or the welfare of the child requires, and it is in the best interests of the child, then custody, temporary custody or visitation may be awarded to a person related by consanguinity or affinity to the child. If no person related to the child by consanguinity or affinity is willing to accept custody, then the court may award custody to any other person or persons deemed by the court to be suitable and able to provide an adequate and stable environment for the child. Before the court awards custody, temporary custody or visitation to a third person under this subdivision, the court shall make that person a party to the action;
  - (b) Under the provisions of this subsection, any person may petition the court to intervene as a party in interest at any time as provided by supreme court rule.
  - 6. If the parties have not agreed to a custodial arrangement, or the court determines such arrangement is not in the best interest of the child, the court shall include a written finding in the judgment or order based on the public policy in subsection 4 of this section and each of the factors listed in subdivisions (1) to [(8)] (9) of subsection 2 of this section detailing the specific relevant factors that made a particular arrangement in the best interest of the child. If a proposed custodial arrangement is rejected by the court, the court shall include a written finding in the judgment or order detailing the specific relevant factors resulting in the rejection of such arrangement.
  - 7. Upon a finding by the court that either parent has refused to exchange information with the other parent, which shall include but not be limited to information concerning the health, education and welfare of the child, the court shall order the parent to comply immediately and to pay the prevailing party a sum equal to the prevailing party's cost associated with obtaining the requested information, which shall include but not be limited to reasonable attorney's fees and court costs.
  - 8. As between the parents of a child, no preference may be given to either parent in the awarding of custody because of that parent's age, sex, or financial status, nor because of the age or sex of the child. The court shall not presume that a parent, solely because of his or her sex, is more qualified than the other parent to act as a joint or sole legal or physical custodian for the child.
  - 9. Any judgment providing for custody shall include a specific written parenting plan setting forth the terms of such parenting plan arrangements specified in subsection 8 of

section 452.310. Such plan may be a parenting plan submitted by the parties pursuant to section 452.310 or, in the absence thereof, a plan determined by the court, but in all cases, the custody plan approved and ordered by the court shall be in the court's discretion and shall be in the best interest of the child.

After August 28, 2016, every court order establishing or modifying custody or visitation shall include the following language: "In the event of noncompliance with this order, the aggrieved party may file a verified motion for contempt. If custody, visitation, or third-party custody is denied or interfered with by a parent or third party without good cause, the aggrieved person may file a family access motion with the court stating the specific facts that constitute a violation of the custody provisions of the judgment of dissolution, legal separation, or judgment of paternity. The circuit clerk will provide the aggrieved party with an explanation of the procedures for filing a family access motion and a simple form for use in filing the family access motion. A family access motion does not require the assistance of legal counsel to prepare and file."
- 11. No court shall adopt any local rule, form, or practice requiring a standardized or default parenting plan for interim, temporary, or permanent orders or judgments. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, a court may enter an interim order in a proceeding under this chapter, provided that the interim order shall not contain any provisions about child custody or a parenting schedule or plan without first providing the parties with notice and a hearing, unless the parties otherwise agree.
- 12. Unless a parent has been denied custody rights pursuant to this section or visitation rights under section 452.400, both parents shall have access to records and information pertaining to a minor child including, but not limited to, medical, dental, and school records. If the parent without custody has been granted restricted or supervised visitation because the court has found that the parent with custody or any child has been the victim of domestic violence, as defined in section 455.010, by the parent without custody, the court may order that the reports and records made available pursuant to this subsection not include the address of the parent with custody or the child. A court shall order that the reports and records made available under this subsection not include the address of the parent with custody if the parent with custody is a participant in the address confidentiality program under section 589.663. Unless a parent has been denied custody rights pursuant to this section or visitation rights under section 452.400, any judgment of dissolution or other applicable court order shall specifically allow both parents access to such records and reports.
- 13. Except as otherwise precluded by state or federal law, if any individual, professional, public or private institution or organization denies access or fails to provide or disclose any and all records and information, including, but not limited to, past and present dental, medical and school records pertaining to a minor child, to either parent upon the

written request of such parent, the court shall, upon its finding that the individual, professional, public or private institution or organization denied such request without good cause, order that party to comply immediately with such request and to pay to the prevailing party all costs incurred, including, but not limited to, attorney's fees and court costs associated with obtaining the requested information.

- 14. An award of joint custody does not preclude an award of child support pursuant to section 452.340 and applicable supreme court rules. The court shall consider the factors contained in section 452.340 and applicable supreme court rules in determining an amount reasonable or necessary for the support of the child.
- 15. If the court finds that domestic violence or abuse as defined in section 455.010 has occurred, the court shall make specific findings of fact to show that the custody or visitation arrangement ordered by the court best protects the child and the parent or other family or household member who is the victim of domestic violence, as defined in section 455.010, and any other children for whom such parent has custodial or visitation rights from any further harm.

452.705. As used in sections 452.700 to 452.930:

- 2 (1) "Abandoned" means left without provision for reasonable and necessary care or supervision;
  - (2) "Child" means an individual who has not attained eighteen years of age;
  - (3) "Child custody determination" means a judgment, decree, or other order of a court providing for the legal custody, physical custody, or visitation with respect to a child. The term includes a permanent, temporary, initial, or modification order. The term shall not include an order relating to child support or other monetary obligation of an individual;
  - (4) "Child custody proceeding" means a proceeding in which legal custody, physical custody, or visitation with respect to a child is an issue. The term includes a proceeding for divorce, separation, neglect, abuse, dependency, guardianship, paternity, termination of parental rights, and protection from domestic violence in which the issue may appear.   - (7) "Decree" or "custody decree" means a custody determination contained in a judicial decree or order made in a custody proceeding, and includes an initial decree and a modification decree;
  - (8) "Home state" means the state in which a child has lived with a parent or a person acting as a parent for at least six consecutive months immediately prior to the commencement

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- of a child custody proceeding. In the case of a child less than six months of age, the term means the state in which the child has lived from birth with any of the persons mentioned. A period of temporary absence of any of the mentioned persons is part of such period;
- 26 (9) "Initial determination" means the first child custody determination concerning a particular child;
- 28 (10) "Issuing court" means the court making a child custody determination for which 29 enforcement is sought under sections 452.700 to 452.930;
  - (11) "Issuing state" means the state in which a child custody determination is made;
- 31 (12) "Litigant" means a person, including a parent, grandparent, or stepparent, who 32 claims a right to custody or visitation with respect to a child;

  - (17) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States;
  - (18) "Warrant" means an order issued by a court authorizing law enforcement officers to take physical custody of a child;
- 50 (19) "Wrongful removal" means the taking of a child that breaches rights of custody or visitation given or recognized under the laws of this state.
- 452.730. 1. A court of this state may communicate with a court in another state concerning a proceeding arising under sections 452.700 to 452.930 or arising under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122.
- 2. The court may allow the parties to participate in the communication. If the parties are not able to participate in the communication, the parties shall be given the opportunity to present facts and legal arguments before a decision on jurisdiction is made.

(1) Upon the filing of a petition seeking enforcement of a child custody 2 determination, the petitioner may file with a verified application for the issuance of a 3 warrant to take physical custody of the child or upon the filing of a petition under sections 4 452.1100 to 452.1122, the court may issue an exparte warrant to take physical custody 5 of the child if the court finds, upon review of the petition or verified application or upon 6 the testimony of the petitioner or other witnesses, that the child is likely to suffer serious imminent physical harm or there is a credible risk that the child is imminently likely to 8 suffer wrongful removal [from this state].
- (2) Prior to issuing a warrant in response to a petition filed under sections 10 452.1100 to 452.1122 and before determining the placement of the child after the warrant is executed, the court may order a search of the relevant databases of the National Crime Information Center system and similar state databases to determine if the petitioner or respondent has a history of domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or neglect.
  - 2. [If the court, upon the testimony of the petitioner or other witnesses, finds that the child is likely to suffer serious imminent physical harm or be imminently removed from this state, the court may issue a warrant to take physical custody of the child. The petition shall be heard on the next judicial day after the warrant is executed. The warrant shall include the statements required under subsection 2 of section 452.870.
    - 3. A warrant to take physical custody of a child shall:
- 21 (1) Recite the facts upon which a [conclusion] determination of serious imminent physical harm or a credible risk of imminent wrongful removal from the jurisdiction is 22 23 based;
- 24 (2) Direct law enforcement officers to take physical custody of the child immediately; 25 [and]

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- 26 (3) State the date and time for the hearing on the petition;
- 27 (4) Provide for the safe interim placement of the child pending further order of the 28 court or final relief: and
  - (5) Include the statements required under subsection 2 of section 452.870 if a warrant is issued in response to a petition seeking enforcement of a child custody determination.
- 32 [<del>4.</del>] **3.** The respondent shall be served with the petition, warrant and order 33 immediately after the child is taken into physical custody.
  - 4. The respondent shall be afforded an opportunity to be heard at the earliest possible time after the ex parte warrant is executed but no later than the next judicial day unless a hearing on that date is impossible. In that event, the court shall hold the hearing on the first judicial day possible.
  - 5. If the court finds, after a hearing, that a petitioner sought a warrant under subsection 1 of this section for the purpose of harassment or in bad faith, the court may award the respondent reasonable attorney's fees, costs, and expenses.
  - [5.] 6. A warrant to take physical custody of a child is enforceable throughout this state. If the court finds on the basis of the testimony of the petitioner or other witness that a less intrusive remedy is not effective, the court may authorize law enforcement officers to enter private property to take physical custody of the child. If required by the exigency of the case, the court may authorize law enforcement officers to make a forcible entry at any hour.
- [6-] 7. The court may impose conditions on the placement of a child to ensure the 47 appearance of the child and the child's custodian.
  - 8. This section does not affect the availability of relief allowed under the laws of this state other than sections 452.700 to 452.930 and sections 452.1100 to 452.1122.
  - 452.1100. Sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 may be cited as the "Uniform Child **Abduction Prevention Act".**

452.1102. In sections 452.1100 to 452.1122:

- (1) "Abduction" means the wrongful removal or wrongful retention of a child;
- (2) "Child" means an unemancipated individual who is less than eighteen years of age;
- (3) "Child abduction prevention measures" means measures and conditions that are reasonably calculated to prevent the abduction of a child, including provisions of subsections 3, 4, and 5 of section 452.1114, and other measures that the court deems appropriate to prevent the abduction of a child;
- (4) "Child-custody determination" means a judgment, decree, or other order of 10 a court providing for the legal custody, physical custody, or visitation with respect to a child. The term includes a permanent, temporary, initial, and modification order;

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- 12 (5) "Child custody proceeding" means a proceeding in which legal custody, physical custody, or visitation with respect to a child is at issue. The term includes a 13 proceeding for divorce, dissolution of marriage, separation, neglect, abuse, dependency, guardianship, paternity, termination of parental rights, or protection from domestic 15 16 violence:
- 17 (6) "Court" means an entity authorized under the law of a state to establish, 18 enforce, or modify a child-custody determination;
  - (7) "Petition" includes a motion or its equivalent;
- 20 (8) "Record" means information that is inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or other medium and is retrievable in perceivable form;
- (9) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto 23 Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to 24 the jurisdiction of the United States. The term includes a federally recognized Indian tribe or nation;
  - (10) "Travel document" means records relating to a travel itinerary, including travel tickets, passes, reservations for transportation, or accommodations. The term does not include a passport or visa;
- 29 (11) "Warrant" means an order issued by a court authorizing law enforcement 30 officers to take physical custody of a child;
  - (12) "Wrongful removal" means the taking of a child that breaches rights of custody or visitation given or recognized under the law of this state;
- 33 (13) "Wrongful retention" means the keeping or concealing of a child that breaches rights of custody or visitation given or recognized under the law of this state. 34
  - 452.1104. Sections 452.730, 452.735, and 452.820 of the uniform child custody jurisdiction and enforcement act apply to cooperation and communications among courts in proceedings under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122.
- 452.1106. 1. A court on its own motion may order abduction prevention 2 measures in a child custody proceeding if the court finds that the evidence establishes a 3 credible risk of abduction of the child.
- 2. A party to a child custody determination or another individual or entity 5 having a right under the law of this state or any other state to seek a child custody determination for the child may file a petition seeking abduction prevention measures to protect the child under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122.
- 3. A prosecutor or public authority designated under section 452.910 may seek a warrant to take physical custody of a child under section 452.885 or other appropriate prevention measures. 10

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- 452.1108. 1. A petition under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 may be filed only in a court that has jurisdiction to make a child custody determination with respect to the child at issue under sections 452.700 to 452.930.
- 4 2. A court of this state has temporary emergency jurisdiction under section 5 452.755 if the court finds a credible risk of abduction.
- 452.1110. A petition under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 must be verified and include a copy of any existing child custody determination, if available. The petition must specify the risk factors for abduction, including the relevant factors described in section 452.1112. Subject to subsection 5 of section 452.780, if reasonably ascertainable, the petition must contain:
  - (1) The name, date of birth, and sex of the child;
    - (2) The customary address and current physical location of the child;
- 8 (3) The identity, customary address, and current physical location of the 9 respondent;
  - (4) A statement of whether a prior action to prevent abduction or domestic violence has been filed by a party or other individual or entity having custody of the child, and the date, location, and disposition of the action;
- 13 (5) A statement of whether a party to the proceeding has been arrested for a 14 crime related to domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or neglect, and the date, 15 location, and disposition of the case; and
- 16 **(6)** Any other information required to be submitted to the court for a child custody determination under section 452.780.
- 452.1112. 1. In determining whether there is a credible risk of abduction of a child, the court shall consider any evidence that the petitioner or respondent:
  - (1) Has previously abducted or attempted to abduct the child;
- 4 (2) Has threatened to abduct the child;
- 5 (3) Has recently engaged in activities that may indicate a planned abduction, 6 including:
  - (a) Abandoning employment;
  - (b) Selling a primary residence;
- 9 (c) Terminating a lease;
- 10 (d) Closing bank or other financial management accounts, liquidating assets, 11 hiding or destroying financial documents, or conducting any unusual financial 12 activities:
- 13 (e) Applying for a passport or visa or obtaining travel documents for the 14 respondent, a family member, or the child; or
- 15 (f) Seeking to obtain the child's birth certificate or school or medical records;

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- 16 (4) Has engaged in domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or neglect;
  - (5) Has refused to follow a child custody determination;
- 18 (6) Lacks strong familial, financial, emotional, or cultural ties to the state or the 19 **United States**;
- 20 (7) Has strong familial, financial, emotional, or cultural ties to another state or 21 country;
- 22 (8) Is likely to take the child to a country that:
- 23 (a) Is not a party to the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International 24 Child Abduction and does not provide for the extradition of an abducting parent or for 25 the return of an abducted child;
- 26 (b) Is a party to the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International 27 **Child Abduction but:**
- a. The Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction is not in force between the United States and that country; 29
  - b. Is noncompliant according to the most recent compliance report issued by the **United States Department of State; or**
- 32 c. Lacks legal mechanisms for immediately and effectively enforcing a return 33 order under the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction; 34
  - (c) Poses a risk that the child's physical or emotional health or safety would be endangered in the country because of specific circumstances relating to the child or because of human rights violations committed against children;
    - (d) Has laws or practices that would:
  - a. Enable the respondent, without due cause, to prevent the petitioner from contacting the child;
  - b. Restrict the petitioner from freely traveling to or exiting from the country because of the petitioner's sex, nationality, marital status, or religion; or
  - c. Restrict the child's ability legally to leave the country after the child reaches the age of majority because of a child's sex, nationality, or religion;
  - (e) Is included by the United States Department of State on a current list of state sponsors of terrorism;
    - (f) Does not have an official United States diplomatic presence in the country; or
- 48 (g) Is engaged in active military action or war, including a civil war, to which the 49 child may be exposed;
- 50 (9) Is undergoing a change in immigration or citizenship status that would adversely affect the respondent's ability to remain in the United States legally; 51
- 52 (10) Has had an application for United States citizenship denied;

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- 53 (11) Has forged or presented misleading or false evidence on government forms 54 or supporting documents to obtain or attempt to obtain a passport, a visa, travel 55 documents, a Social Security card, a driver's license, or other government-issued identification card or has made a misrepresentation to the United States government; 56
  - (12) Has used multiple names to attempt to mislead or defraud; or
- 58 (13) Has engaged in any other conduct the court considers relevant to the risk of 59 abduction.
  - 2. In the hearing on a petition under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122, the court shall consider any evidence that the respondent believed in good faith that the respondent's conduct was necessary to avoid imminent harm to the child or respondent and any other evidence that may be relevant to whether the respondent may be permitted to remove or retain the child.
  - 452.1114. 1. If a petition is filed under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122, the court may enter an order that must include:
    - (1) The basis for the court's exercise of jurisdiction;
- 4 (2) The manner in which notice and opportunity to be heard were given to the 5 persons entitled to notice of the proceeding;
  - (3) A detailed description of each party's custody and visitation rights and residential arrangements for the child;
  - (4) A provision stating that a violation of the order may subject the party in violation to civil and criminal penalties; and
- (5) Identification of the child's country of habitual residence at the time of the issuance of the order. 11
- 2. If, at a hearing on a petition under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 or on the court's own motion, the court after reviewing the evidence finds a credible risk of 14 abduction of the child, the court shall enter an abduction prevention order. The order 15 must include the provisions required by subsection 1 of this section and measures and 16 conditions, including those in subsections 3, 4, and 5 of this section, that are reasonably calculated to prevent abduction of the child, giving due consideration to the potential harm to the child from an abduction, the legal and practical difficulties of returning the child to the jurisdiction if abducted, and the reasons for the potential abduction, including evidence of domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or neglect.
  - 3. An abduction prevention order may include one or more of the following:
- (1) An imposition of travel restrictions that require that a party traveling with the child outside a designated geographical area provide the other party with the 24 following:
  - (a) The travel itinerary of the child;

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- 26 (b) A list of physical addresses and telephone numbers at which the child can be 27 reached at specified times; and
  - (c) Copies of all travel documents;
  - (2) A prohibition of the respondent directly or indirectly:
- 30 (a) Removing the child from this state, the United States, or another geographic area without permission of the court or the petitioner's written consent; 31
- 32 Removing or retaining the child in violation of a child custody 33 determination;
  - (c) Removing the child from school or a child care or similar facility; or
- 35 (d) Approaching the child at any location other than a site designated for supervised visitation; 36
- 37 (3) A requirement that a party register the order in another state as a prerequisite to allowing the child to travel to that state; 38
  - (4) With regard to the child's passport:
- 40 (a) A direction that the petitioner place the child's name in the United States Department of State's Child Passport Issuance Alert Program;
  - (b) A requirement that the respondent surrender to the court or the petitioner's attorney any United States or foreign passport issued in the child's name, including a passport issued in the name of both the parent and the child; and
  - (c) A prohibition upon the respondent from applying on behalf of the child for a new or replacement passport or visa;
- 47 (5) As a prerequisite to exercising custody or visitation, a requirement that the respondent provide: 48
  - (a) To the United States Department of State Office of Children's Issues and the relevant foreign consulate or embassy, an authenticated copy of the order detailing passport and travel restrictions for the child;
    - (b) To the court:
- 53 a. Proof that the respondent has provided the information in paragraph (a) of 54 this subdivision; and
- 55 b. An acknowledgment in a record from the relevant foreign consulate or 56 embassy that no passport application has been made, or passport issued, on behalf of the 57 child;
- 58 (c) To the petitioner, proof of registration with the United States Embassy or 59 other United States diplomatic presence in the destination country and with the Central 60 Authority for the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction, if that Convention is in effect between the United States and the destination 61 62 country, unless one of the parties objects; and

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- 63 (d) A written waiver under 5 U.S.C. Section 552a of the Privacy Act of 1974, as amended, with respect to any document, application, or other information pertaining to 64 65 the child authorizing its disclosure to the court and the petitioner; and
  - (6) Upon the petitioner's request, a requirement that the respondent obtain an order from the relevant foreign country containing terms identical to the child custody determination issued in the United States.
  - 4. In an abduction prevention order, the court may impose conditions on the exercise of custody or visitation that:
  - (1) Limit visitation or require that visitation with the child by the respondent be supervised until the court finds that supervision is no longer necessary and order the respondent to pay the costs of supervision;
  - (2) Require the respondent to post a bond or provide other security in an amount sufficient to serve as a financial deterrent to abduction, the proceeds of which may be used to pay for the reasonable expenses of recovery of the child, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs if there is an abduction; and
- 78 (3) Require the respondent to obtain education on the potentially harmful effects 79 to the child from abduction.
  - 5. To prevent imminent abduction of a child, a court may:
  - (1) Issue a warrant to take physical custody of the child;
- (2) Direct the use of law enforcement to take any action reasonably necessary to locate the child, obtain return of the child, or enforce a custody determination under sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 or the law of this state other than sections 452.1100 to 452.1122; or 85
- 86 (3) Grant any other relief allowed under the law of this state other than sections 87 452.1100 to 452.1122.
- 6. The remedies provided in sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 are cumulative and do 89 not affect the availability of other remedies to prevent abduction.
  - 452.1118. An abduction prevention order remains in effect until the earliest of:
- 2 (1) The time stated in the order;
  - (2) The emancipation of the child;
  - (3) The child's attaining eighteen years of age; or
- (4) The time the order is modified, revoked, vacated, or superseded by a court 6 with jurisdiction under sections 452.740, 452.745, and 452.750 and applicable law of this 7 state.
- 452,1120. In applying and construing sections 452.1100 to 452.1122, 2 consideration must be given to the need to promote uniformity of the law with 3 respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.

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- 452.1122. Sections 452.1100 to 452.1122 modifies, limits, and supersedes the
- 2 federal Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act, 15 U.S.C. Section
- 3 7001, et seq., but does not modify, limit, or supersede Section 101(c) of the act, 15 U.S.C.
- 4 Section 7001(c), or authorize electronic delivery of any of the notices described in
- 5 Section 103(b) of that act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7003(b).
- 452.1200. Sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 may be cited as the "Uniform Deployed Parents Custody and Visitation Act".

452.1202. In sections 452.1200 to 452.1258:

- (1) "Adult" means an individual who has attained eighteen years of age or an emancipated minor;
- 4 (2) "Caretaking authority" means the right to live with and care for a child on a day-to-day basis. The term includes physical custody, parenting time, right to access, and visitation;
  - (3) "Child" means:
  - (a) An unemancipated individual who has not attained eighteen years of age; or
- 9 (b) An adult son or daughter by birth or adoption, or under law of this state 10 other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258, who is the subject of a court order concerning 11 custodial responsibility;
- 12 (4) "Court" means a tribunal authorized under law of this state other than 13 sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 to make, enforce, or modify a decision regarding custodial 14 responsibility;
- 15 (5) "Custodial responsibility" includes all powers and duties relating to 16 caretaking authority and decision-making authority for a child. The term includes 17 physical custody, legal custody, parenting time, right to access, visitation, and authority 18 to grant limited contact with a child;
  - (6) "Decision-making authority" means the power to make important decisions regarding a child, including decisions regarding the child's education, religious training, health care, extracurricular activities, and travel. The term does not include the power to make decisions that necessarily accompany a grant of caretaking authority;
- 23 (7) "Deploying parent" means a service member, who is deployed or has been 24 notified of impending deployment and is:
- 25 (a) A parent of a child under law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 26 452.1258; or
- (b) An individual who has custodial responsibility for a child under law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258;

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- 29 (8) "Deployment" means the movement or mobilization of a service member for more than ninety days but less than eighteen months pursuant to uniformed service 30 31 orders that:
  - (a) Are designated as unaccompanied;
  - (b) Do not authorize dependent travel; or
- 34 (c) Otherwise do not permit the movement of family members to the location to 35 which the service member is deployed;
  - "Family member" means a sibling, aunt, uncle, cousin, stepparent, or grandparent of a child or an individual recognized to be in a familial relationship with a child under law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258;
- (10) "Limited contact" means the authority of a nonparent to visit a child for a 40 limited time. The term includes authority to take the child to a place other than the residence of the child;
- (11) "Nonparent" means an individual other than a deploying parent or other 42 43 parent;
- (12) "Other parent" means an individual who, in common with a deploying 44 45 parent, is:
- 46 (a) A parent of a child under law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 47 452.1258; or
  - (b) An individual who has custodial responsibility for a child under law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258;
- 50 (13) "Record" means information that is inscribed on a tangible medium or that is stored in an electronic or other medium and is retrievable in perceivable form; 51
- (14) "Return from deployment" means the conclusion of a service member's 52 deployment as specified in uniformed service orders; 53
  - (15) "Service member" means a member of a uniformed service;
- 55 (16) "Sign" means, with present intent to authenticate or adopt a record:
  - (a) To execute or adopt a tangible symbol; or
- 57 (b) To attach to or logically associate with the record an electronic symbol, 58 sound, or process;
- 59 (17) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to 61 the jurisdiction of the United States;
  - (18) "Uniformed service" means:
- 63 (a) Active and reserve components of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, 64 or Coast Guard of the United States;
  - (b) The United States Merchant Marine;

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- 66 (c) The commissioned corps of the United States Public Health Service;
- 67 The commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric 68 Administration of the United States: or
  - (e) The National Guard of a state.

452.1204. In addition to other remedies under law of this state other than 2 sections 452.1200 to 452.1258, if a court finds that a party to a proceeding under sections 3 452.1200 to 452.1258 has acted in bad faith or intentionally failed to comply with 4 sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 or a court order issued under sections 452.1200 to 5 452.1258, the court may assess reasonable attorney's fees and costs against the party and 6 order other appropriate relief.

452.1206. 1. A court may issue an order regarding custodial responsibility under 2 sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 only if the court has jurisdiction under sections 452.700 to 3 452,930.

- 2. If a court has issued a temporary order regarding custodial responsibility pursuant to sections 452.1224 to 452.1244, the residence of the deploying parent is not changed by reason of the deployment for the purposes of sections 452.700 to 452.930 during the deployment.
- 3. If a court has issued a permanent order regarding custodial responsibility before notice of deployment and the parents modify that order temporarily by agreement pursuant to sections 452.1214 to 452.1222, the residence of the deploying 10 parent is not changed by reason of the deployment for the purposes of sections 452.700 12 to 452.930.
  - 4. If a court in another state has issued a temporary order regarding custodial responsibility as a result of impending or current deployment, the residence of the deploying parent is not changed by reason of the deployment for the purposes of sections 452.700 to 452.930.
- 17 5. This section does not prevent a court from exercising temporary emergency 18 jurisdiction under sections 452.700 to 452.930.
- 452.1208. 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4 of this section and 2 subject to subsection 3 of this section, a deploying parent shall notify in a record the 3 other parent of a pending deployment not later than seven days after receiving notice of 4 deployment unless reasonably prevented from doing so by the circumstances of service. 5 If the circumstances of service prevent giving notification within the seven days, the deploying parent shall give the notification as soon as reasonably possible.
- 7 2. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 4 of this section and subject to 8 subsection 3 of this section, each parent shall provide in a record the other parent with a plan for fulfilling that parent's share of custodial responsibility during deployment.

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- 10 Each parent shall provide the plan as soon as reasonably possible after notification of deployment is given under subsection 1 of this section. 11
- 3. If a court order currently in effect prohibits disclosure of the address or contact information of the other parent, notification of deployment under subsection 1 13 14 of this section, or notification of a plan for custodial responsibility during deployment under subsection 2 of this section, may be made only to the issuing court. If the address 15 of the other parent is available to the issuing court, the court shall forward the notification to the other parent. The court shall keep confidential the address or contact information of the other parent.
  - 4. Notification in a record under subsection 1 or 2 of this section is not required if the parents are living in the same residence and both parents have actual notice of the deployment or plan.
  - 5. In a proceeding regarding custodial responsibility, a court may consider the reasonableness of a parent's efforts to comply with this section.
- 452.1210. 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2 of this section, an individual to whom custodial responsibility has been granted during deployment pursuant to sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 or sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 shall notify 4 the deploying parent and any other individual with custodial responsibility of a child of 5 any change of the individual's mailing address or residence until the grant is terminated. The individual shall provide the notice to any court that has issued a custody or child support order concerning the child which is in effect.
- 2. If a court order currently in effect prohibits disclosure of the address or 9 contact information of an individual to whom custodial responsibility has been granted, a notification under subsection 1 of this section may be made only to the court that issued the order. The court shall keep confidential the mailing address or residence of the individual to whom custodial responsibility has been granted.
- 452.1212. In a proceeding for custodial responsibility of a child of a service 2 member, a court may not consider a parent's past deployment or possible future deployment in itself in determining the best interest of the child but may consider any 3 significant impact on the best interest of the child of the parent's past or possible future 5 deployment.
- 452.1214. 1. The parents of a child may enter into a temporary agreement under 2 sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 granting custodial responsibility during deployment.
  - 2. An agreement under subsection 1 of this section must be:
- (1) In writing; and 4
- 5 (2) Signed by both parents and any nonparent to whom custodial responsibility is granted.

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- 3. Subject to subsection 4 of this section, an agreement under subsection 1 of this section, if feasible, must: 8
- (1) Identify the destination, duration, and conditions of the deployment that is the basis for the agreement; 10
- 11 (2) Specify the allocation of caretaking authority among the deploying parent, 12 the other parent, and any nonparent;
- 13 Specify any decision-making authority that accompanies a grant of 14 caretaking authority;
  - (4) Specify any grant of limited contact to a nonparent;
- 16 (5) If under the agreement custodial responsibility is shared by the other parent 17 and a nonparent, or by other nonparents, provide a process to resolve any dispute that may arise;
  - (6) Specify the frequency, duration, and means, including electronic means, by which the deploying parent will have contact with the child, any role to be played by the other parent in facilitating the contact, and the allocation of any costs of contact;
- 22 (7) Specify the contact between the deploying parent and child during the time 23 the deploying parent is on leave or is otherwise available;
  - (8) Acknowledge that any party's child-support obligation cannot be modified by the agreement, and that changing the terms of the obligation during deployment requires modification in the appropriate court;
  - (9) Provide that the agreement will terminate according to the procedures under sections 452.1246 to 452.1252 after the deploying parent returns from deployment; and
  - (10) If the agreement must be filed pursuant to section 452.1222, specify which parent is required to file the agreement.
  - 4. The omission of any of the items specified in subsection 3 of this section does not invalidate an agreement under this section.
- 452.1216. 1. An agreement under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 is temporary 2 and terminates pursuant to sections 452.1246 to 452.1252 after the deploying parent 3 returns from deployment, unless the agreement has been terminated before that time by 4 court order or modification under section 452.1218. The agreement does not create an 5 independent, continuing right to caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact in an individual to whom custodial responsibility is given.
- 2. A nonparent who has caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact by an agreement under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 has standing to enforce the agreement until it has been terminated by court order, by modification 10 under section 452.1218, or under sections 452.1246 to 452.1252.

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- 452.1218. 1. By mutual consent, the parents of a child may modify an agreement regarding custodial responsibility made pursuant to sections 452.1214 to 452.1222.
  - 2. If an agreement is modified under subsection 1 of this section before deployment of a deploying parent, the modification must be in writing and signed by both parents and any nonparent who will exercise custodial responsibility under the modified agreement.
- 3. If an agreement is modified under subsection 1 of this section during deployment of a deploying parent, the modification must be agreed to in a record by both parents and any nonparent who will exercise custodial responsibility under the modified agreement. 10
- 452.1220. A deploying parent, by power of attorney, may delegate all or part of custodial responsibility to an adult nonparent for the period of deployment if no other 3 parent possesses custodial responsibility under law of this state other than sections 4 452.1200 to 452.1258, or if a court order currently in effect prohibits contact between 5 the child and the other parent. The deploying parent may revoke the power of attorney by signing a revocation of the power.
- 452.1222. An agreement or power of attorney under sections 452.1214 to 2 452.1222 must be filed within a reasonable time with any court that has entered an order on custodial responsibility or child support that is in effect concerning the child 4 who is the subject of the agreement or power. The case number and heading of the pending case concerning custodial responsibility or child support must be provided to the court with the agreement or power.
  - 452.1224. In sections 452.1224 to 452.1244, "close and substantial relationship" means a relationship in which a significant bond exists between a child and a nonparent.
- 452.1226. 1. After a deploying parent receives notice of deployment and until the deployment terminates, a court may issue a temporary order granting custodial responsibility unless prohibited by the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act, 50 U.S.C. 4 Appendix Sections 521 and 522. A court may not issue a permanent order granting 5 custodial responsibility without the consent of the deploying parent.
- 2. At any time after a deploying parent receives notice of deployment, either 6 parent may file a motion regarding custodial responsibility of a child during The motion must be filed in a pending proceeding for custodial responsibility in a court with jurisdiction under section 452.1206 or, if there is no pending proceeding in a court with jurisdiction under section 452.1206, in a new action 10 11 for granting custodial responsibility during deployment.

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452.1228. If a motion to grant custodial responsibility is filed under subsection 2 2 of section 452.1226 before a deploying parent deploys, the court shall conduct an 3 expedited hearing.

452.1230. In a proceeding under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244, a party or 2 witness who is not reasonably available to appear personally may appear, provide 3 testimony, and present evidence by electronic means unless the court finds good cause to 4 require a personal appearance.

452.1232. In a proceeding for a grant of custodial responsibility pursuant to sections 452.1224 to 452.1244, the following rules apply:

- (1) A prior judicial order designating custodial responsibility in the event of 4 deployment is binding on the court unless the circumstances meet the requirements of 5 law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 for modifying a judicial order 6 regarding custodial responsibility;
- (2) The court shall enforce a prior written agreement between the parents for 8 designating custodial responsibility in the event of deployment, including an agreement 9 executed under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222, unless the court finds that the agreement 10 is contrary to the best interest of the child.
- 452.1234. 1. On motion of a deploying parent and in accordance with law of this 2 state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258, if it is in the best interest of the child, a 3 court may grant caretaking authority to a nonparent who is an adult family member of 4 the child or an adult with whom the child has a close and substantial relationship.
- 2. Unless a grant of caretaking authority to a nonparent under subsection 1 of 6 this section is agreed to by the other parent, the grant is limited to an amount of time not greater than:
- (1) The amount of time granted to the deploying parent under a permanent 9 custody order, but the court may add unusual travel time necessary to transport the child; or
  - (2) In the absence of a permanent custody order that is currently in effect, the amount of time that the deploying parent habitually cared for the child before being notified of deployment, but the court may add unusual travel time necessary to transport the child.
- 3. A court may grant part of a deploying parent's decision-making authority, if 16 the deploying parent is unable to exercise that authority, to a nonparent who is an adult family member of the child or an adult with whom the child has a close and substantial relationship. If a court grants the authority to a nonparent, the court shall specify the decision-making powers granted, including decisions regarding the child's education, religious training, health care, extracurricular activities, and travel.

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- 452.1236. On motion of a deploying parent, and in accordance with law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258, unless the court finds that the contact 3 would be contrary to the best interest of the child, a court shall grant limited contact to a 4 nonparent who is a family member of the child or an individual with whom the child has 5 a close and substantial relationship.
- 452.1238. 1. A grant of authority under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 is temporary and terminates under sections 452.1246 to 452.1252 after the return from 3 deployment of the deploying parent, unless the grant has been terminated before that 4 time by court order. The grant does not create an independent, continuing right to 5 caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact in an individual to whom it is granted.
  - 2. A nonparent granted caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 has standing to enforce the grant until it is terminated by court order or under sections 452.1246 to 452.1252.
- 452.1240. 1. An order granting custodial responsibility under sections 452.1224 2 to 452.1244 must:
  - (1) Designate the order as temporary; and
- 4 (2) Identify to the extent feasible the destination, duration, and conditions of the deployment. 5
  - 2. If applicable, an order for custodial responsibility under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 must:
- 8 (1) Specify the allocation of caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact among the deploying parent, the other parent, and any nonparent; 9
  - If the order divides caretaking or decision-making authority between individuals, or grants caretaking authority to one individual and limited contact to another, provide a process to resolve any dispute that may arise;
- (3) Provide for liberal communication between the deploying parent and the 14 child during deployment, including through electronic means, unless contrary to the best interest of the child, and allocate any costs of communications;
- 16 (4) Provide for liberal contact between the deploying parent and the child during 17 the time the deploying parent is on leave or otherwise available, unless contrary to the best interest of the child; 18
- 19 (5) Provide for reasonable contact between the deploying parent and the child after return from deployment until the temporary order is terminated, even if the time 20 21 of contact exceeds the time the deploying parent spent with the child before entry of the 22 temporary order; and

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- 23 (6) Provide that the order will terminate pursuant to sections 452.1246 to 24 452.1252 after the deploying parent returns from deployment.
  - 452.1242. If a court has issued an order granting caretaking authority under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244, or an agreement granting caretaking authority has been executed under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222, the court may enter a temporary order for child support consistent with law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 if the court has jurisdiction under sections 454.1500 to 454.1730.
  - 452.1244. 1. Except for an order under section 452.1232, except as otherwise provided in subsection 2 of this section, and consistent with the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act, 50 U.S.C. Appendix Sections 521 and 522, on motion of a deploying or other parent or any nonparent to whom caretaking authority, decision-making authority, or limited contact has been granted, the court may modify or terminate the grant if the modification or termination is consistent with sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 and it is in the best interest of the child. A modification is temporary and terminates pursuant to sections 452.1246 to 452.1252 after the deploying parent returns from deployment, unless the grant has been terminated before that time by court order.
- 2. On motion of a deploying parent, the court shall terminate a grant of limited contact.
  - 452.1246. 1. At any time after return from deployment, a temporary agreement granting custodial responsibility under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 may be terminated by an agreement to terminate signed by the deploying parent and the other parent.
  - 2. A temporary agreement under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 granting custodial responsibility terminates:
  - (1) If an agreement to terminate under subsection 1 of this section specifies a date for termination, on that date; or
  - (2) If the agreement to terminate does not specify a date, on the date the agreement to terminate is signed by the deploying parent and the other parent.
  - 3. In the absence of an agreement under subsection 1 of this section to terminate, a temporary agreement granting custodial responsibility terminates under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 sixty days after the deploying parent gives notice to the other parent that the deploying parent returned from deployment.
- 4. If a temporary agreement granting custodial responsibility was filed with a court pursuant to section 452.1222, an agreement to terminate the temporary agreement also must be filed with that court within a reasonable time after the signing of the agreement. The case number and heading of the case concerning custodial responsibility or child support must be provided to the court with the agreement to terminate.

452.1248. At any time after a deploying parent returns from deployment, the deploying parent and the other parent may file with the court an agreement to terminate a temporary order for custodial responsibility issued under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244. After an agreement has been filed, the court shall issue an order terminating the temporary order effective on the date specified in the agreement. If a date is not specified, the order is effective immediately.

452.1250. After a deploying parent returns from deployment until a temporary agreement or order for custodial responsibility established under sections 452.1214 to 452.1222 or sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 is terminated, the court shall issue a temporary order granting the deploying parent reasonable contact with the child unless it is contrary to the best interest of the child, even if the time of contact exceeds the time the deploying parent spent with the child before deployment.

- 452.1252. 1. If an agreement between the parties to terminate a temporary order for custodial responsibility under sections 452.1224 to 452.1244 has not been filed, the order terminates sixty days after the deploying parent gives notice to the other parent and any nonparent granted custodial responsibility that the deploying parent has returned from deployment.
- 2. A proceeding seeking to prevent termination of a temporary order for custodial responsibility is governed by law of this state other than sections 452.1200 to 452.1258.
- 452.1254. In applying and construing sections 452.1200 to 452.1258, 2 consideration must be given to the need to promote uniformity of the law with 3 respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.
- 452.1256. Sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 modify, limit, or supersede the Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7001 et seq., but do not modify, limit, or supersede Section 101(c) of that act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7001(c), or authorize electronic delivery of any of the notices described in
- 5 Section 103(b) of that act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7003(b).

452.1258. Sections 452.1200 to 452.1258 do not affect the validity of a temporary court order concerning custodial responsibility during deployment which was entered before August 28, 2024.

453.700. Sections 453.700 to 453.740 may be cited as the "Uniform Unregulated 2 Child Custody Transfer Act".

453.702. In sections 453.700 to 453.740:

2 (1) "Child" means an unemancipated individual under eighteen years of age;

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- 3 (2) "Child-placing agency" means a person with authority under other law of 4 this state to identify or place a child for adoption. The term does not include a parent of 5 the child;
- 6 (3) "Custody" means the exercise of physical care and supervision of a child;
- 7 (4) "Intercountry adoption" means an adoption or placement for adoption of a 8 child who resides in a foreign country at the time of adoption or placement. The term 9 includes an adoption finalized in the child's country of residence or in a state;
- 10 (5) "Parent" means an individual recognized as a parent under other law of this 11 state:
- 12 (6) "Person" means an individual, estate, business or nonprofit entity, public 13 corporation, government or governmental subdivision, agency, or instrumentality, or 14 other legal entity;
- 15 (7) "Record" means information:
  - (a) Inscribed on a tangible medium; or
- 17 **(b)** Stored in an electronic or other medium and retrievable in perceivable form;
- 18 **(8)** "State" means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any other territory or possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States. The term includes a federally recognized Indian tribe.

453.704. Sections 453.700 to 453.740 do not apply to custody of an Indian child, 2 as defined in Section 4(4) of the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978, 25 U.S.C. Section 1903(4), as amended, to the extent custody is governed by the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978, 25 U.S.C. Sections 1901 through 1963, as amended.

453.706. In sections 453.706 to 453.716:

- 2 (1) "Guardian" means a person recognized as a guardian under other law of this state;
- 4 (2) "Intermediary" means a person that assists or facilitates a transfer of 5 custody of a child, whether or not for compensation.

453.708. Sections 453.706 to 453.716 do not apply to a transfer of custody of a child by a parent or guardian of the child to:

- (1) A parent of the child;
- (2) A stepparent of the child;
- (3) An adult who is related to the child by blood, marriage, or adoption;
- (4) An adult who, at the time of the transfer, had a close relationship with the child or the parent or guardian of the child for a substantial period, and whom the parent or guardian reasonably believes, at the time of the transfer, to be a fit custodian of the child;

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- 10 (5) An Indian custodian, as defined in Section 4(6) of the Indian Child Welfare 11 Act of 1978, 25 U.S.C. Section 1903(6), as amended, of the child; or
- 12 (6) A member of the child's customary family unit recognized by the child's 13 indigenous group under other law of this state.
- 453.710. 1. Except as provided in subsection 2 of this section, a parent or guardian of a child or an individual with whom a child has been placed for adoption may not transfer custody of the child to another person with the intent, at the time of the transfer, to abandon the rights and responsibilities concerning the child.
- 2. A parent or guardian of a child or an individual with whom a child has been placed for adoption may transfer custody of the child to another person with the intent, at the time of the transfer, to abandon the rights and responsibilities concerning the child only through:
  - (1) Adoption or guardianship;
- 10 (2) Judicial award of custody;
- 11 (3) Placement by or through a child-placing agency;
- 12 (4) Other judicial or tribal action; or
- 13 (5) Safe place for newborns act of 2002 under section 210.950.
- 3. A person may not receive custody of a child, or act as an intermediary in a transfer of custody of a child, if the person knows or reasonably should know the transfer violates subsection 1 of this section. This prohibition does not apply if the person, as soon as practicable after the transfer, notifies the children's division of the transfer or takes appropriate action to establish custody under subsection 2 of this section.
- 20 4. Violation of this section is a class B misdemeanor.
- 5. Violation of subsection 1 of this section is not established solely because a parent or guardian that transfers custody of a child does not regain custody.
- 453.712. 1. If the children's division has a reasonable basis to believe that a person has transferred or will transfer custody of a child in violation of subsection 1 of section 453.710, the children's division may conduct a home visit as provided by other law of this state and take appropriate action to protect the welfare of the child.
  - 2. If the children's division conducts a home visit for a child adopted or placed through an intercountry adoption, the children's divisions shall:
  - (1) Prepare a report on the welfare and plan for permanent placement of the child; and
    - (2) Provide a copy to the United States Department of State.
- 3. Sections 453.700 to 453.740 do not prevent the children's division from taking appropriate action under other law of this state.

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- 453.714. 1. A person may not solicit or advertise to:
- 2 (1) Identify a person to which to make a transfer of custody in violation of 3 subsection 1 of section 453.710;
- 4 (2) Identify a child for a transfer of custody in violation of subsection 3 of section 5 453.710; or
- 6 (3) Act as an intermediary in a transfer of custody in violation of subsection 3 of section 453.710.
- 8 2. Violation of this section is a class B misdemeanor.
- 453.716. A law enforcement agency may investigate a possible violation of 2 sections 453.706 to 453.716 and take legal action as provided by law of this state.
- 453.718. In sections 453.718 to 453.732, "prospective adoptive parent" means an individual who has been approved or permitted under other law of this state to adopt a child.
- 453.720. Sections 453.718 to 453.732 apply to placement for adoption of a child 2 who:
- 3 (1) Has been or is in foster or institutional care;
- 4 (2) Previously has been adopted in a state;
- 5 (3) Has been or is being adopted under the law of a foreign country;
- 6 (4) Has come or is coming to a state from a foreign country to be adopted; or
- 7 (5) Is not a citizen of the United States.
- 453.722. Within a reasonable time before a child-placing agency places a child for adoption with a prospective adoptive parent, the agency shall provide or cause to be provided to the prospective adoptive parent general adoption information. The information must address:
  - (1) Possible physical, mental, emotional, and behavioral issues concerning:
- 6 (a) Identity, loss, and trauma that a child might experience before, during, or 7 after adoption; and
  - (b) A child leaving familiar ties and surroundings;
- 9 (2) The effect that access to resources, including health insurance, may have on 0 the ability of an adoptive parent to meet the needs of a child;
- 11 (3) Causes of disruption of an adoptive placement or dissolution of an adoption 12 and resources available to help avoid disruption or dissolution; and
  - (4) Prohibitions under sections 453.710 and 453.714.
- 453.724. 1. Except as prohibited by other law of this state, within a reasonable time before a child-placing agency places a child for adoption with a prospective adoptive parent, the agency shall provide or cause to be provided to the prospective adoptive parent information specific to the child that is known to or reasonably

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- obtainable by the agency and material to the prospective adoptive parent's informed decision to adopt the child. The information must include:
- 7 The child's family, cultural, racial, religious, ethnic, linguistic, and educational background;
  - (2) The child's physical, mental, emotional, and behavioral health;
- 10 (3) Circumstances that might adversely affect the child's physical, mental, 11 emotional, or behavioral health;
  - (4) The child's medical history, including immunizations;
  - (5) The medical history of the child's genetic parents and siblings;
- 14 (6) The history of an adoptive or out-of-home placement of the child and the 15 reason the adoption or placement ended;
  - (7) The child's United States immigration status;
  - Medical, therapeutic, and educational resources, including languageacquisition training, available to the adoptive parent and child after placement for adoption or adoption to assist in responding effectively to physical, mental, emotional, or behavioral health issues: and
- 21 (9) Available records relevant to the information in subdivisions (1) through (8) 22 of this subsection.
  - 2. If, before an adoption is finalized, additional information under subsection 1 of this section that is material to a prospective adoptive parent's informed decision to adopt the child becomes known to or reasonably obtainable by the child-placing agency, the agency shall provide the information to the prospective adoptive parent.
  - 3. If, after an adoption is finalized, additional information under subsection 1 of this section becomes known to the child-placing agency, the agency shall make a reasonable effort to provide the information to the adoptive parent.
- 453.726. 1. A child-placing agency placing a child for adoption shall provide or cause to be provided to the prospective adoptive parent guidance and instruction specific to the child to help prepare the parent to respond effectively to needs of the child 4 that are known to or reasonably ascertainable by the agency.
- 2. The guidance and instruction under subsection 1 of this section must address, 6 if applicable:
  - (1) The potential effect on the child of:
  - (a) A previous adoption or out-of-home placement;
- 9 (b) Multiple previous adoptions or out-of-home placements;
- 10 (c) Trauma, insecure attachment, fetal alcohol exposure, or malnutrition;
- 11 (d) Neglect, abuse, drug exposure, or similar adversity;
- 12 (e) Separation from a sibling or significant caregiver; and

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- 13 (f) A difference in ethnicity, race, or cultural identity between the child and the 14 prospective adoptive parent or other child of the parent;
- 15 (2) Information available from the federal government on the process for the child to acquire United States citizenship; and
- 17 (3) Any other matter the child-placing agency considers material to the 18 adoption.
- 3. The guidance and instruction under subsection 1 of this section must be provided:
- 21 (1) For adoption of a child residing in the United States, a reasonable time before 22 the adoption is finalized; or
  - (2) For an intercountry adoption, in accordance with federal law.
  - 453.728. On request of a child who was placed for adoption or the child's adoptive parent, the child-placing agency placing the child or the children's division shall provide information about how to obtain financial assistance or support services:
- 4 (1) To assist the child or parent to respond effectively to adjustment, behavioral 5 health, and other challenges; and
  - (2) To help preserve the placement or adoption.
  - 453.730. 1. A law enforcement agency may investigate an allegation that a child-placing agency has failed to comply with sections 453.718 to 453.732 and commence an action for injunctive or other relief or initiate an administrative proceeding against the child-placing agency to enforce sections 453.718 to 453.732.
- 2. The children's division may initiate a proceeding to determine whether a child-placing agency has failed to comply with sections 453.718 to 453.732. If the children's divisions finds that the child-placing agency has failed to comply, the children's division may suspend or revoke the agency's license or take other action permitted by law of this state.
- 453.732. The children's division may adopt rules under chapter 536 to 2 implement sections 453.722, 453.724, and 453.728.
- 453.734. In applying and construing this uniform act, a court shall consider the promotion of uniformity of the law among jurisdictions that enact it.
- 453.736. Sections 453.700 to 453.740 modify, limit, or supersede the Electronic
- 2 Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7001 et seq., as
- 3 amended, but do not modify, limit, or supersede 15 U.S.C. Section 7001(c), or authorize
- 4 electronic delivery of any of the notices described in 15 U.S.C. Section 7003(b).
  - 453.738. 1. Sections 453.706 to 453.716 apply to:
- 2 (1) A transfer of custody on or after August 28, 2024; and
- 3 (2) Soliciting or advertising on or after August 28, 2024.

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- 2. Sections 453.718 to 453.732 apply to placement of a child for adoption more than sixty days after August 28, 2024.
- 453.740. If a provision of sections 453.700 to 453.740 or its application to a person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect another provision or application that can be given effect without the invalid provision.
- 453.742. Sections 453.700 to 453.740 supplement the provisions under this chapter and chapter 210 for the transfer of custody of a child. To the extent the provisions under this chapter or chapter 210 are inconsistent with sections 453.700 to 453.740, the provisions of sections 453.700 to 453.740 control regarding the transfer of custody of a child.
- 454.1050. 1. This section shall be known and may be cited as "Bentley and 2 Mason's Law".
- 2. The court shall order a defendant convicted of the offense of driving while intoxicated to pay restitution for a child whose parent or guardian died as a result of such offense.
  - 3. Notwithstanding any provision of law under chapter 559 relating to restitution, and subject to subsection 4 of this section, the court shall determine a monthly amount to be paid for the support of the child until the child reaches eighteen years of age or has graduated from high school, whichever is later.
  - 4. The defendant shall not be required to pay restitution under this section to an individual who is nineteen years of age or older.
  - 5. The court shall order the defendant to pay restitution in an amount that is reasonable and necessary to support the child, considering all relevant factors, including:
    - (1) The financial needs and resources of the child;
- 16 (2) The financial needs and resources of the surviving parent or guardian or other current guardian of the child, including the state if the state is the guardian;
  - (3) The standard of living to which the child is accustomed;
- 19 (4) The physical and emotional condition of the child and the child's educational 20 needs;
  - (5) The child's physical and legal custody arrangements;
- 22 (6) The reasonable work-related child care expenses of the surviving parent or 23 guardian or other current guardian, if applicable; and
  - (7) The financial resources of the defendant.
- 25 **6.** The order of restitution under this section shall require restitution payments 26 to be:

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- 27 (1) Delivered in the manner described under subsection 7 of this section, as 28 appropriate; and
  - (2) Directed to the parent or guardian of the child or the state, as applicable.
    - 7. The order of restitution under this section shall require the defendant to:
- 31 (1) Make restitution directly to the person or agency that will accept and 32 forward restitution payments to the victim or other person eligible for restitution under 33 this section; or
  - (2) Deliver the amount due as restitution to the division of probation or parole or to the department of corrections for transfer to the victim or person or state, as appropriate.
  - 8. If a defendant ordered to pay restitution under this section is unable to make the required restitution payments because the defendant is confined or imprisoned in a correctional facility, the defendant shall begin payments no later than the first anniversary of the date of the defendant's release from the facility. The defendant may enter into a payment plan to address any arrearage that exists on the date of the defendant's release. The defendant shall pay all arrearages regardless of whether the restitution payments were scheduled to terminate while the defendant was confined or imprisoned in the correctional facility.
  - 9. The amount of restitution paid under this section shall be deducted from any civil judgment against the defendant.
  - 10. A restitution order issued under this section may be enforced by the office of the attorney general, or by a person or a parent or guardian of the person named in the order to receive the restitution, in the same manner as a judgment in a civil action.
  - 455.010. As used in this chapter, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the following terms shall mean:
  - (1) "Abuse", includes but is not limited to the occurrence of any of the following acts, attempts or threats against a person who may be protected pursuant to this chapter, except abuse shall not include abuse inflicted on a child by accidental means by an adult household member or discipline of a child, including spanking, in a reasonable manner:
- 7 (a) "Abusing a pet", purposely or knowingly causing, attempting to cause, or 8 threatening to cause physical injury to a pet with the intent to control, punish, intimidate, or 9 distress the petitioner;
- 10 (b) "Assault", purposely or knowingly placing or attempting to place another in fear 11 of physical harm;
- 12 (c) "Battery", purposely or knowingly causing physical harm to another with or 13 without a deadly weapon;

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- (d) "Coercion", compelling another by force or threat of force to engage in conduct 14 15 from which the latter has a right to abstain or to abstain from conduct in which the person has 16 a right to engage;
  - (e) "Harassment", engaging in a purposeful or knowing course of conduct involving more than one incident that alarms or causes distress to an adult or child and serves no legitimate purpose. The course of conduct must be such as would cause a reasonable adult or child to suffer substantial emotional distress and must actually cause substantial emotional distress to the petitioner or child. Such conduct might include, but is not limited to:
    - a. Following another about in a public place or places;
  - b. Peering in the window or lingering outside the residence of another; but does not include constitutionally protected activity;
  - (f) "Sexual assault", causing or attempting to cause another to engage involuntarily in any sexual act by force, threat of force, duress, or without that person's consent;
  - "Unlawful imprisonment", holding, confining, detaining or abducting another person against that person's will;
- 29 (2) "Adult", any person [seventeen] eighteen years of age or older or otherwise 30 emancipated;
- (3) "Child", any person under [seventeen] eighteen years of age unless otherwise 31 emancipated; 32
  - (4) "Court", the circuit or associate circuit judge or a family court commissioner;
  - (5) "Domestic violence", abuse or stalking committed by a family or household member, as such terms are defined in this section;
  - (6) "Ex parte order of protection", an order of protection issued by the court before the respondent has received notice of the petition or an opportunity to be heard on it;
- (7) "Family" or "household member", spouses, former spouses, any person related by blood or marriage, persons who are presently residing together or have resided together in the 39 past, any person who is or has been in a continuing social relationship of a romantic or 40 intimate nature with the victim, and anyone who has a child in common regardless of whether they have been married or have resided together at any time;
- (8) "Full order of protection", an order of protection issued after a hearing on the record where the respondent has received notice of the proceedings and has had an 44 opportunity to be heard;
- 46 (9) "Order of protection", either an ex parte order of protection or a full order of 47 protection;
  - (10) "Pending", exists or for which a hearing date has been set;
- 49 (11) "Pet", a living creature maintained by a household member for companionship and not for commercial purposes;

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- 51 (12) "Petitioner", a family or household member who has been a victim of domestic 52 violence, or any person who has been the victim of stalking or sexual assault, or a person 53 filing on behalf of a child pursuant to section 455.503 who has filed a verified petition 54 pursuant to the provisions of section 455.020 or section 455.505;
  - (13) "Respondent", the family or household member alleged to have committed an act of domestic violence, or person alleged to have committed an act of stalking or sexual assault, against whom a verified petition has been filed or a person served on behalf of a child pursuant to section 455.503;
    - (14) "Sexual assault", as defined under subdivision (1) of this section;
  - (15) "Stalking", is when any person purposely engages in an unwanted course of conduct that causes alarm to another person, or a person who resides together in the same household with the person seeking the order of protection when it is reasonable in that person's situation to have been alarmed by the conduct. As used in this subdivision:
    - (a) "Alarm", to cause fear of danger of physical harm; and
- (b) "Course of conduct", two or more acts that serve no legitimate purpose including, 65 66 but not limited to, acts in which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through a third party 67 follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to a person by any action, 68 method, or device.
- 455.035. 1. Upon the filing of a verified petition pursuant to sections 455.010 to 455.085 and for good cause shown in the petition, the court may immediately issue an ex parte order of protection. An immediate and present danger of domestic violence to the petitioner or the child on whose behalf the petition is filed shall constitute good cause for purposes of this section. An ex parte order of protection entered by the court shall take effect when entered and shall remain in effect until there is valid service of process and a hearing is held on the motion. The court shall deny the ex parte order and dismiss the petition if the petitioner is not authorized to seek relief pursuant to section 455.020. 8
- 2. Failure to serve an ex parte order of protection on the respondent shall not affect 10 the validity or enforceability of such order. If the respondent is less than [seventeen] eighteen years of age, unless otherwise emancipated, service of process shall be made upon a custodial parent or guardian of the respondent, or upon a guardian ad litem appointed by the court, requiring that the person appear and bring the respondent before the court at the time and place stated.
- 15 3. If an ex parte order is entered and the respondent is less than [seventeen] eighteen 16 years of age, the court shall transfer the case to juvenile court for a hearing on a full order of 17 protection. The court shall appoint a guardian ad litem for any such respondent not represented by a parent or guardian. 18

- 455.513. 1. The court may immediately issue an ex parte order of protection upon the filing of a verified petition under sections 455.500 to 455.538, for good cause shown in the petition, and upon finding that:
- 4 (1) No prior order regarding custody involving the respondent and the child is pending or has been made; or
  - (2) The respondent is less than [seventeen] eighteen years of age.

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- 8 An immediate and present danger of domestic violence, including danger to the child's pet,
- stalking, or sexual assault to a child shall constitute good cause for purposes of this section.
- An ex parte order of protection entered by the court shall be in effect until the time of the
- hearing. The court shall deny the ex parte order and dismiss the petition if the petitioner is not 11
- authorized to seek relief pursuant to section 455.505. 12
- 13 2. Upon the entry of the ex parte order of protection, the court shall enter its order appointing a guardian ad litem or court-appointed special advocate to represent the child 15 victim.
- 16 3. If the allegations in the petition would give rise to jurisdiction under section 17 211.031, the court may direct the children's division to conduct an investigation and to provide appropriate services. The division shall submit a written investigative report to the court and to the juvenile officer within thirty days of being ordered to do so. The report shall 20 be made available to the parties and the guardian ad litem or court-appointed special 21 advocate.
- 4. If the allegations in the petition would give rise to jurisdiction under section 211.031 because the respondent is less than [seventeen] eighteen years of age, the court may 23 24 issue an ex parte order and shall transfer the case to juvenile court for a hearing on a full order of protection. Service of process shall be made pursuant to section 455.035.
  - 487.110. The uniform child custody jurisdiction and enforcement act, as enacted in sections [452.440 to 452.550] 452.700 to 452.930, shall apply to all child custody proceedings, as defined in section 452.705, in the family court.
  - 487.200. 1. As used in this section, "medication-assisted treatment" means the use of pharmacological medications, in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies, to provide a whole patient approach to the treatment of substance use disorders.
- 4 2. If a family court participant requires treatment for opioid or other substance misuse or dependence, a family court shall not prohibit such participant from participating in and 5 receiving medication-assisted treatment under the care of a physician licensed in this state to practice medicine. A family court participant shall not be required to refrain from using medication-assisted treatment as a term or condition of successful completion of the family court program.

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- 3. A family court participant assigned to a treatment program for opioid or other substance misuse or dependence shall not be in violation of the terms or conditions of the family court on the basis of his or her participation in medication-assisted treatment under the care of a physician licensed in this state to practice medicine.
  - 4. A family court shall not require a participant utilizing medication-assisted treatment as part of treatment for opioid or other substance misuse or dependence to cease utilizing the treatment or to otherwise complete the treatment prior to reunification with his or her child.
- 491.075. 1. A statement made by a child under the age of [fourteen] eighteen, or a vulnerable person, relating to an offense under chapter 565, 566, 568 or 573, performed by another, not otherwise admissible by statute or court rule, is admissible in evidence in criminal proceedings in the courts of this state as substantive evidence to prove the truth of the matter asserted if:
  - (1) The court finds, in a hearing conducted outside the presence of the jury that the time, content and circumstances of the statement provide sufficient indicia of reliability; and
    - (2) (a) The child or vulnerable person testifies at the proceedings; or
    - (b) The child or vulnerable person is unavailable as a witness; or
  - (c) The child or vulnerable person is otherwise physically available as a witness but the court finds that the significant emotional or psychological trauma which would result from testifying in the personal presence of the defendant makes the child or vulnerable person unavailable as a witness at the time of the criminal proceeding.
  - 2. Notwithstanding subsection 1 of this section or any provision of law or rule of evidence requiring corroboration of statements, admissions or confessions of the defendant, and notwithstanding any prohibition of hearsay evidence, a statement by a child when under the age of [fourteen] eighteen, or a vulnerable person, who is alleged to be victim of an offense under chapter 565, 566, 568 or 573 is sufficient corroboration of a statement, admission or confession regardless of whether or not the child or vulnerable person is available to testify regarding the offense.
  - 3. A statement may not be admitted under this section unless the prosecuting attorney makes known to the accused or the accused's counsel his or her intention to offer the statement and the particulars of the statement sufficiently in advance of the proceedings to provide the accused or the accused's counsel with a fair opportunity to prepare to meet the statement.
  - 4. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the admissibility of statements, admissions or confessions otherwise admissible by law.
- 5. For the purposes of this section, "vulnerable person" shall mean a person who, as a result of an inadequately developed or impaired intelligence or a psychiatric disorder that

- materially affects ability to function, lacks the mental capacity to consent, or whose developmental level does not exceed that of an ordinary child of [fourteen] seventeen years of age.
- 491.641. 1. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Pretrial Witness Protection Services Fund", which shall consist of moneys collected under this section. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and money in the fund shall be used solely by the department of public safety for the purposes of witness protection services pursuant to this section.
  - (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the general revenue fund.
  - (3) The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.
  - 2. Any law enforcement agency and any prosecuting or circuit attorney's office may provide for the security of witnesses, potential witnesses, and their immediate families in criminal proceedings instituted or investigations pending against a person alleged to have engaged in a violation of state law. Providing for witnesses may include provision of housing facilities and for the health, safety, and welfare of such witnesses and their immediate families, if testimony by such a witness might subject the witness or a member of his or her immediate family to danger of bodily injury, and may continue so long as such danger exists. Subject to appropriations from the general assembly for the purposes provided for in this section, funds may be appropriated from the pretrial witness protection services fund.
  - 3. The department of public safety may authorize funds to be disbursed to law enforcement agencies **and prosecuting or circuit attorney's offices** for the purchase, rental, or modification of protected housing facilities for the purpose of this section. The law enforcement agency **or prosecuting or circuit attorney's office** may contract with any department of federal or state government to obtain or to provide the facilities or services to carry out this section.
  - 4. The department of public safety may authorize expenditures for law enforcement agencies **and prosecuting or circuit attorney's offices** to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of witnesses and victims, and the families of such witnesses and victims, whenever testimony from, or a willingness to testify by, such a witness or victim would place the life of such person, or a member of his or her family or household, in jeopardy. [A law enforcement agency shall submit an application to the department of public safety which shall include, but not necessarily be limited to:

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- (1) Statement of conditions which qualify persons for protection; 35
- (2) Precise methods the originating agency will use to provide protection, including 36 37 relocation of persons and reciprocal agreements with other law enforcement agencies;
  - (3) Statement of the projected costs over a specified period of time;
- 39 (4) If the requesting agency expects the person to provide evidence in any court of 40 competent jurisdiction:
  - (a) Brief statement of the anticipated evidence;
  - (b) Certification of a reasonable belief in the person's competency to give evidence;
  - (e) Statement of facts supporting the law enforcement agency's belief in the accuracy of the evidence: and
  - (d) Any offer made in exchange for the person agreeing to give evidence. Law enforcement agencies and prosecuting or circuit attorney's offices seeking reimbursement shall submit an application to be approved by the department of public safety.
  - 5. The application and any associated documents submitted in subsection 4 of this section shall be a closed record and not subject to disclosure under the provisions of chapter 610. Any information contained in the application [, or] and any other documents, which reveals or could reveal the location or address of the individual or individuals who qualify for services under this section shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed by any entity.
- 492.304. 1. In addition to the admissibility of a statement under the provisions of 2 section 492.303, the visual and aural recording of a verbal or nonverbal statement of a child when under the age of [fourteen who is alleged to be a victim of] eighteen, or a vulnerable person, relating to an offense under the provisions of chapter 565, 566 [or], 568, or 573, if performed by another, is admissible into evidence if:
- 6 (1) No attorney for either party was present when the statement was made; except 7 that, for any statement taken at a state-funded child assessment center as provided for in subsection 2 of section 210.001, an attorney representing the state of Missouri in a criminal investigation may, as a member of a multidisciplinary investigation team, observe the taking 10 of such statement, but such attorney shall not be present in the room where the interview is being conducted; 11
- 12 (2) The recording is both visual and aural and is recorded on film or videotape or by other electronic means; 13
- 14 (3) The recording equipment was capable of making an accurate recording, the operator of the equipment was competent, and the recording is accurate and has not been 15 16 altered;
  - (4) The statement was not made in response to questioning calculated to lead the child or vulnerable person to make a particular statement or to act in a particular way;

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- 19 (5) Every voice on the recording is identified;
  - (6) The person conducting the interview of the child or vulnerable person in the recording, or a current employee of a child assessment center if a child was recorded, is present at the proceeding and available to testify or be cross-examined by either party; and
- 23 (7) The defendant or the attorney for the defendant is afforded an opportunity to view 24 the recording before it is offered into evidence.
  - 2. If the child or vulnerable person does not testify at the proceeding, the visual and aural recording of a verbal or nonverbal statement of the child or vulnerable person shall not be admissible under this section unless the recording qualifies for admission under section 491.075.
  - 3. If the visual and aural recording of a verbal or nonverbal statement of a child or vulnerable person is admissible under this section and the child or vulnerable person testifies at the proceeding, it shall be admissible in addition to the testimony of the child or vulnerable person at the proceeding whether or not it repeats or duplicates the child's or vulnerable person's testimony.
- 34 As used in this section, a nonverbal statement shall be defined as any demonstration of the child or vulnerable person by his or her actions, facial expressions, 35 36 demonstrations with a doll or other visual aid whether or not this demonstration is accompanied by words. 37
  - 5. For the purposes of this section, "vulnerable person" shall mean a person who, as a result of an inadequately developed or impaired intelligence or a psychiatric disorder that materially affects the ability to function, lacks the mental capacity to consent, or whose developmental level does not exceed that of an ordinary child of seventeen years of age.
- 566.151. 1. A person twenty-one years of age or older commits the offense of enticement of a child if he or she persuades, solicits, coaxes, entices, or lures whether by words, actions or through communication via the internet or any electronic communication, any person who is less than [fifteen] seventeen years of age for the purpose of engaging in 5 sexual conduct.
- 2. It is not a defense to a prosecution for a violation of this section that the other person was a peace officer masquerading as a minor. 7
- 3. Enticement of a child or an attempt to commit enticement of a child is a felony for which the authorized term of imprisonment shall be not less than five years and not more than thirty years. No person convicted under this section shall be eligible for parole, probation, 10 11 conditional release, or suspended imposition or execution of sentence for a period of five calendar years. 12
  - 567.030. 1. A person commits the offense of patronizing prostitution if he or she:

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- 2 (1) Pursuant to a prior understanding, gives something of value to another person as 3 compensation for having engaged in sexual conduct with any person; or
- 4 Gives or agrees to give something of value to another person with the understanding that such person or another person will engage in sexual conduct with any person; or
- 7 (3) Solicits or requests another person to engage in sexual conduct with any person in return for something of value.
  - 2. It shall not be a defense that the person believed that the individual he or she patronized for prostitution was eighteen years of age or older.
  - 3. The offense of patronizing prostitution is a class [B misdemeanor] E felony, unless the individual who the person patronizes is less than eighteen years of age but older than [fourteen] fifteen years of age, in which case patronizing prostitution is a class [E] D felony.
- 14 4. The offense of patronizing prostitution is a class [D] B felony if the individual who the person patronizes is [fourteen] fifteen years of age or younger. Nothing in this section 16 shall preclude the prosecution of an individual for the offenses of:
- 17 (1) Statutory rape in the first degree pursuant to section 566.032;
  - (2) Statutory rape in the second degree pursuant to section 566.034;
- 19 (3) Statutory sodomy in the first degree pursuant to section 566.062; or
- 20 (4) Statutory sodomy in the second degree pursuant to section 566.064.
- 589.700. 1. In addition to any fine imposed for a violation of section 566.203, 2 566.206, 566.209, 566.210, 566.211, or 566.215, the court shall enter a judgment of restitution in the amount specified in this subsection in favor of the state of Missouri, 4 payable to the human trafficking and sexual exploitation fund established under this section, upon a plea of guilty or a finding of guilt for a violation of section 566.203, 566.206, 566.209, 566.210, 566.211, or 566.215. The judgment of restitution shall be in the amount of:
  - (1) Ten thousand dollars per each identified victim of the offense or offenses for which restitution is required under this subsection; and
  - (2) Two thousand five hundred dollars for each county in which such offense or offenses occurred.
- 2. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Human Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation Fund", which shall consist of proceeds from the human trafficking restitution collected for violations of sections 566.203, 566.206, 566.209, 566.210, 566.211, 15 and 566.215. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund and, upon appropriation, moneys in this fund shall be 17 distributed to the county or counties where the human trafficking offense or offenses

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occurred. Upon receipt of moneys from the fund, a county shall allocate the 20 disbursement as follows:

- (1) Ten thousand dollars per each identified victim of the offense or offenses that occurred in the county toward local rehabilitation services for victims of human trafficking including, but not limited to, mental health and substance abuse counseling; general education, including parenting skills; housing relief; vocational training; and employment counseling; and
- (2) Two thousand five hundred dollars toward local efforts to prevent human trafficking including, but not limited to, education programs for persons convicted of human trafficking offenses and increasing the number of local law enforcement members charged with enforcing human trafficking laws.
- 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the general revenue fund.
- 4. The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.
- 590.050. 1. (1) The POST commission shall establish requirements for the 2 continuing education of all peace officers.
- (2) Each peace officer shall be required to receive two hours of sex and human 4 trafficking training consistent with the guidelines established in section 27.170 within 5 the law enforcement continuing education one-year reporting period. The provisions of 6 this subdivision shall become effective on January 1, 2025, and shall expire on December 31, 2029.
- (3) Peace officers who make traffic stops shall be required to receive [three hours] 9 one hour of training within the law enforcement continuing education [three-year] one-year reporting period concerning the prohibition against racial profiling and such training shall promote understanding and respect for racial and cultural differences and the use of effective, noncombative methods for carrying out law enforcement duties in a racially and culturally diverse environment.
  - 2. The director shall license continuing education providers and may probate, suspend and revoke such licenses upon written notice stating the reasons for such action. Any person aggrieved by a decision of the director pursuant to this subsection may appeal as provided in chapter 536.
- 18 3. The costs of continuing law enforcement education shall be reimbursed in part by 19 moneys from the peace officer standards and training commission fund created in section 590.178, subject to availability of funds, except that no such funds shall be used for the

- 21 training of any person not actively commissioned or employed by a county or municipal law
- 22 enforcement agency.
- 4. The director may engage in any activity intended to further the professionalism of
- 24 peace officers through training and education, including the provision of specialized training
- 25 through the department of public safety.

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
