Insulin is a crucial drug for maintaining many diabetic Americans' health by regulating their blood sugar levels. Approximately 38.4 million Americans and 537,000 Missourians suffer from diabetes. Clearly, there is a massive demand in Missouri (and in the USA) for affordable insulin. However, right now, insulin price is a real problem. Simply put, the high cost is harmfully impacting patients. To give some background, on average, a vial of insulin costs \$98.70, but the production cost for each vial is only \$2-4. This high cost contributes to the statistic that 1 in 4 diabetics have reported that the cost of insulin impacts their use of insulin, resulting in insulin rationing. The problem is so substantial that even the American Diabetes Association emphasizes that the cost of insulin has caused 27% of diabetics to choose between insulin and housing. Moving on to the benefits, the main one for reducing insulin co-payments is that everyone would have access to insulin. That increase in accessibility would reduce the number of ER visits due to diabetic ketoacidosis, a condition that results when patients do not have access to insulin. Not to mention, ER visits is a major factor of America's spiraling healthcare costs. As a state, we are not alone in passing insulin copay caps. As of today in the United States. 25 other states have passed bills that reduce the cost of insulin for local state residents (including states like Texas, Illinois, Washington, and more). There have been multiple studies that show how effective this bill has been in those states. Furthermore, some opponents, we realize, will argue that reducing the insulin copay would offset the cost on insurance companies, resulting in higher premiums for all. However, the effect of increased premiums is small. For example, studies have shown in multiple states including Kentucky that there was only a \$0.07 to \$0.24 increase in monthly premiums as a result of a decreased insulin copayment. Overall, the benefits of increasing insulin access are vast and realistically have no downside. Even if health insurance premiums go up a minuscule amount, it is justified to save patient lives by decreasing the copayment, making insulin more affordable for diabetics in Missouri.

The Honorable Kent HadenChair, Healthcare ReformMembers of the Healthcare Reform CommitteeDear Chairman Haden and Members of the Committee: The American Diabetes Association (ADA) is writing to ask your support for House Bill (HB) 1632 by Representative Sean Pouche. HB 1632 caps the total amount of cost sharing that an insured person is required to pay for insulin (under a state regulated plan) at an amount not to exceed \$35 per 30- day period, regardless of the amount or type of insulin needed.Diabetes is an epidemic in the United States and the cost of managing it can be unsustainable. People with diabetes continue to face a crisis. Advances in research and development and technology have been life-changing, but the chemical formulary for insulin has not changed since the 1990s. Missourians with diabetes are sometimes forced to choose between insulin and rent or insulin and food to survive. When people with diabetes are unable to manage the disease and access the insulin they need it increases the risk of developing additional costly and burdensome complications including heart disease, kidney failure, and amputations. As it stands, 25 states and the District of Columbia have passed laws to limit out-of-pocket monthly spending for insulin and as of January 1. 2023, all Medicare beneficiaries will have their out-of-pocket monthly spending for insulin capped at \$35. Between 2002 and 2013 the cost of insulin nearly tripled. When people cannot afford the medication necessary to manage their diabetes, they scale back or forego the care they need to manage their health or are forced to choose between paying for their medication or rent, utilities, and other necessities. Attached please find a fact sheet with some studies that found limiting out-of-pocket monthly spending on insulin either did not impact premiums or if they did, it was described as negligible. This legislation offers a solution to ensure that people with diabetes can afford the medication they need to live. I respectfully ask that you support HB 1632. Written Testimony HB 1632Submitted 1-15-2024House Healthcare Reform CommitteeDear Chairman Haden and Committee Members, Thank you for considering my testimony. House Bill 1632 appears to be a government price-control bill targeting two vitally important prescription medicines: epinephrine autoinjectors to be used in the case of anaphylactic reactions, and injected insulin. Short of normal saline used to resuscitate the trauma victim in shock, or oxygen in a patient with inhalation burns, I cannot imagine any medications any more necessary for the preservation of life. It would be impossible to quantify the threat people would feel if denied these drugs in their time of need.Drug pricing in this country is as far away from a free market system as the other galaxies in the universe are from ours. The distortions in pricing are legion and complex. President Biden has forced this specific price-fixing scheme on us with his so-called Inflation Reduction Act, but the framework was laid by administrations of both parties, over many years. The responsibility for tampering with the free market must be shared. It is my opinion that price controls of these drugs will result in negative outcomes, including rationing, cost controls levied on producers, taxpayer-funded subsidies offered to producers, and ultimately the worst of all outcomes: shortages. Revered economists such as Friedrich Hayek and Henry Hazlitt have explained these effects. A brief discourse is found in Henry Hazlitt's book, Economics in One Lesson, in the chapter titled, "Government Price-Fixing." I would pray that there would be some way the state legislature could exert some influence over the price edicts from Washington, or, better yet, somehow exempt our state from them.Pamela K.
