Dear Chairman Veit and Committee Members, On behalf of the 21-member steering committee of the Greater KC Food Policy Coalition, we support the provisions in HB 1777 related to food access. The Coalition supports the repeal of provisions that restrict or prohibit the participation of individuals who have been convicted of a drug-related offense in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Hunger is bad for health. Hunger and food insecurity are connected to poor health outcomes for adults of all ages, including chronic health conditions and diseases. According to the USDA, 12.2% of Missourians experienced food insecurity between 2020 and 2022, which was higher than the national average of 11.2%. Since SNAP benefits are distributed by household, the denial of benefits to people who have been convicted of drug-related offenses may also negatively impact their family. Formerly incarcerated people need community support, not punitive motivation. Many formerly incarcerated people experience food insecurity upon release from incarceration. The denial of SNAP benefits exacerbates food insecurity and serves as a barrier to reintegration for formerly incarcerated individuals. Restrictions on benefits act as a de facto ban due to the administrative burden. Currently, Missourians who have been convicted of one drug-related offense that is not a felony are still eligible for SNAP benefits if they comply with certain requirements. These requirements are associated with an increased administrative burden on state staff. Over the past few years, Missouri has struggled to keep up with the administrative demand of the program, resulting in issues like excessive call time waits. Other criminal convictions are NOT excluded. It is in the best interest of our state for the path to reentry to be supportive and successful. HB1777 is a step in the right direction.

The values of proportional punishment, just process, and restoration should guide our nation's response to crime and use of incarceration. These biblical values must likewise guide policy approaches to barriers faced by men and women with a criminal record, to enhance public safety and encourage successful reentry. With these values in mind, Prison Fellowship, the nation's largest Christian non-profit serving prisoners, former prisoners, and their families urges you to approve H.B. 1777. The first months after prison are critical to a person's success in pursuing a law-abiding and flourishing life. Men and women with a criminal record often leave prison with little more than a few dollars to their name and face nearly 44,000 documented barriers to success based on the criminal record they carry. These barriers significantly impact the very measures of success that we all find familiar: access to employment, safe housing, and transportation. During this uniquely vulnerable time, the ability to access temporary assistance through SNAP benefits can be a lifeline for a person's future. By removing access bans for people with a felony drug conviction, this legislation brings this public assistance closer to one of the populations it can best benefit. In fact, history demonstrates that permanent eligibility bans on accessing public support for nutrition, based on a criminal conviction, do little to prevent crime. Some studies indicate that such bans can contribute to higher recidivism rates, which translates to more victims of crime and additional families and communities torn by broken trust. This legislation also takes important steps toward a safer, more constructive culture for women who experience pregnancy, labor, and delivery while living in correctional institutions. Every life is created by God with value and purpose. Responsible steps to prevent unnecessary danger or trauma during labor and delivery are a prudent reflection of this truth. Access to important, well-defined public benefits like SNAP can be an essential tool to help our neighbors return home from prison as safe, successful citizens. Appropriate restrictions on the restraint of pregnant, laboring, and postpartum women in prison demonstrate a shared value for life. We urge you to support and promptly pass this legislation. Chair Veit, Vice-Chair Perkins, Ranking Member Terry, and members of the committee: I write to you in support of House Bill 1777, specifically the provisions that eliminate Missouri's ban on SNAP benefits for people with felony convictions. This is the right move for Missouri, as it was for the majority of Missouri's neighboring states, including Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kentucky, and Illinois—all of whom have passed legislation removing this barrier to SNAP benefits. In addition to Missouri's neighboring states. the ban has also been lifted in a number of other states where the Christian Coalition has a strong presence, including Michigan, Ohio, Mississippi, and Louisiana. Our corrections systems were implemented to disincentivize and correct bad behavior, and return the offender to society better, thus created greater public safety for the people of Missouri. Over the years, we have seen a breakdown in the effectiveness of these systems, with many people returning to incarceration repeatedly. This has led the Christian Coalition of Missouri, and others to look for opportunities to improve upon the effectiveness of our system through thoughtful and meaningful reforms. In John 10:10 we read that "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly". This verse sets out that a lack of abundance is opposite to stealing, killing, and destroying. When we look at common threads among those incarcerated, a lack of abundance in many areas of life is a very common thread. Once released, it should be our desire that those who have made mistakes get on their feet, find work, and take a different path. SNAP is a safety blanket along that way to make sure that no one goes hungry. Hunger leads people to take extreme measures to avoid starvation and could be a catalyst that could lead someone back down a bad road. If it is our true desire to help people to return to society as a better person, and contributing member of society, denying them access to food assistance is exactly opposite of what we say we are trying to do. This reform is pro-life. Being pro-life means more than just wanting children to be born. It means embracing a culture that supports all life, from conception to death. Ensuring that children and families who have fallen on hard times have enough food to eat is consistent with that culture. We have all made mistakes in our past. Many of us know individuals who have suffered through drug addiction or made the mistake of engaging in criminal activity. And many have overcome these past behaviors. Vice-Chair Perkins' legislation offers dignity and support to those who may have erred in the past but have served their sentence and shown a desire to be better. We must provide a foundation on which people can rebuild their lives, and ensuring they have access to basic sustenance is just that; a platform on which people can find work and reestablish themselves as successful, productive citizens of Missouri. We applaud Vice-Chair Perkins for his humane, smart-on-crime approach, recognizing the need for second chances and the ways in which providing them can ultimately make us safer by reducing recidivism. I'm writing about the proposed passage of House Bill 1777 through your committee. This bill would, as I understand it, opt Missouri out of an optional Federal provision. I also understand that most other states have already opted out of this provision. Currently in Missouri, in most cases, when someone has a drug felony on their record, even after they have served their time and have returned to society, if they have need of the SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) which provides food, they cannot access this safety net program ever. They are banned for the rest of their life. When originally passed, this federal law was intended to be a get-tough-on-crime measure, but it failed to consider the reality of addiction or the notion of second chances. While getting tough on crime and keeping people safe is a noble and worthwhile idea, punishing individuals for past wrongs or indiscretions goes against the very fabric of a just society. Thank you for hearing House Bill 1777. My name is Michael Sonntag. I am a parishioner at St. Margaret of Scotland Catholic Church, 3854 Flad, St Louis, MO 63110, and am active in their Living Justice Ministries. I support the proposed passage of House Bill 1777 through your committee. This bill, as I understand it, would no longer exclude individuals who are convicted of a state or federal felony drug offense from SNAP for such conviction. In effect, Missouri would choose to opt out of this (optional) federal exclusion - an action already taken by many other states. Currently in Missouri, in most cases, when someone has a drug felony on their record, even after they have served their time and have returned to society, they are unable to access the support of the SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) which provides for the most basic of human needs: food, for the rest of their lives. When originally passed, this federal law was intended to be a get-tough-on-crime measure, but it failed to consider the reality of addiction or the notion of second chances. While getting tough on crime and keeping people safe is a noble and worthwhile idea, punishing individuals for past wrongs or indiscretions goes against the very fabric of a just society. This current law is not helping anyone. It is increasing recidivism, hurting individuals and families, and not offering folks a second chance. Please pass House Bill 1777 through your committee.

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Most other states have opted out of the lifetime ban on SNAP benefits for those with a drug felony. This is reasonable given the legalization of marijuana while many remained banned for a drug charge related only to marijuana (and are unable to have their record expunged). Continuation of the ban disproportionately affects women and children, does nothing to increase public safety and may actually increase crime, and certainly increases recidivism as it significantly hamstrings efforts to promote successful re-entry. I'm a nurse working with justice involved, recently released individuals. Please hear me when I say: if we prohibit meaningful re-integration into community, if we increase the already stacked difficulty of feeling ownership and partnership with one's neighborhood - then we (with our policy) are actively promoting the opposite - a dispossess people who cycle in and out of the justice system.

As conservative grassroots organizations, the American Conservative Union and the Faith and Freedom Coalition support efforts to promote public safety through accountability and redemption. With this in mind, we write in support of the policy before your committee that would lift Missouri's ban on the Supplemental Nutrition Food Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits for certain individuals with criminal history. This change is a common-sense solution that prioritizes human dignity and basic needs, while removing an unnecessary roadblock for people on a path toward becoming successful, productive citizens. As conservatives, we share your dedication to maximizing public safety. Toward this end, we have advocated for policies that lower recidivism by removing counterproductive barriers to a law-abiding life. The evidence firmly shows that laws which permanently ban individuals with criminal convictions from accessing food do not work to deter future crimes. In fact, the exact opposite tends to become true. Increasingly punitive bans can actually increase recidivism, driven in part by financially motivated crimes and the need to access the most basic human needs. To the extent increased recidivism drives higher incarceration costs, taxpayers will be needlessly on the hook. While not only humane, this policy is unequivocally pro-family. Opening pathways to a second chance for parents with a criminal history by simply allowing them access to the most basic human need is a no brainer. 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Testimony on behalf of Advocates of Planned Parenthood of the St. Louis Region and Southwest Missouri (Advocates).Planned Parenthood of the St. Louis Region and Southwest Missouri (PPSLRSWMO) proudly provides respectful, equitable, and evidence-based health services, and seeks to reduce health inequities for those most marginalized and with the least access to care.PPSLRSWMO health center staff also see firsthand the long-term impact of how trauma and disparate treatment in care impacts patients. Advocates supports policies that expand accessibility, availability, and affordability of sexual and reproductive care across the lifespan, whether at Planned Parenthood health centers or elsewhere. Advocates also supports policies that create equitable and just systems so that all Missourians and their families can thrive. We are active in work across coalitions with partners representing a broad range of sexual, reproductive, and maternal health issues - because access to dignified, safe, compassionate health care for all people is critical to their reproductive health and freedom. These bills unequivocally advance these goals and would benefit the health of Missourians. Advocates strongly supports HB 1777, which addresses numerous gaps in access and care for incarcerated people. It would place protections against the use of restraints in city and county jails; as already recognized in state statute, the practice of using restraints, or "shackling," on pregnant, laboring, and postpartum individuals is both demeaning and dangerous. This practice has long been opposed by major medical organizations such as the American Medical Association, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and American Public Health Association. Eliminating this practice should extend to all those detained in Missouri, regardless of the carceral system in which they are detained. Incarcerated individuals face unique barriers to health care, and those who are pregnant and postpartum are at increased risk of negative health outcomes; yet, their health care needs remain largely unaddressed. HB 1777 makes critical strides to protect the health and dignity of those in the corrections systems. It also creates pathways for returning citizens to optimize their health and families once released. HB 1777 ensures critical preventive services and basic dignity are afforded incarcerated individuals in city and county jails. Nutrition and menstrual products, as well as preventive services and testing and treatment, with a trauma-informed lens, are critical to individuals and more broadly, to our state's public health systems.
