On behalf of Health Forward Foundation (Health Forward), I submit this letter of testimony in opposition to HB 2062. Health Forward works to support and build inclusive, powerful, and healthy communities characterized by racial equity and economically just systems. This bill runs counter to those goals by limiting the ability of local governments to meet the needs of their communities, especially during times of public health crisis. Health Forward is opposed to this legislation because it has a chilling effect on local policy innovation by preempting what policy tools can be used by local government. Policy innovation at all levels of government is an essential component of a thriving democracy organized as a federal system. Eviction moratoria are also a key way for localities to ensure strong public health outcomes. Because of the moratoria across the US in place during the COVID-19 outbreak, people who may have been otherwise exposed to the virus were safely in sheltered in homes. It had real, beneficial outcomes for people's health. For example, research from the National Institute of Health showed that eviction moratoria slowed the transmission rate of COVID (https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC7605580/)Looking out more broadly about who evictions affect the most, eviction moratoria also has a significant racial equity component. For example in Kansas City, almost half of evictions filed were against Black tenants, whom only comprise about 1/3rd of the population of renters (https://evictionlab.org/eviction-tracking/kansas-city-mo/). Eviction moratoria are a key tool for communities to help reduce health disparities by race, especially during the extraordinary circumstances presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. To ensure that this tool remains viable and usable for future, unforeseen events, we strongly encourage lawmakers to vote no on this bill.
