We have the education, training, and ability to do so much more than merely select finishes. To become a Registered Interior Designer in the State of Missouri, you must have passed the NCIDQ exams. These are the only exams for qualifying an interior designer. These exams are the measure by which many other states use to license designers. I have been trained as an interior architect and practiced under several architects performing all the capabilities that are listed in HB2158. If HB2158 is passed, I will have the means by which to seal my own infill/renovation drawings to submit for permitting within the jurisdictions that I practice in. I have no intention of practicing architecture, designing building envelopes or structures. As designers, we adhere to building codes and ADA compliance, determine occupant loads, design egress and life safety plans, floor plans and coordinate with all disciplines. I currently coordinate daily with many consultants from structural, mechanical, electrical, and plumbing disciplines. HB2158 would be of great value for Registered Interior Designers in Missouri. This will differentiate Registered Interior Designers from Interior Decorators and others that are not as educated, formally tested, or experienced. Dear Members of the House Professional Registration and Licensing Committee, My name is Erika Moody, and I am the President of Helix Architecture in Kansas City, Missouri. I also serve as Presidentelect for the International Interior Design Association (IIDA) International Board. I am writing to register IIDA's support of HB 2158. Helix Architecture is an integrated architecture and interior design firm, and for more than 30 years has encouraged interior designers to collaborate with their architecture colleagues to utilize their specific but distinct areas of expertise to produce better, holistic results for our clients, with health, safety, and welfare of the public as a priority. I have seen firsthand the benefit of this collaboration between interior designers on our projects, for our clients, our firm and community. We would not practice in any other way, it is truly a competitive advantage to us in hiring and in the pursuit of project excellence. Over the last three years, architecture and interior design communities in 5 states have worked together to draft a policy that allows qualified practitioners to take responsibility for their own work. Much of that language has been incorporated into HB 2158. In fact, 17 jurisdictions in the US allow NCIDQ-certified interior designers to take responsibility for their own work and stamp and seal interior, non-structural construction plans for permitting and that number is growing: Nebraska passed similar legislation just last month. Missouri must be added to this growing list if we are to stay competitive and keep talent in the state. States that do not allow interior designers to stamp and seal interior, non-structural construction plans for permitting are preventing qualified practitioners from practicing to the fullest extent of their capabilities. Although Registered Interior Designers have the education, experience, and examination to protect the public when designing interior spaces, we are required to hire an architect to stamp and seal our nonstructural interior construction plans for permitting. This challenge needlessly passes additional costs onto our customers, and creates hurdles in our day-to-day business. Allowing qualified and competent practitioners to independently protect the public in their practice is good for the economy of Missouri. By passing this bill, Registered Interior Designers will by no means be taking away any abilities of any other player. It would allow Registered Interior Designers to be differentiated from other Interior Designers, and showcase that we not only have the education and experience necessary to practice, but have the drive to undergo thorough testing. We have the passion to create interesting, safe, and compliant spaces that are expected in commercial settings. The NCIDQ exam is the only industry recognized indicator of an Interior Designer's proficiency and their commitment to the profession. The NCIDQ exam covers seven areas: building systems, codes, construction standards, contract administration, design application, professional practice and project coordination. For Architects, the NCARB exam has six practice-based divisions: practice management, project management, programming & analysis, project planning & design, project development& documentation, and construction & evaluation. If you look into each of these divisions on the NCARB website, the descriptions are incredibly similar to the areas that we are tested on as Registered Interior Designers. By passing HB 2158, it would elevate the practice of Registered Interior Designers and give our profession the respect it deserves. It would be a step in the right direction to help differentiate us from Interior Decorators and less educated and experienced Interior Designers. There are currently 17 other jurisdictions in the US that allow NCIDQ-certified interior designers to take responsibility for their own work and stamp and seal interior, non-structural construction plans for permitting. As a Licensed and Registered Architect in the State of Missouri, I have the privilege to work with amazing Interior Designers every day as a part of my professional team. Similar to the process I had to go through to become registered as an Architect, a NCIDQ Registered Interior Designer also must receive specific formal education, thousands of paid hours of supervised experience, and pass a rigorous exam process to receive certification as a Registered Interior Designer. This is educational. experience, and exam process prepares Interior Designers to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, which is the sole responsibility of our industry. With these qualifications, it is sad that currently a Registered Interior Designer is unable to take full stamp and seal responsibilities for his or her own work (interior, non-structural, non-loadbearing, non-seismic work). Passing this bill will allow Registered Interior Designers to practice to the fullest extent of their capabilities. This legislation has already passed in 17 other states, many of which are surrounding the state of Missouri. Without it passing, you will run the risk of Registered Interior Designers leaving to practice in states where they are recognized fully. Also, this bill will allow consumers to work with only an Interior Designer for all interior work within the scope of practice from permit to project completion. I am disheartened to hear that others within the design profession are opposing this bill without fully understanding it. The built environment is created by the collaboration of many specific subfields: Civil Engineering, Structural Engineering, Architecture, Systems Engineering, Landscape Architecture, and Interior Design (to name a few). Just like the rest of the design team, a Registered Interior Designer should be able to take responsibility for their work. This bill does not affect or change how we all collaborate together, yet it will bolster up a fellow team member to the level in which they deserve. Thank you for your time.

To practice Interior Design as HB2158 descibes designing spaces within facilities practicing non-loadbearing construction, you are still required to provide sealed documents to the jurisdiction to recieve a building permit. Even within Springfield, MO, you still need to provide an architect's seal to do so. Aside from only changing mere finishes, to provide demo plans, floor plans, life safety/egress plans or anything else needed for a permit, you will currently need an architect to seal the drawings. I am asking that this responsibility be afforded to Registered Interior Designers.
