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The Sierra Club opposes House Bill 2167. This proposed bill serves monopoly utilities at the expense of the public. It weakens and politicizes the Office of Public Counsel (OPC), shortens rate cases, removes rights of the intervenors, limits public participation in decisions that impact the pocketbooks of ratepayers and forbids intervening parties to raise issues.OPC is the agency specially charged with protecting the public interest at the Public Service Commission. House Bill 2167 would transform the OPC by narrowing the definition of "public interest" to rates and costs, reliability, promoting economic development and job creation, and, confusingly, ensuring utilities have access to capital. Other important public interests, such as climate and the environment, are removed from the purview of this office. (386.710.2) Additionally, changing appointments from department director to the governor would transform the OPC's loyalties, from strictly working on behalf of the public to potentially being swayed by the agenda and ideology of political parties. (386.700) OPC will not be allowed to appeal a PSC decision unless the director of the Department of Commerce and Insurance certifies in writing that (1) it's reasonably likely to be successful on the merits (usually a decision to be made by a court); (2) it would not cost the public more for service; and (3) it would be a good and efficient use of scarce government resources. This degree of interference in legal decisions is unique in Missouri law. (386.510.2)Shortening the duration of rate cases by a full 3 months can have terrible consequences for ratepayers. It is essential that the Public Service Commission have time, resources, and plenty of experts weighing in during rate cases so they can make the best possible decisions on behalf of the public. "Streamlining" is not really what this bill does to our current processes; instead, it bulldozes over all of our current protections to get utility priorities passed with minimal scrutiny or safeguards. (393.1810)The bill doesn't even acknowledge the existence of rate design. A rate case has 2 major phases: revenue requirement (determining how much revenue the utility is entitled to) and rate design (allocating the rates for collecting this revenue among the customer classes and between fixed and volumetric charges). How this accelerated process will accomplish both things simultaneously is unclear.Currently, all rate case parties can file direct, rebuttal, and surrebuttal testimony, but this bill would remove the right of intervenors to raise new issues, which limits the amount of information the PSC would learn about particular cases. In this bill, non-utility parties are not allowed to raise new issues. They can file rebuttal only if it "accepts, rejects, disagrees with or reflects an alternative to" the utility's application. Non-utilities' cross-rebuttal can attack one another's rebuttal but not any argument raised by the utility. (393.1820) The PSC needs more information, not less, to protect the public from potentially harmful or unnecessary rate increases. This bill limits the number of public hearings to three. There used to be far more public hearings during rate cases, and the numbers have been

slashed in recent years. The PSC and utilities should want to hear from as many members of the public as possible when deciding on issues that directly impact them. (393.1820.3)Utilities are monopolies, and it's imperative that their customers have a seat at the table in rate cases by intervening. This bill would apparently deny intervenors any recourse at all if they refuse to join a settlement in the utility's favor; under current law they can object and pursue their objections before the Commission and the courts. (393.1835) This bill favors settlements between utilities and PSC staff only. If this bill passes we can expect such settlements to be the utilities' preferred method of deciding rate cases from now on. This is disturbing for many reasons, but the one that stands out most is that the utilities would settle with a staff who would have less information, less time, and less scrutiny on each case. This will inevitably lead to worse outcomes — and higher bills — for ratepayers who will be denied access to much of the information on which their rates are based. It's as though this bill was written by utilities to ensure they maximize profits with as little interference from regulators or the public as possible. Please reject House Bill 2167.
