I oppose HB 2693 which removes the court's ability to dispose of a firearm involved in a crime and the ability of law enforcement to confiscate and destroy weapons in certain circumstances. When guns are used in the commission of crimes, including death and injury by firearms, those weapons should rightfully be taken out of circulation and not resold. Being injured or killed by a firearm is a traumatic event. There are examples where entire buildings are torn down after a shooting event, like the destruction of the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh. Likewise, destroying a firearm used in a crime honors the persons who were harmed and gives them a sense that the harm visited upon them is recognized. Preserving a weapon used in a crime to be resold is an example of reaping profit from destruction. This is a bad bill which puts guns used in crimes back on the streets and offers firearms dealer the opportunity to profit from crime by reselling these guns. It is disrespectful to victims of crime who were harmed by these firearms. It undercuts the efforts of law enforcement who work hard gather evidence to prove that a specific weapon was used in a crime. I urge members of the House General Laws Committee to vote AGAINST bringing this legislation forward to the floor of the Missouri House of Representatives.

I serve as a middle school teacher in the northland area of Kansas City, where my students have been personally traumatized twice within the past month by gun violence in our community. I have students who were within feet of the shooter while celebrating our recent Super Bowl win, and those same students watching their siblings in a high school basketball game, were ushered from the stands to take cover with the screams of “Active Shooter!” This once was a something we only saw on television, but due to the availability of firearms and very loose “controls”, this has become something we are seeing in our own backyards. Those making policy most likely remember practicing fire drills and maybe a tornado drill during a storm that may have worried you a bit. Fortunately for you, active shooter drills were not around back then. You were most likely lucky enough to never have to practice these terrifying drills as a child. It is much easier supporting legislation allowing for the return of guns to our streets when you have never had to teach a child how to determine if they should run, fight, or hide when the alarm goes off and how to notice clues of real threats versus drills. Or when you have never had to tell a child, with whom you spend more waking hours with than your own children, that during an active shooter “once my classroom door is shut, it cannot be reopened again, for any reason,” even if that child is crying and knocking on the other side. It’s a sickening experience being responsible for the safety of those 25 little lives when that alarm goes off and I listen for signs of threat while attempting to keep my self and my students calm. I literally cannot breathe until I have secured my classroom door and looked into the eyes of every student on my roster ensuring no one is out of the room. My students and I don’t have the privilege of making laws and passing policy that would prevent this from being our reality. You do. As elected officials, you have the responsibility to be the voice of those in which you serve, including the 879,000+ public school students and nearly 67,000 public school teachers who live the possibility of an active shooter each and every day. It is your responsibility to help keep them safe, and to do this it is your responsibility to do what you can to limit the amount of guns available to be a threat to them. This is why as a teacher, mother, and lifelong Missourian, I urge you to oppose House Bill 2693.
