AN ACT

To repeal section 590.040, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof two new sections relating to animals.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 590.040, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections enacted in lieu 2 thereof, to be known as sections 173.2600 and 590.040, to read as follows:

173.2600. 1. Any public university or college, or private university or college, that receives state funds and uses animals in research shall post on its website a written report on such animal research prior to December thirty-first of each year. This report shall be posted on the internet in a conspicuous and easily accessible location so that the members of the general assembly and the public can access a copy of the report electronically. The written report shall contain the following:

7 (1) An accounting of the total amount of funding expended for animal research
8 by the college or university during the preceding state fiscal year. Such accounting shall
9 include amounts of state, federal, private, and other revenue sources;

10 (2) A list of active animal research projects, including project titles, the 11 university or college department, animal species, number of animals, fiscal year cost, 12 total cost to date, funding source, and the start and end dates;

(3) A review of compliance with the federal Animal Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C.
Section 2131 et seq., as amended, the United States Public Health Service Policy on
Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals, and other applicable local, state, and
federal laws, regulations, and policies governing animal research. Such review shall

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include an explanation of any animal research noncompliance documented during the
preceding state fiscal year and corrective actions taken in each case;

19 (4) An accounting of the number of animals by species adopted out from 20 research laboratories during the preceding state fiscal year to animal shelters, as 21 defined in section 273.325, or to animal rescue organizations, and the number of animals 22 euthanized;

(5) Current rosters for all Institutional Animal Care and Use Committees within
 the college or university; and

(6) A detailed explanation of specific efforts by the college or university to refine,
reduce, and replace the use of animals in research during the preceding state fiscal year.
Such explanation shall include the number of animals by species used in research each
year for the past three state fiscal years and anticipated numbers in the next fiscal year.
2. The use of animals in research shall include animals used in scientific

30 research, in testing, and for experimentation purposes.
590.040. 1. The POST commission shall set the minimum number of hours of basic
2 training for licensure as a peace officer no lower than six hundred, with the following

3 exceptions:

4 (1) Up to one thousand hours may be mandated for any class of license required for 5 commission by a state law enforcement agency;

6 (2) As few as one hundred twenty hours may be mandated for any class of license 7 restricted to commission as a reserve peace officer with police powers limited to the 8 commissioning political subdivision;

9 (3) Persons validly licensed on August 28, 2001, may retain licensure without 10 additional basic training;

(4) Persons licensed and commissioned within a county of the third classification
before July 1, 2002, may retain licensure with one hundred twenty hours of basic training if
the commissioning political subdivision has adopted an order or ordinance to that effect;

14 (5) Persons serving as a reserve officer on August 27, 2001, within a county of the 15 first classification or a county with a charter form of government and with more than one million inhabitants on August 27, 2001, having previously completed a minimum of one 16 hundred sixty hours of training, shall be granted a license necessary to function as a reserve 17 peace officer only within such county. For the purposes of this subdivision, the term "reserve 18 officer" shall mean any person who serves in a less than full-time law enforcement capacity, 19 20 with or without pay and who, without certification, has no power of arrest and who, without 21 certification, must be under the direct and immediate accompaniment of a certified peace 22 officer of the same agency at all times while on duty; and

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(6) The POST commission shall provide for the recognition of basic training received
at law enforcement training centers of other states, the military, the federal government and
territories of the United States regardless of the number of hours included in such training and
shall have authority to require supplemental training as a condition of eligibility for licensure.

27 2. The director shall have the authority to limit any exception provided in subsection
28 1 of this section to persons remaining in the same commission or transferring to a commission
29 in a similar jurisdiction.

30 3. The basic training of every peace officer, except agents of the conservation 31 commission, shall include at least thirty hours of training in the investigation and management of cases involving domestic and family violence. Such training shall include 32 instruction, specific to domestic and family violence cases, regarding: report writing; 33 physical abuse, sexual abuse, child fatalities and child neglect; interviewing children and 34 alleged perpetrators; the nature, extent and causes of domestic and family violence; the safety 35 of victims, other family and household members and investigating officers; legal rights and 36 remedies available to victims, including rights to compensation and the enforcement of civil 37 38 and criminal remedies; services available to victims and their children; the effects of cultural, racial and gender bias in law enforcement; and state statutes. Said curriculum shall be 39 40 developed and presented in consultation with the department of health and senior services, the children's division, public and private providers of programs for victims of domestic and 41 family violence, persons who have demonstrated expertise in training and education 42 concerning domestic and family violence, and the Missouri coalition against domestic 43 44 violence.

45 4. The basic training of every peace officer shall include at least four hours of training on officer-canine encounters and canine behaviors. Such training shall include 46 instruction on understanding and anticipating canine behavior, handling canine-related 47 48 calls and unplanned encounters with canines, the use of humane methods and tools in 49 handling canine encounters, state laws related to canines, the use of force continuum 50 principles in relation to canines, and the use of nonlethal methods to avoid and defend 51 against potential canine attacks. Such training shall not be in addition to existing training requirements in effect as of the effective date of this subsection but shall be part 52 of such existing training. 53

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
