HB 106, if passed, would significantly weaken Missouri's surface mining regulations by expanding exemptions from permitting requirements and removing crucial oversight provisions. We strongly urge you to vote "no" on HB 106. Of particular concern is the proposed revision to Section 444.766.2(2). The current law includes specific criteria that help regulators and operators clearly distinguish between legitimate land improvement activities and mining operations requiring permits. The removal of these criteria would create regulatory uncertainty and potentially allow commercial mining operations to avoid necessary environmental and safety oversight. The bill would also eliminate the requirement that a site's designation by the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration be considered when determining if a surface mining permit is needed. This federal designation serves as an important objective standard in the current regulatory framework. Its removal would weaken Missouri's ability to ensure proper oversight of mining operations in order to protect the safety, health, and wellbeing of those who live, work, and recreate nearby and downstream. Surface mining operations can have significant impacts on water quality, soil stability, and local ecosystems. The current permitting process ensures these impacts are properly evaluated and mitigated. Weakening these requirements could lead to increased environmental degradation and higher costs for future remediation. In conclusion, HB 106 would substantially weaken Missouri's ability to regulate surface mining activities effectively. The removal of key oversight provisions and specific criteria for determining when permits are required would create unnecessary regulatory uncertainty and potential environmental risks. We respectfully urge you to vote "no" on HB 106 and maintain Missouri's current system of surface mining regulation.
