Chair Stinnett and Members of the Committee:On behalf of Health Forward Foundation (Health Forward), I submit this testimony in support of HB 1095. Health Forward works to support and build inclusive, powerful, and healthy communities. We support this legislation as it would improve the maternal health outcomes by addressing disparities and improving the overall experience of pregnancy and childbirth for Missouri's most vulnerable populations.HB 1095 establishes the "Missouri Doula Reimbursement Act," which ensures that doulas are recognized as vital providers in the maternal healthcare system and are reimbursed for their services under MO HealthNet coverage. Doulas offer emotional, physical, and informational support, which can make a significant difference in the overall birthing experience. Research consistently shows that doula support during labor and postpartum care can reduce the risk of costly interventions like cesarian sections, as well as lead to fewer complications and hospital stays (Medicaid Reimbursement for Doula Services: Definitions and Policy Considerations, April 2022). Providing doula care to birthing people under the Medicaid program has shown to lead to cost savings to the health care system of around \$1,000 per birth (https://doi.org/10.1111/birt.12218). Missouri, like many states, has seen troubling disparities in maternal and infant health outcomes, particularly among Black and low-income women. These populations experience higher rates of maternal mortality, infant mortality, and adverse birth outcomes (https://www.kff.org/racial-equity-and-health-policy/issue-brief/racial-disparities-in-maternal-and-infanthealth-current-status-and-efforts-to-address-them/). Doulas play a vital role in reducing racial injustice in maternal and infant health outcomes providing culturally sensitive support and advocating for their clients. Finally, HB 1095 requires the Department of Social Services to study the impact of childbirth education classes on maternal and infant mortality. This is a crucial step in ensuring that we are making evidence-based decisions about the services covered by MO HealthNet. By gathering data on the effects of childbirth education, we can ensure that Missouri is investing in the most effective programs to improve health outcomes and reduce healthcare disparities. We urge the committee to vote YES on 1095, a forward-thinking approach to improving maternal and infant health that has the potential to save lives and improve the quality of life for mothers and babies. This bill is an important step toward expanding access to community-based doula care for Missourians enrolled in MO HealthNet, addressing longstanding gaps in perinatal health equity.HB 1095 is an inclusive bill that will benefit all pregnant individuals by ensuring access to vital perinatal support. The bill builds upon the foundation set by Missouri's State Plan Amendment (SPA), which provided the state with an opportunity to test the effectiveness of Medicaid reimbursement for doula care. The data and experiences gathered through the SPA have demonstrated the value of these services, making it clear that codifying this access into law is a necessary and logical next step. Community doulas, particularly Black doulas and other birth workers of color, have been on the frontlines combatting systemic racism in perinatal health, working tirelessly to close gaps in care, reduce harm, and advocate for birthing people who have been historically ignored or mistreated by the medical system. While doulas have made remarkable strides, it is critical to acknowledge that we did not create these inequities, and we alone cannot be expected to solve them. The burden of fixing a broken system should not fall solely on those who have been most harmed by it. It is the responsibility of the state to repair the injustices that have led to devastating disparities in Black perinatal health outcomes. Addressing these issues requires a collective effort, one that prioritizes intentional collaboration and deference to those most impacted. Missouri must commit to working alongside the communities that have been systematically excluded from decision-making, especially those who are multimarginalized, including Black, Indigenous, LGBTQ+, disabled, and lowincome birthing people. Repairing the harm will take more than policy shifts; it requires sustained investment, structural change, and a commitment to ensuring that community-based solutions are not only supported but centered.HB 1095 is a necessary step in the right direction, but Missouri still has a long way to go in ensuring true reproductive justice and equitable perinatal care for all. While this bill removes some barriers to care, the state must continue working to eliminate remaining obstacles that prevent pregnant individuals from accessing the full range of support they need. The work does not stop here; policymakers must remain committed to expanding access, reducing administrative burdens, and ensuring that all pregnant persons receive comprehensive and culturally responsive care.HB 1095 represents a critical investment in improving perinatal health and well-being across the state. We urge the committee to advance this bill without amendments that would create additional restrictions on doulas or limit the ability of pregnant individuals to receive the support they need. 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HB 1095 will improve maternal and infant health care outcomes across Missouri by increasing access to doula services and childbirth education classes. Missouri's maternal mortality rate is substantially higher than the national average. There are dramatic disparities in the maternal mortality rate for Black Missourians and for Missourians who rely on MO HealthNet. In Missouri, Black women are three times more likely than white women to die from pregnancy-related complications. The majority of these deaths are preventable. HB 1095 is a positive step toward improving maternal and infant health outcomes in Missouri.
