I am Buddy Lahl, CEO of the Missouri Restaurant Association. The MRA represents the interest of over 12,000 restaurant operators across the state of Missouri. The Missouri Restaurant Association (MRA) represents the interests of over 12,000 restaurant operators across the state of Missouri. The MRA supports HB546, which defines a small business as having 50 employees and includes exemptions for seasonal businesses operating for 26 weeks or less. These guidelines benefit many of our restaurants and businesses in tourist areas across the state. Additionally, the MRA proposes that small businesses with less than \$10 million in gross annual sales be exempt from the sick pay portion of Proposition A.We recommend amending certain requirements that small businesses must adhere to under Proposition A. The eight pages of regulations in Proposition A are counterproductive to attracting and retaining businesses in Missouri. Specifically, the regulations on carrying accrued sick pay for nine months after an employee has left, extending sick pay to family members, adding a training wage condition for 14-20-year-olds, and providing a right to cure clause for employers without fines are all buried in the fine print. Most voters were unaware of the harmful effects Proposition A imposes on Missouri small businesses. These changes do not alter what urban Missourians voted for; they merely redefine the parameters for statewide compliance with Proposition A.As currently written, Proposition A is detrimental to Missouri restaurants. For a small casual service restaurant employing 40 people in a rural community, Proposition A will cost an employer more than \$1,300 per employee or over \$50,000 per year in additional payroll and tax expenses. With profit margins between 3-5%, operators will have no choice but to pass these expenses on to consumers through higher prices, layoffs, and replacing human employees with technology-based systems to minimize labor costs. This does not include the added time and expense operators will endure to comply with the regulations, taking time away from our core business of serving customers. In the hospitality industry, personal connection is paramount to our success. We value all our employees; they are part of our family and the most important part of our operations. Restaurants are an industry of opportunity. We hire entry-level personnel, teach hospitality and culinary skills, and provide opportunities for advancement. Owners increase pay based on merit and benefits based on profitability. Many operators would prefer to initiate a health insurance program promoting health and wellness before adding sick pay. I am happy to answer any questions from the committee regarding restaurants and compliance with Proposition A.In closing, the MRA remains committed to working collaboratively with lawmakers to ensure that our industry continues to thrive while supporting the well-being of our employees. Together, we can create a balanced approach that benefits both businesses and the communities we serve. The MRA is dedicated to fostering a vibrant restaurant community that not only provides exceptional dining experiences but also contributes positively to the local economy and community well-being. The restaurant industry is a significant contributor to Missouri's economy, providing jobs and supporting local suppliers and

communities.

I think that HB 546 is a crucial bill to small businesses in Missouri for many reasons if Proposition A is not overturned. I own a small business myself and employee 3 individuals beside myself; they all are paid a salary far above minimum wage and I already have a plan in place that allows my employees pto equivalent to one weeks of their average time worked in a week after one year employed, however without the passage of HB 546 the seasonal workers I employ during tax season will have to be given PTO. In addition, many of the small business owners in my community will be devastated by the paid leave rules of Proposition A if HB 546 is not passed. Restaurants, retailers, salons and other businesses who often pay minimum wage are already facing the impact of the increase in salary. Many small businesses such as landscaping companies and cleaning services already pay significantly over minimum wage due to the increased labor involved, and some also offer employee benefits, but their paid leave benefits (such as my company) may not be to standards of Proposition A. Now many of these small businesses who do not have a Human Resources department in place will have to invest in an independent company to rewrite or create an employee manual that includes paid leave rules. They will also have to pay additional money to determine how much they need to raise their prices to absorb the costs of their new paid time leave. If they don't, they may find themselves in economic hardship after implementing paid leave. I am opposed to the mandate of paid leave for businesses, and I hope that the passage of HB 546 will still allow for small businesses to grow to a point where they can offer their employees paid leave and benefits without mandates.

As a low-wage worker and someone who personally gathered over 2,000 signatures to put Proposition A on the November 2024 ballot, I have some thoughts on this bill for your consideration. Proposition A, which this current bill would overturn, was overwhelmingly passed by Missourians across the state-Black, white, male, female, Christian, non-religious, poor, wealthy, and all those in between, I had conversations with folks in front of grocery stores, at the polls, and on their doorsteps about this measure and how it transcends political party lines. Why? Because all low-wage workers, regardless of political affiliation, deserve to be compensated fairly for the work they do and afford to live. I talked with single mothers working two, three jobs just to make ends meet... and even then, she would need to make sacrifices that politicians in this room couldn't fathom. I implore anyone who has a say over the passage of this bill to research the origins of a minimum wage policy, and compare that to the cost of living in somewhere like Kansas City or St. Louis. If you believe someone making \$12.65- the 2025 minimum wage without implementation of Prop A— can afford to live in every city in Missouri, then you've either not done adequate research or are rejecting facts for your own political agenda. Either of which, indicate you are bad at your job and lack the ability to do your job as a congressperson effectively. I understand the appeal of this bill is to "protect small businesses," but the sign of a successful entrepreneur is their ability to pay their employees enough to support themselves and juggle their profit margin. If they are unable to do that, they fail as an entrepreneur, and it isn't on the state government to reconcile that failure. I will leave you on one final, and perhaps, most meaningful thought: Rejecting the explicit will of the people is the beginnings of tyranny. I may have lost some of you because it seems that "tyranny" is becoming a buzz word nowadays, but for good reason. Overturning an election result where 58% of Missourians voted "yes" to Prop A— the full text of it— is explicitly rejecting the will of the people in favor of personal or political gain. What is the difference between our state government and the governments of Venezuela or Zimbabwe? Both seem to reject the election results in pursuit of an interest that doesn't apply to their own citizens. I implore you to vote "No" on HB 546 if it's called for a vote, and to take the appropriate steps to prevent it from being called.

This bill would greatly undermine Proposition A and would have devastating consequences for the most vulnerable workers in Missouri. Proposition A is a ballot initiative that passed with the support of 1.6 million Missourians and would provide workers in Missouri with paid time off to care for themselves and their loved ones. If passed, HB 546 would override the will of Missouri voters and strip Missouri workers from the critical time they need to recover from illness or care for an ill family member by exempting any business with less than 50 employees. The National Partnership is a nonprofit, nonpartisan advocacy group that has more than 50 years of experience in combating barriers to opportunity for women workers, such as sexual harassment and other forms of sex discrimination and gender-based violence. The National Partnership works for a just and equitable society in which all women and families can live with dignity. respect, and security; every person has a fair chance to achieve their potential; and no person is held back by discrimination or bias. Through our legal and research support, we have worked tirelessly alongside partners to advocate for paid sick and safe days for all workers. Paid sick and safe days allow workers to take brief periods of time away from work to attend to their and their family's health. To date, almost 27 million U.S. workers - more than one in five private sector workers and six in 10 of the lowest-income workers— can not earn a single paid sick day. This disparity is even greater for workers of color, as nearly half (48 percent) of Latinx workers and more than one-third (36 percent) of Black workers report having no paid time away from work of any kind. Without the ability to take paid time away from work to deal with illness, workers must forfeit critical wages and possibly risk job loss in order to recover or take care of a loved one. For many households, just a few days of lost pay is equivalent to losing an entire month's worth of groceries or health care expenses. Paid sick days also have the power to protect the health of Missourians. Public-facing occupations such as food service (81 percent), personal care and service - including child care (75 percent) are some of the least likely to have access to paid sick days, even with their increased risk of spreading illness to the general public. The Food and Drug Administration requires service workers to work on a restricted basis until 24 hours after symptoms subside, but nearly 60 percent of food service workers surveyed in a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention study reported working while sick, and nearly half of those workers said they went to work because they did not have paid sick days. Furthermore, the Centers for Disease and Control also found that 40 percent of foodborne illness outbreaks were caused by ill or infectious food workers. With access to this form of earned time off, previous studies suggest that Missouri's

workers would be 1.5 times less likely than those without paid time away to report going to work with a contagious illness like the flu or a viral infection. Paid sick days are good for business as well, saving employers up to \$2.4 billion each year through fewer absences from reduced spread of flu-like illnesses alone. Workers with paid sick time are also three times more likely to obtain timely medical care, helping them recover faster from illness and get back to work sooner with reduced health care costs. Additionally, providing workers flexibility can reduce turnover by 50 percent; reducing costs incurred from advertising, interviewing, and training new hires that can add up to 24 percent of a worker's annual compensation. These benefits will cost businesses little to nothing when it comes to their bottom line - paid sick days laws have not increased business bankruptcies and businesses providing paid sick days are less likely to fail in their first years of operation. For example, a DC audit found that a paid sick and safe leave law did not discourage owners from basing businesses in the District. HB 546 would also restrict the number of workers who could receive paid safe days. Paid safe days support the ability of survivors of domestic violence and their families to seek medical assistance, obtain a protective order, access assistance or relocate from their current dwelling. Lowincome workers are the least likely to have access to any paid leave, risk termination if they are absent, are the least likely to have significant savings, and face high schedule unpredictability. These factors mean they cannot afford the lost wages and out-of-pocket costs associated with the fallout of domestic violence incidents, they are more likely to stay trapped in a cycle of abuse. Earned safety days can help workers seek safety and healing from domestic violence and sexual assault and help protect the economic stability and lives of Missourians. Paid sick leave for all workers is long overdue. Over 35 other jurisdictions nationwide have adopted paid sick days laws, including 17 states: Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Michigan, Maryland, Minnesota, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont, Washington, Alaska, and Nebraska. Overall, HB 546 fails Missourians and leaves workers with the impossible choice of risking their paycheck and caring for loved ones or themself - all of which Proposition A sought to prevent. We respectfully urge an unfavorable report on the bill. My name is Cassandra Gomez. I am a Senior Staff Attorney at the National Employment Law Project (NELP). Founded in 1969, NELP is a non-profit, non-partisan leading advocacy organization with the mission to build a just and inclusive economy where all workers have expansive rights and thrive in good jobs. We partner with federal, state, and local lawmakers on a wide range of workforce issues. We have worked with dozens of city councils and state legislatures across the country and with the U.S. Congress on measures to boost labor standards, including higher minimum wages, efficient enforcement, unemployment insurance modernization, and other policies that protect workers. Most relevant to today's hearing, we have also helped support numerous community-driven ballot initiatives to improve labor standards for all workers. Thank you to the Committee on Commerce for the opportunity to submit testimony regarding HB 546, which would significantly undermine Missouri's minimum wage and paid sick time laws as recently modified and enacted by Missouri voters via Proposition A. We urge you to oppose HB 546 in order to protect the will of Missourians and provide essential workplace rights to workers throughout the state. HB 546 Would Take Missouri Backward.In November 2024, a strong majority of voters in Missouri voted in favor of Proposition A. As reflected by its popularity across party lines, Proposition A will bring much-desired change to Missouri. Specifically, the Proposition 1) gradually increases the state's minimum wage over the course of the next few years, and 2) creates a new right to earned paid sick time for covered workers. If allowed to move forward, HB 546 would roll back voter-approved Proposition A.Missouri voters directly approved Proposition A by a strong majority, with approximately 58 percent of Missourians voting in support. Natalie Wallington, 27 Counties and 2 Cities Supported Proposition A in Missouri. Beyond being approved by voters in general, voters approved Proposition A across party lines. Many counties that voted staunchly in favor of Trump/Vance also voted yes on Proposition A—for example, rural counties, such as Taney County and Henry County favored Proposition A. These results show that Missourians are aligned: Missourians will be better off with the increased minimum wage and newly enacted paid sick time provisions. Now, mere months after Missourians made their desires loud and clear, HB 546 places the will of the People of Missouri in peril. In particular, HB 546 would exempt businesses with 50 or fewer employees and seasonal businesses from having to comply with both the higher minimum wage rate and the newly enacted paid sick time law. This unwarranted amendment to Proposition A would effectively repeal these newly enacted rights for many Missourians, in direction violation of the will of the voters. Missouri's paid sick time law would be a major outlier across the U.S., encompassing the smallest scope of covered workers. While Proposition A's paid sick time measures are new to Missouri, minimum wage is not. For many years, workers throughout Missouri have relied upon the state's minimum wage law, which provides a higher wage floor than the stagnant federal minimum wage. HB 456 would alter the state's longstanding minimum wage law by exempting "seasonal businesses" and businesses with 50 or fewer employees, all of whom have long been covered under the law. This bill would take away a voter approved minimum wage increase for nearly half of the state's workforce, leaving them vulnerable to stagnant wages that do not keep up with inflation or the cost of living. Minimum wage increases benefit workers, employers, and the economy. When workers have more money in their pockets through increased wages, consumer spending goes up, resulting in increased production and hiring. Id. HB 456 would go far beyond ignoring the democratic will of voters in Missouri; it would deliver a gut punch to workers who need and deserve these workplace protections. Conclusion and RecommendationsWe urge this Committee to uphold the will of Missouri voters and reject this attempt to take away much needed raises and paid sick time protections from a large portion of Missourians.

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My name is Christian Rak and I am the Missouri and Southern Illinois Director at SEIU Local 1. The Service Employees International Union (SEIU) Local 1 represents nearly 45,000 working people in six states and 11 cities across the Midwest, including nearly 6,000 members throughout Missouri - from St. Louis to Kansas City.Last November, over 1.6 million Missourians voted YES on Proposition A to raise minimum wage to \$15/hr by 2026 and ensure earned paid sick days to Missouri workers. 57% of Missourians voted for Proposition A and to help working families, but now we are seeing attempts to undermine and/or get around the decision made by Missourians. By exempting certain businesses, HB 546 creates an environment where workers can be paid below industry standards, leading to financial instability for families and communities. Lower wages and reduced benefits mean workers may struggle to afford basic necessities such as housing, healthcare, and education. This does not just affect individual employees but has a ripple effect on the economy, decreasing consumer spending and weakening local businesses that rely on a stable customer base. This bill creates an unfair competitive advantage for businesses that receive exemptions. Companies that continue to follow fair labor practices will face financial strain, as they are forced to compete against businesses that can cut costs by reducing wages and benefits. This could encourage a broader erosion of labor standards, leading to a race to the bottom where businesses that prioritize fair compensation are at a disadvantage. Over time, this could result in an overall decline in job quality and stability, affecting entire industries. From a legal and ethical standpoint, HB 546 is deeply problematic. Employment laws are designed to protect workers from exploitation and ensure safe and equitable workplaces. Granting exemptions for certain businesses weakens these protections, opening the door to potential abuse and legal challenges. Employees deserve workplaces where their contributions are valued and where they are compensated fairly for their time and effort.HB 546 would have long-term negative consequences for workforce retention and productivity. When wages and benefits decline, turnover rates increase as workers seek better opportunities elsewhere. High turnover leads to decreased productivity, higher training costs, and a less experienced workforce. Rather than boosting business growth, exempting businesses from compensation laws may have the opposite effect, making it more difficult for employers to attract and retain skilled employees. For these reasons, HB 546 is not just a bad idea, it is a direct threat to the well-being of workers and the integrity of the labor market. A strong economy relies on fair wages, competitive business practices, and protections that ensure workers can thrive. Rather than creating exemptions that weaken compensation laws, policymakers should focus on strengthening labor protections that support both workers and businesses in the long term. I urge legislators to oppose HB 546 and instead advocate for policies that promote fair pay, economic stability, and a level playing field for all businesses.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for allowing me to submit this testimony in opposition to HB 546. My name is Jen Bernstein and I am the Advocacy Manager for National Council of Jewish Women, based in St. Louis (NCJWSTL). NCJWSTL is a non-profit organization in metropolitan St. Louis, representing over 5,000 members and supporters throughout the state. We focus our work on community service, advocacy, education and philanthropy to improve the quality of life for women, children and families while supporting individual and civil rights, and have been doing so since 1895. When over 1.6 million Missourians voted for Prop A, we voted for an economy that centered workers and families. Prop A quarantees millions of workers access to paid time off to care for ourselves and our loved ones, something that is critically important because of two major flaws in the Family Medical Leave Act that left millions of workers unprotected. Over 1.1 million and nearly half (46.5%) of Missouri's workforce work for a business of less than 50 employees, the business my husband owns included. Prior to November, they had no protections for leave in case of serious illness from work, but we fixed that. Now House Bill 546 seeks to exempt any business of less than 50 employees from Missouri's paid sick leave and minimum wage requirements. This bill would have devastating consequences for the most vulnerable Missouri workers-workers who are already exempted from federal protection. This bill is bad for Missouri.NCJWSTL urges you to vote no on HB 546.

The Service Employees International Union (SEIU) represents essential workers across Missouri and the nation, advocating for fair wages, workplace protections, and the right to dignity on the job. As Missouri State Director of SEIU, I, Lenny Jones, strongly oppose HB 546 because it contradicts Proposition A, an approved voter mandate ensuring that workers and families have a living wage and access to paid sick leave. In November 2024, I and more than 1.6 million Missourians voted to pass Proposition A, a policy chosen by the people, for the people. This overwhelming support sent a clear message: Missouri voters believe no one should have to risk their health or financial security due to illness or severe circumstances. Proposition A corrected two major flaws in the Family Medical Leave Act—it made leave accessible by ensuring it was paid, and it extended protections to workers at small businesses with fewer than 50 employees, who had previously been excluded. Now, House Bill 546 seeks to undermine these hard-won protections by exempting any business with fewer than 50 employees from Missouri's paid sick leave and minimum wage requirements. This would strip protections from over 1.1 million workers—nearly half (46.5%) of Missouri's workforce—who are already excluded from federal safeguards. Moving forward with this legislation would not only be a harmful policy, but a direct rejection of the will of Missouri voters. Missourians voted for a stronger, fairer economy that prioritizes workers and families. SEIU stands firmly against any effort to roll back these critical protections and urges lawmakers to respect the decision of the voters by protecting the rights and well-being of Missouri's working people.

Chair, Vice-Chair, members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of Abortion Action Missouri in opposition to HB 546 that seeks to revoke the newly established protections in Proposition A for more than 1 million Missouri workers- the most vulnerable Missouri workers- workers who are already exempted from federal protection. Reproductive care is directly tied to financial stability and wellness of a family. Many parents are faced with termination or loss of future hours if they take time off work to care for their families/children. Low-paid jobs are especially likely to lack basic benefits like paid time off or control over work schedules, making it especially likely that pregnancy will lead to income loss or job loss for these workers. Missouri women are 2.1x more likely to be low wage workers and we know that women and particularly women of color are more likely to experience gender and combined racial and gender bias in hiring. All of this is compounded by the fact that women have a disproportionate share of family care-giving responsibilities. As a result, because women dominate low-wage industries, they must jeopardize their wages and jobs when they take time off to care for themselves, a sick child, or other loved ones. According to the National Partnership for Women and Families, for the typical working family, just 3.5 sick days without pay is equivalent to losing an entire month of groceries. For single-parent families, which are usually headed by women, the consequences are even more dire. Lack of access to earned sick leave contributes to Missouri's gender wage gap, and research demonstrates that workers with paid sick leave experience better economic and health outcomes, than those without it. Missourians and Missouri families know thisthat's why this past November the majority of Missourians turned out to the ballot box to vote in favor of Proposition A. Subverting the will of the people to exempt more than 1 million of Missouri's most vulnerable workers would be devastating for workers, subsequently devastating for families, and subsequently devastating for Missouri. Abortion Action Missouri, whose volunteers collected more than 15,000 signatures statewide for Proposition A, urges the committee to vote no. Abortion Action Missouri works to protect and expand every Missourians' right to bodily autonomy, to access essential reproductive healthcare including abortion care, to access accurate information to make the best decisions for ourselves and our families, and to parent our children in safety and dignity.

This increase in wages will have positive ripple effects that benefit all Missourians as workers spend their increased earnings in local communities. Over 600 businesses and organizations endorsed Proposition A.Everyone gets sick, but not everyone can afford to be sick. Letting employees earn paid sick days helps working families -- and helps prevent people from spreading infections to coworkers, customers, and the community. Paid sick leave is personally important to me because, when I hemorrhaged and lost over 2 liters of blood after giving birth to my voungest child, my husband could not take any paid sick leave to take care of me and our three children. By American standards and by regional standards, my husband had a "good" job with "great" benefits and yet, we did not have what we needed when we needed it most. I was mostly alone during the day, anemic and weak, caring for our children as best I could until I recovered. Our experience made me realize in a visceral, embodied way just how vulnerable families with fewer social and economic resources must be in times of illness and injury. Prop A must stand in its entirety.

Hello, as a Missouri voter who has both worked as an employee and now for myself as a small business owner, I am writing in strong opposition to HB 546. Organizers and workers (myself included) dedicated numerous hours gathering signatures from our fellow workers and supporters throughout the state of Missouri in 2023 and 2024, in order to get a minimum wage increase and guaranteed sick leave on the ballot for the people of Missouri to approve.
