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My name is Brittany Kiefer and I am a voter from St. Louis City, I ask that you support HB 617 by voting YES. Currently, thousands of Missourians who have served their time and paid their debt to society are still denied access to the democratic process. HB 617 would restore voting rights immediately after release. This restoration of rights would allow formerly incarcerated individuals to fully re-enter society and have a voice in decisions that affect their lives. Many states across the country (8 total including: Florida, California, Connecticut and Minnesota) have passed similar legislation. In these states we see that restoring voting rights reduces recidivism, strengthens communities, and promotes citizenship. More than 75% of people who can't vote due to a criminal record are not incarcerated, but have served their time. They are living in our communities, having completed incarceration, or while being on probation or parole. These people are working and paying taxes, yet they have no voice in their government. Voters of color are disproportionately impacted. One in 19 African Americans of voting age is disenfranchised due to a felony - a rate 3.5 times that of non-African Americans. Among the adult African American population, 5.3 percent is disenfranchised compared to 1.5 percent of the non-African American population. Missouri has the opportunity to move forward in the right direction by extending voting rights to folks who have completed their sentences and are expected to be fully productive members of society. Please vote YES on HB 617.

We write to urge you to support H.B. 617, a bill to restore the right to vote to Missourians on probation or parole following felony convictions. H.B. 617 will re-enfranchise tens of thousands of people, simplify the current law, and bring Missouri more closely in line with the 25 others states that do not strip people serving community supervision of the right to vote.1?? Campaign Legal Center ("CLC") is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization working to protect and strengthen the U.S. democratic process across all levels of government through litigation, policy analysis, and public education. Our Restore Your Vote program helps restore voting rights to people with past convictions by providing direct rights restoration services and empowering community leaders to understand and monitor implementation of rights restoration laws.?? We strongly support ending Missouri's disenfranchisement of individuals who are serving community supervision after a felony conviction. The right to vote is sacred and foundational; to deprive someone of that right is a profound and serious governmental act. While we do not believe there is any legitimate reason why an American citizen should be stripped of the right to vote in the first place, there is certainly no justification for depriving people on community supervision of the right to vote. Missourians on probation or parole live and work in their communities. They pay taxes and should have a say in the policy decisions that affect them and their families.? ? Felony disenfranchisement laws—particularly post-incarceration—do not serve any legitimate criminal legal purpose: they have no meaningful punitive, deterrent, or restorative value. Indeed, studies actually show that disenfranchisement undermines rehabilitation and hinders re-entry. 2 Conversely, restoring the right to vote improves individuals' connection to and engagement with their communities while incarcerated, as well as their transition back into society post-release.3? ? Still, despite these empirical facts, felony disenfranchisement laws persist, and their history explains why. In many states, these laws were enacted after the Civil War and proliferated during the Jim Crow era with the explicit and open purpose of undermining the 14th and 15th Amendments 4 Put simply, felony disenfranchisement exists and continues in the United States because of efforts to suppress voters and communities of color.5 Missouri's disenfranchisement scheme still serves that purpose today, disenfranchising Black citizens at over twice the rate of the general population.6 Felony disenfranchisement and its racist roots are a stain on our democracy. H.B. 617 will make great strides toward eliminating this exclusionary electoral feature and restore the right to vote to over 50,000 voters from Missouri.7? Penfranchising formerly incarcerated individuals is also important for democratic accountability. Elected officials make consequential decisions every day that directly impact formerly incarcerated voters. Not only do

legislators make the laws that such individuals were charged with breaking, but legislators also create the conditions for their re-entry and continued rehabilitation after incarceration, processes which are so often hindered by barriers to employment, housing, and other markers of full participation in a community.8 Formerly incarcerated voters' exposure to the criminal legal system gives them a major stake in the outcome of public policy, and their participation is crucial if the ballot box is truly to be a site where we hold our elected officials accountable.?? A system in which individuals are eligible to vote upon their release from incarceration additionally protects against de facto disenfranchisement: the process by which confusion and misinformation around voting after a criminal conviction leads many people with past convictions—and election officials—to believe wrongly that they cannot vote, even if they are eligible.9 H.B. 617 will combat de facto disenfranchisement by creating a simple, bright line rule governing voter eligibility.?? We also urge you to eliminate disenfranchisement for individuals incarcerated for misdemeanor offenses by removing the language "or misdemeanor" from proposed sections 115.133(2)(1) and 561.026(1).10 Disenfranchisement for misdemeanor convictions is likely unconstitutional, since the Missouri Constitution only permits "persons convicted of felony, or crime connected with the exercise of the right of suffrage" to be "excluded by law from voting."11 Given that misdemeanors pertain to minor offenses, misdemeanor disenfranchisement also does not advance any meaningful public policy interests.? ? In sum, H.B. 617 is Missouri's opportunity to join the growing list of states that have eliminated disenfranchisement after prison 12 There are tens of thousands of Missourians working to put their lives back together while serving probation or parole. They deserve a voice in our democracy and a say in the future of the state. H.B 617 is an essential step toward ending the outdated, discriminatory, and anti-democratic practice of felony disenfranchisement and will affirm Missouri's commitment to the principle that democracy works best when all eligible voters can participate. Restoring voting rights to Missourians who have completed their incarceration is a crucial step toward a more just and inclusive democracy. Currently, individuals on probation or parole for a felony conviction are denied the right to vote, despite living, working, and paying taxes in their communities. HB 617 seeks to change that by ensuring voting rights are restored upon completion of incarceration, a move that aligns Missouri with the 26 states and the District of Columbia that have already taken action. Nationwide, 4.6 million Americans are disenfranchised due to past felony convictions, and in Missouri, approximately 60,000 individuals on probation and parole remain without a voice in their government. This disproportionately impacts communities of color, with African Americans being disenfranchised at a rate 3.5 times higher than non-African Americans. Studies show that voting while on probation and parole reduces recidivism by fostering civic engagement and a sense of belonging. Since 2020, eight states have reformed their laws to restore voting rights post-incarceration. Missouri should follow their lead and ensure that all citizens who have served their time are given the opportunity to fully participate in our democracy.

They didn't feel part of the community or society, still felt outcast while under that restriction. They don't feel invested in their community, not locally, or statewide. It would help these persons feel more connected to their community and society if they could have their civic voice restored as soon as released and working on the return to society.

Dear members of the House Corrections and Public Institutions Committee: The Missouri Voter Protection Coalition (MOVPC) submits this testimony in support of HB 617, which would restore voting rights to Missourians on probation or parole for prior felony convictions. This is a much needed reform proven to reduce recidivism and promote positive reentry and citizenship. The majority of states allow those on probation or parole to vote. Currently, Missourians are not eligible to vote during any period of incarceration, as well as during any period of probation or parole for a felony conviction. This legislation would restore voting rights upon completion of their term of incarceration for a felony (except for crimes associated with right of suffrage). Nationwide, 4.6 million people - one in 50 Americans of voting age - are disenfranchised due to a felony conviction in their past. And more than 75% of people who can't vote due to a criminal record are not incarcerated, but living in our communities, having completed their sentences, or while being on probation or parole. These people are working and paying taxes, yet they have no voice in their government. In Missouri, there are approximately 60,000 individuals on probation and parole. Voters of color are disproportionately impacted. One in 19 African Americans of voting age is disenfranchised due to a felony conviction - a rate 3.5 times that of non-African Americans. Among the adult African American population, 5.3 percent is disenfranchised compared to 1.5 percent of the adult non-African American population. Studies unilaterally confirm that voting while on probation and parole reduces recidivism. States that allow voting by those on probation and parole have lower recidivism rates, and more positive re-entry experiences. Why? Voting encourages engagement and participation. It gives people a stake in their communities. This is one reason many states are moving towards restoring voting rights for those on probation and parole. Since 1997, 26 states and the District of Columbia have guaranteed voting rights to people living with felony convictions in their past. Preventing them from voting is the same as still holding that sentence over their head. If we encourage employers to high those who were formerly incarcerated, even while still on probation or parole, shouldn't we set an example by allowing the same folks to vote?
