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March 5, 2025To: Members of the Crime and Public Safety committee From: Rika White, Policy Manager at Empower MissouriRE: Our support for HB 728On behalf of our staff, board, and the members of our Crime and Public Safety committee, I ask that you vote "do pass" on HB 728. This bill modifies provisions to good time credit for offenders committed to the department of corrections. This bill allows qualifying offenders to receive good credit, credits to be restored, as well as credits from previous years to not be lost for major violations. This bill allows earned time compliance to be obtained through multiple courses and classes, decreasing one's supervision term differently through each completion. Second chances are necessary, while allowing subjects to prove themselves while bettering their lives incarcerated to have a greater chance when their time is finished. Incentives with no consequences from no completion will have a positive impact on those who qualify to receive these credits, as they are completing them on their own terms with no force. Good time credit can reduce the rates of individuals incarcerated for lower-level crimes, saving time and money. Longer time incarcerated for low-level crimes will just take up room within our jails and more money spent. Allowing these alternatives to lower incarceration time is a great way to not only save high amounts of dollars, but also improve public safety outcomes. Offenders are unlikely to offend again, as well as more time can be spent to focus on larger crimes. Empower Missouri acknowledges that policy changes can be one way we can lessen the impact of explicit bias, or biases which individuals hold that they may not have awareness of. In this bill, creating modifications for more ways to receive good time credit to lower one's sentence will allow individuals to learn from their mistakes and lower the chance of reoffending, save money, and create a better life for low-level crime offenders. Members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide informational testimony regarding House Bill 728, which seeks to reform Missouri's good time credit system for incarcerated individuals. My name is Kenya Brumfield-Young, and I am an Assistant Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Saint Louis University, However, my testimony today reflects my independent research and professional expertise and does not represent the attitudes or opinions of Saint Louis University, its Board of Trustees, or any affiliated entity. Research consistently demonstrates that earned credit programs that incentivize positive behavior and rehabilitation enhance public safety by reducing recidivism. The Bureau of Justice Statistics reports that individuals who participate in education. vocational, and rehabilitative programs while incarcerated are 43 percent less likely to reoffend within three years of release. By allowing incarcerated individuals to earn good time credit for completing rehabilitative programs, HB 728 provides a structured incentive for positive institutional behavior, reducing violence within correctional facilities. A study published by the Urban Institute found that states implementing similar credit-based systems experienced a 20 to 30 percent decrease in institutional misconduct, creating safer conditions for correctional staff and inmates. Furthermore, states that have expanded good time credit policies such as Texas and Ohio have observed lower recidivism rates, demonstrating that structured release incentives support successful reintegration into society. HB 728 also presents significant cost-saving opportunities for the state of Missouri. The Missouri Department of Corrections currently spends approximately twenty five thousand dollars per incarcerated person annually. By allowing eligible individuals to earn sentence reductions through rehabilitative efforts, Missouri stands to save millions in taxpayer dollars. If just ten percent of Missouri's incarcerated population, roughly twenty five hundred individuals, earns an average ninety day sentence reduction, the state could save approximately fifteen to twenty million dollars annually in incarceration costs. States such as South Carolina and Kentucky, which have implemented similar measures, have reported thirty to forty million dollars in annual savings while maintaining public safety and reducing prison populations. In addition to direct incarceration costs, reducing recidivism rates through education and rehabilitation lowers future criminal justice expenses related to re arrest, prosecution, and reincarceration. The Rand Corporation estimates that for every one dollar invested in prison education and rehabilitation, taxpavers save four to five dollars in future criminal justice costs. HB 728 is a fiscally responsible, evidence based approach that enhances public safety, reduces institutional violence, and provides substantial economic benefits to the state of Missouri. By incentivizing incarcerated individuals to engage in education, vocational training, and rehabilitation programs, Missouri can cut costs, improve reentry outcomes, and foster safer communities. I appreciate your time and consideration and would be happy to provide additional research or insights as needed. Thank you.
