I support this bill for several reasons. One being I was incarcerated in both Vandalia and Chillicothe from March 2008 to April 2012. While there, I saw how there was no oversight. Chilicothes Major Anders, who needed supervision, told all staff how to pat us down. He specifically told all male staff members to put their hands on the insides of our knees with thumbs up and move their hands up until their thumbs touched our privates, and then they were to graze our private parts to verify we weren't stealing. They were also to make sure they grazed our nipples when searching our top halves. This style of pat-down is illegal. And grazing the body wasn't the only style; some officers jammed their thumbs up into our privates to make us jump. That's just one of many instances of how the guards are let loose to be in charge of people who, even though they are "state property," still have human rights. The Parole board has absolutely no one looking at them and that leaves them to decide everything on a case by case basis. 2 women with the same crime and history can get two different answers for example they could both get a set back but only one could see the board in 2 years where the other might have to wait 4. They make up the rules as they see fit. My second reason for supporting this bill is for friends in all facilities, especially the men's. In JCCC, the Parole Board has gone beyond making up their own rules they are misusing the legal language to serve their purpose. The purpose is most likely is keep all the federal funding coming in for Class A felonies. I know how the system works since I have been in the system, and I was trained to be a Probation and Parole officer before I went to prison. If there is no one to keep things equal on every level of a prison, so people's rights aren't taken away by all the different levels then how do any of these people considered "state property" have any rights as humans? We need someone who acknowledges that the state has control over human Beinging, NOT Slaves. I am always willing to speak to anyone about my experience while I was incarcerated. I have been a part of several advocacy groups. I have also been to Jeff city to do Lobby Day and spoke with over 50 members of the house and senate and would love to meet and talk with everyone again. I am always available.

During that time he was beaten mercilessly. Staff said inmates beat him. Inmates said staff beat him. His Mother worked for several years to get her invalid son home so that she could nurse him back to health. After being released his Mother was able to nurse him for a few years. She died the year after he did.In 2024 I sat in on Zoom calls and heard Mother after Mother crying because her son had been beaten to Death. It's still happening!!!I have personally been in a facility where 3 women died in December, right before Christmas. And this was in a medical facility. Families fight for years to get their loved one home so that they can care for them. It would save families heartache and save the taxpayers millions of dollars!It's almost summer. 50% of Missouri's prisons still don't have air conditioning. Can you imagine what it is like to be in a small concrete cell with other people and the temperature is over 100 degrees. It's INHUMANE. IT IS UNGODLY!!!STUDY THE NORWEGIAN PRISON SYSTEMS! THEY STUDIED OURS, FOUND THEY DIDN'T WORK AND THEY CHANGED THEIR SYSTEMS!!! THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA IS BETTER THAN THE DANGEROUSLY DRACONIAN SYSTEMS WE INSIST ON PERPETUATING!!!

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As a mother of a first time offender it has been an eye opening experience dealing with doc. Information is not as accessible as they claim it to be and follow through may only happen with persistence on my part and even then it is limited. This could be anything from what is considered acceptable visiting attire to what is eligible to bring in for a food visit depending on who is running the visiting area. Recently my son had a medical emergency that was near fatal. The camp did not make me aware of the seriousness of the situation. I only found out he was not at the facility 6 days after he was taken to the hospital because I was calling about visiting. I am not sure if they would have even told me until he died which his doctor said he was near death. No family should have to go through the agony of the uncertainty I went through for 2 weeks. Once he was discharged from the public hospital to a tcu in doc was I able to get any information which took 5 days and multiple phone calls.

Since its inception. Empower Missouri has prioritized addressing the criminal justice system and its impacts, advocating for stronger Department of Corrections (DOC) oversight and a more effective accountability system.I am testifying on behalf of Empower Missouri to support HB 774 by Rep.Bill Allen, HB 603 by Rep. Bill Lucas, and HB 729 by Rep. Kim Collins. These bills would establish an Office of State Ombudsman within the Department of Corrections. The Office will provide information to those who are incarcerated, monitor prison conditions for the purpose of helping to ensure the adequacy of care received by those who are incarcerated, improve the quality of life experienced by them, and establish a state-wide reporting system to collect data. These bills will also increase transparency and accountability in the Missouri state prison system and help all those impacted by this system. It is important to have external accountability for any institution that is tasked with providing services for the public. The correctional department provides the day-to-day needs of people who are incarcerated however we do not have the accountability foundation. An independent oversight system is necessary to help root out the abuse and overall corruption that occurs within the prison system. Most importantly, it is there to protect the well-being of all those who live and work inside of state prisons. This is a definite need, especially in our state, as Missouri prisons have a long legacy of abuse, harassment, and medical negligence, coupled with a pattern of misinformation regarding deaths in custody. In Missouri, there are well over 23,000 residents living in the 19+ facilities across the state. Severe staffing shortages in recent years have made existing problems more frequent, and the number of in-custody deaths hit a record high in 2024 with 139 deaths total. Othel Moore Jr.'s family made his final cries for help publicly viewable by releasing the footage of his murder, and it was gut-wrenching to watch the overall neglect and actions of the DOC. Many more are experiencing similar conditions, and both residents and workers are at risk of being victimized by failures within the system. The Missouri Department of Corrections has an 830 million dollar budget in 2025. To date, Missouri has paid over \$75 million in lawsuit settlements and verdicts since 2020. These costs are being borne by MO taxpayers and residents. Our research found that the range of settlements varied from hostile work environments, numerous sexual assaults, employee discrimination, and overall poor conditions within the facilities. Both past department employees and formerly incarcerated individuals have sought lawsuits against the state for these reasons. In the fiscal note it states that the general revenue will be over \$500,000. The DOC is already spending more than that with the ongoing lawsuits and monthly

expenses within the facilities. As taxpayers, it is important to know where our tax dollars are being spent. Many Missouri residents and families of both correctional workers and residents are left in the unknown about what occurs within the DOC facilities. In conclusion, having independent oversight will provide the transparency necessary to move forward. Oversight alone will not fix the entrenched issues, but it will provide steps towards creating the accountability system necessary for residents within the facilities, correctional staff, their families, and the community. For these reasons, I encourage the committee to support and vote Yes on HB 774, 603 and 729.

This initiative is crucial to ensure that our state's correctional facilities operate safely and effectively, upholding the principles of accountability and transparency that are fundamental to our justice system.Recent data underscores the urgent need for enhanced oversight within Missouri's prison system. In 2024, preliminary figures indicate that 139 individuals died while in custody—the highest number on record and a continuation of a troubling trend averaging over 10 deaths per month over the past five years. While many of these deaths have been declared due to health reasons, the limited scope of autopsy classification undermines the lack of adequate and timely medical care provided to inmates. With proper oversight, both minor and severe health conditions can be treated in a timely matter and prevent unnecessary fatalities. ?Moreover, the rise in drug-related incidents within correctional facilities is alarming. Reports indicate that drug overdoses, particularly involving fentanyl, have become an increasing cause of death among inmates. For example, in 2023, eight fentanyl overdose deaths occurred at the South Central Correctional Center in Licking, Missouri. This highlights significant issues related to contraband control and the need for comprehensive strategies to address substance abuse within prisons. ?The financial implications of inadequate oversight are also substantial. Since 2020, Missouri has expended approximately \$70 million in settlements across 139 lawsuits related to the Department of Corrections. Notably, this includes a \$100 million settlement for correctional officers' unpaid work time claims. Such expenditures underscore the potential cost savings that proactive oversight and early intervention could achieve by addressing systemic issues before they escalate into costly legal battles. ?Establishing the Office of the Department of Corrections Ombudsman will provide an independent body dedicated to monitoring, regulating, and evaluating our correctional facilities. This office will be instrumental in ensuring that prisons adhere to legal and ethical standards, improve treatment and living conditions for one of our most vulnerable populations, investigate staff conduct, and oversee budgetary operations. By supporting House Bill 729, we take a significant step toward fostering a correctional system that embodies empathy, integrity, and fiscal responsibility. One of us was able to be present at the hearing and engaged in a conversation with one of the parole board members who told her that no letters regarding the inmate had been distributed. I'd like to think that this – a relatively minor travesty in this prisoner's experience in our state's correctional facilities – is one of many atrocities that a team of ombudsmen could address or – much better – prevent.

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Thank you to Chair Mayhew, Vice Chair Cook, Ranking Minority Member Collins, and members of the Committee for considering this written statement in support of HB 774 by Rep. Bill Allen (R-17), HB 603 by Rep. Bill Lucas (R-115), and HB 729 by Rep. Kim Collins (D-77). FAMM is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that advocates sentencing and prison policies that are individualized, fair, protect public safety, and preserve families. The Conservative Political Action Committee (CPAC), the Christian Coalition, current and former correctional officers, FAMM, and many others support this policy. It would increase transparency and accountability in the Missouri state prison system by establishing an independent corrections ombudsperson's office and a corrections oversight committee with power to receive and investigate complaints, inspect prisons, and recommend improvements. This legislation will benefit Missouri correctional staff, incarcerated people, and families of both. The Missouri Department of Corrections (MDOC) is a very large agency with an \$830 million dollar 2025 budget. By their nature, prisons are closed environments. It is difficult for the taxpaying public, let alone impacted families, to understand what happens behind the walls. Yet MDOC employs over 10,000 people. incarcerates 23,000, and affects an untold number through the ripple impact on the families of those who live and work in its 19+ facilities. FAMM routinely gets reports of violence, abuse, neglect, understaffing, and lack of programming from correctional staff and incarcerated people. These reports cut through racial and geographic lines and emanate from the whole state. In fact, Missouri has paid over \$66 million in lawsuit settlements and verdicts in the last four years alone, according to a study by Empower Missouri . Families and taxpayers deserve transparency and accountability from this huge agency. This legislation is a way for the legislature and public to say "show me." Missouri has a good roadmap for oversight legislation. In response to dire conditions in the federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP), United States Congress passed the Federal Prison Oversight Act by 392-2 in the House of Representatives and by unanimous consent in the Senate. It became law in 2024. The bill was sponsored by Sen. Jon Ossoff and Rep. Lucy McBath with co-sponsors Sen. Mike Braun (R-Indiana) and Rep. Kelly Armstrong (R - North Dakota At Large). Every member of the Missouri Congressional Delegation voted for this oversight law. It was supported by correctional staff, the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), Faith and Freedom Coalition, the National District Attorneys Association, and more. The Federal Prison Oversight Act contained two main provisions. First, it allows an independent Inspector General to conduct comprehensive, risk-based inspections of facilities. Second, it allows targeted investigations by the ombudsperson. These features are contained in this legislation. Americans understand the value of increased transparency and accountability in prisons. In a national poll, 82 percent of Americans agreed that every prison system should have independent oversight. Oversight can prevent expensive lawsuits and settlements paid for by

taxpayers. It would also help lawmakers assess MDOC's budget and other needs more accurately. An independent ombudsperson could provide intelligence for the legislature, presenting unbiased, reliable, and accurate reports on the state of facilities and repairs, staffing needs, programming and food shortages, security risks, and dangerous conditions for staff and incarcerated people. This information could inform and guide lawmaker choices about how to improve MDOC and ensure that it operates on a sound and sensible budget. Lawmakers need this steady feedback and insight to appropriately fund a large agency that is often opaque, in part because it is spread all over the state through thousands of employees. Independent oversight benefits everyone it touches. Corrections staff deserve a safe, healthy work environment and need a place to go with complaints that, for whatever reason, are squashed, unanswered, or ignored by the administration. Incarcerated people have a constitutional right to a safe, healthy, humane prison environment and need a place to go when the prison grievance process breaks down or they have no safe place to turn to for help. Families of incarcerated people need someone to call when they cannot get help for their loved one despite following all the rules. Oversight encourages increased professionalism at every level of an agency and has proven successful in several states, e.g. Indiana and Nebraska. FAMM is happy to provide technical assistance and facilitate connections to ombudspeople in other states. In seven of the previous eight years, more than 100 individuals have died in the custody of the Missouri DOC. This is in spite of the fact that Missouri prisons hold one third less people today than they did a decade or more ago. The reason why in-custody deaths have increased so drastically is because there has not been any type of independent oversight, investigations, or accountability focused on the myriad issues inside of these prisons, so the problems have festered and over time become more dire. In 2024, 139 individuals lost their lives while in custody of the MoDOC. There has been only one case where criminal charges have been brought - that of Mr. Othel Moore Jr who was killed by staff on Dec. 8, 2023 at the JCCC facility. Any institution that wields power over others should not be able to investigate itself and hold itself above accountability. Mr. Moore's case is not the only one that deserves consequences. The more than 100 in-custody deaths per year need to be investigated. Although people are incarcerated, that does not mean they lose their humanity and that should not mean they lose their lives. I support these bills because oversight of the MoDOC is needed and necessary.

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On behalf of Unify.US, I am writing in support of the three prison oversight bills currently before the Corrections and Public Institutions Committee (HB 603, HB 729, and HB 774), all of which would establish an "Office of the Department of Corrections Ombudsman" and include provisions relating to oversight of the Missouri Department of Corrections. Unify.US is a new addition to the public policy community and is engaged in work across the country to strengthen our economy, our families, and our communities. A merger of economic and faith driven conservatives, we were formed by former principals of the American Conservative Union (better known as "CPAC") and the Faith & Freedom Coalition. The founders of Unify.US have more than 50 years of collective experience as grass roots activists and a significant record on criminal justice policy. Unify.US' President, Timothy Head, was one of the key staffers in the Texas legislature that developed the Justice Reinvestment Initiative, a policy framework that changed the way conservatives have dealt with crime, punishment, and incarceration in 33 states across the country. Our Chief Operating Officer, David Safavian, was formerly the long-time general counsel and executive vice president at CPAC. He served in the George W. Bush White House and as a chief of staff for a Republican Member of Congress from Utah who was senior on the House Judiciary Committee.For the past ten years I was Director of Legislative Affairs for the Faith & Freedom Coalition where I worked with the first Trump Administration to craft and pass the First Step Act to reduce criminal recidivism and promote public safety. Prior to that I spent three years as Special Assistant to the U.S. Deputy Attorney General where I managed drafting and implementation of regulatory reforms and pilot grant programs and served on the Attorney General's Prisoner Reentry Working Group, the President's Prisoner Reentry Initiative Group, and the Strategic Management Council's Subcommittee on Violent Crime and Gangs. Given our backgrounds, we want to recommend passage of HB 603, HB 729 and/or HB774 because any of these bills would provide greater oversight and accountability in the state's prison system. Last year, we worked at the federal level on similar legislation covering the U.S. Bureau of Prisons that passed with overwhelming bipartisan support (including every member of the Missouri Congressional delegation) and became federal law last July. We believe legislation of this type is important for three reasons. First, greater transparency and oversight would, in our opinion, improve safety for both prisoners and Missouri Department of Corrections (MODOC) staff. In this regard, the challenge before you and your fellow policymakers is significant. Our organizations fully appreciate that there is no "silver bullet" for improving the dangerous climate in which these individuals are housed or work. But we believe this approach is a step in the right direction and will also help with the retention of correctional officers who are under enormous pressure and prone to attrition at high rates. Second, as safety increases in a prison, the MODOC is better positioned to advance pro-social, rehabilitative programming for those inmates open

to amending their lives. It also makes it easier to utilize volunteer and community resources to advance these goals. All of this is directed toward improving public safety in the long run by reducing the recidivism rate of inmates returning to our communities. We are not naïve enough to believe that you can eliminate recidivism altogether, but even small decreases can have an outsized impact on public safety. Third, taking steps to improve transparency and accountability is the best way to prevent the federal courts from stepping in and mandating actions that may end up being harmful. A smart approach now will help Missouri avoid what happened in California where a federal judge ordered a mass release of prisoners to address that system's overcrowding and violence. Preemptively adopting a prison oversight bill is a responsible mechanism to help prevent that type of intervention and release in the future. This balanced approach is designed to provide much-needed oversight and accountability that will help improve conditions for incarcerated individuals and staff alike and position the MODOC to better advance rehabilitation and public safety in the face of federal intervention. We also believe the office of corrections ombudsman would be a great help to the Committee in its oversight role. We urge you to favorably report HB603, HB 729 and/or HB 774. We believe Missouri will benefit from taking this proactive and proven step. 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Chairperson and members of the committee. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of House Bill 729, which would establish the Office of the Department of Corrections Ombudsman and create a Corrections Oversight Committee. I offer this testimony as a scholar and practitioner in criminal justice who has studied the systemic issues present in correctional environments and the documented benefits of independent oversight. National data clearly demonstrate the need for independent oversight in correctional facilities. According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, in 2021 alone, nearly 58,000 formal grievances were filed by incarcerated individuals in state and federal prisons. Research by the Vera Institute of Justice shows that incarcerated individuals often hesitate to report abuse or violations through internal channels due to fear of retaliation or lack of follow-through. Independent ombudsman offices have been shown to increase trust, decrease violence, and improve institutional transparency. A 2020 report by the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights found that facilities with independent oversight bodies were more likely to correct rights violations, improve conditions, and demonstrate reductions in excessive use-of-force incidents. In particular, jurisdictions that implemented ombudsman offices saw a measurable decrease in litigation costs and grievances, resulting in financial savings and more efficient resolution of internal issues. Within Missouri, reports by the Department of Corrections and independent watchdogs like the ACLU of Missouri have highlighted chronic concerns regarding medical neglect, use of solitary confinement, sexual misconduct by staff, and barriers to family contact. In 2020, the Department paid over 7 million dollars to settle claims related to workplace harassment, retaliation, and abuse. A portion of these claims stemmed from issues raised by incarcerated individuals or whistleblowing staff. These concerns are not limited to isolated cases. In 2018, Missouri was ranked eighth highest in the nation for prison suicide rates. This raises serious questions about mental health care access, monitoring practices, and facility conditions. Oversight mechanisms like those proposed in HB 729 would create an infrastructure to detect and respond to such systemic issues before they escalate into crises. The benefits of ombudsman offices are well documented. The Washington State Office of the Corrections Ombuds, established in 2018, has reviewed over 4,000 constituent complaints and resolved hundreds of complex cases without the need for litigation. Annual reporting has led to procedural reforms related to health care, visitation, and grievance handling, Empirical studies published in peer-reviewed journals such as the Journal of Offender Rehabilitation show that transparency and accountability mechanisms. especially those involving external review, are associated with higher staff morale, reduced inmate misconduct, and lower turnover among correctional officers. These improvements are especially relevant for Missouri, which has experienced chronic staffing shortages in its correctional facilities.HB 729 provides a cost-effective and evidence-based solution to persistent oversight gaps in Missouri's correctional system. It establishes a framework for independent monitoring, facilitates data collection and public reporting, and empowers stakeholders to file complaints without fear of retaliation.By

increasing transparency and accountability, the state protects the rights and dignity of incarcerated individuals while also reducing long-term costs, litigation risk, and public distrust. I urge the committee to advance HB 729 and strengthen the integrity of correctional oversight in Missouri. Thank you for your time and your commitment to justice.
