**FISCAL ANALYSIS****ASSUMPTION****§1.355 - Daylight Saving Time**

Officials from the **Office of Administration** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.

**Oversight** notes that the above-mentioned agency has stated the proposal will not have a direct fiscal impact on their organization. Oversight does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact on the fiscal note.

**Oversight** notes, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL):

“In the last seven years, 19 states have enacted legislation to provide for year-round daylight-saving time, if Congress were to allow such a change, and in some cases, if surrounding states enact the same legislation. Because federal law does not currently allow full-time DST, Congress would have to act before states could adopt changes.

The 19 states are:

- Texas (2025)
- Oklahoma (2024)
- Colorado and Kentucky (resolution) (2022)
- Alabama, Georgia, Minnesota, Mississippi, and Montana (2021)
- Idaho, Louisiana, South Carolina, Utah, and Wyoming (2020)
- Delaware, Maine, Oregon, Tennessee, and Washington (2019)
- Florida (2018)

Resolutions passed by a single chamber in Kentucky (2022) and Ohio (2020) in prior years have been removed from the NCSL count.”
