House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 1883, Page 12, Section 144.030, Lines 401-407, by deleting all of said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(b) Are used to produce, collect and transmit electricity for resale or retail; and

(47) All sales of used tangible personal property purchased by a consumer for use or consumption, and not for resale, for valuable consideration directly from a seller at an auction of used tangible personal property or from another consumer. For the purposes of this section, "used tangible personal property" is any tangible personal property that is sold a second time at an auction or any number of additional subsequent times after the initial point of sale at an auction, upon which a sales tax is levied. The term "used tangible personal property" shall not include motor vehicles, trailers, boats, or outboard motors purchased or acquired for use on the highways or waters of this state that are required to be titled under the laws of the state of Missouri."; and

Further amend said bill, Page 13, Section 144.615, Lines 21-27, by deleting all of said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"consumption while temporarily within the state; and

(8) Used tangible personal property purchased by a consumer for use or consumption, and not for resale, for valuable consideration directly from a seller at an auction of used tangible personal property or from another consumer. For the purposes of this section, "used tangible personal property" is any tangible personal property that is sold a second time at an auction or any number of additional subsequent times after the initial point of sale at an auction, upon which a sales tax is levied. The term "used tangible personal property" shall not include motor vehicles, trailers, boats, or outboard motors purchased or acquired for use on the highways or waters of this state that are required to be titled under the laws of the state of Missouri."; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.
