", **within ten days of receipt of the notification required under subsection 2 of this section,**"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 7, by deleting the words "**under subsection 2 of this section**"; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 2872, Page 10, Section 167.645, Lines 205-206, by deleting the phrase "**to decoding**" and inserting in lieu thereof the phrase "**as a primary instructional strategy**"; and

Further amend said bill, Page 12, Section 170.014, Line 11, by deleting the phrase "~~read~~ **decode**" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "read"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 17 by deleting the phrase "[~~word reading~~] **decoding**" and inserting in lieu thereof the phrase "word reading"; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

House Amendment No. 2

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 2872, Pages 3-4, Section 161.241, Lines 24-32, by deleting all of the said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"9. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Evidence-based Reading Instruction Program Fund".

(2) The fund shall be administered by the department and used to reimburse school districts and charter schools for efforts to improve student literacy, including, but not limited to:

(a) Initiatives that provide [~~optional~~] training and materials to teachers regarding best practices in reading pedagogies, **structured literacy, and dyslexia-informed practices**;

(b) Resources for parents and guardians to assist them in teaching their children to read;

(c) Funding for reading tutoring programs **inside or** outside of regular school hours;

(d) Stipends for teachers who undergo additional training in reading instruction, which may also count toward professional development requirements; and

(e) Funding for summer reading programs.

(3) The fund shall consist of moneys appropriated"; and

Further amend said bill, Pages 7-8, Section 167.645, Lines 95-113, by deleting all of the said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"[4-] 9. **If a child has a reading deficiency or substantial reading deficiency at the end of grade two, the student's parent or guardian shall meet with designated school staff to discuss the student's deficiency and shall sign documentation stating that the parent or guardian has been informed of the following:**

(1) **If the child has a substantial reading deficiency that is not corrected by the end of grade three, the child shall not be promoted to grade four unless the child qualifies for a good cause exemption under subsection 11 of this section;**

(2) **The child will be provided with intensive instructional services and support listed under subsection 14 of this section; and**

(3) **The parent or guardian shall agree to participation in parent training workshops or regular parent-guided home reading activities, or both, that are aligned to scientifically-based reading research;**

(4) **A parent or guardian's refusal to meet, sign or agree as required under this subsection shall not prevent the student from receiving additional interventions or from being retained by the school district.**

10. (1) **Beginning in the 2027-28 school year and continuing in all subsequent school years, if a student has a substantial reading deficiency at the end of third grade, the student's parent or guardian and appropriate school staff shall discuss whether the student should be retained in grade level, based on a consideration of all relevant factors, including the reading deficiency, the student's progress in other subject areas, and the student's overall intellectual, physical, emotional, and social development.**

(2) **A decision to [~~promote or~~] retain a student with a substantial reading deficiency at the end of grade three shall be made only after direct personal consultation with the student's parent or guardian and after the formulation of a specific plan of action to remedy the student's reading deficiency as determined by the department of elementary and secondary education.**

(3) **Based on such student's performance on the reading screener at the end of the third grade, the student shall be retained in grade three unless:**

- (a) Such student scores "approaching expectations" or higher on a retest opportunity through the Missouri reading screener after successfully completing a state-approved summer reading program; or
 (b) Such student qualifies for a good cause exemption under subsection 11 of this section."; and

Further amend said bill and section, Pages 8-11, by renumbering subsequent subsections accordingly; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill Nos. 2069 & 2208, Page 3, Section 304.923, Line 26, by inserting after all of said line the following:

"3. A natural person who is not physically situated in the driver's seat of a fully autonomous vehicle and who provides real-time operational and tactical function performance data related to the dynamic driving task fallback, including, but not limited to, real-time braking, steering, acceleration, and transmission shifting, shall be physically present in the United States of America and maintain a validly issued driver's license from a state, territory, or possession of the United States of America."; and

Further amend said bill, Page 4, Section 304.928, Line 6, by inserting after all of said line the following:

"3. Any corporation or other business entity subject to the provisions of this section shall be subject to personal jurisdiction of the courts of this state consistent with section 506.500."; and

Further amend said bill and page, Section 304.929, Line 11, by inserting after all of said line the following:

"3. (1) The owner of a fully autonomous vehicle shall be responsible for any civil liability resulting from the acts or omissions of the automated driving system;

(2) When an automated driving system is engaged in the operation of a motor vehicle and performing the dynamic driving task, the automated driving system shall be deemed a driver for purposes of determining compliance with traffic laws and for civil liability arising from the operation of the motor vehicle;

(3) For the purposes of any civil action alleging negligence arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle while an automated driving system was engaged, the automated driving system shall be evaluated under the careful and prudent person standard applicable to drivers of motor vehicles under section 304.012;

(4) The performance of an automated driving system shall be measured on whether the automated driving system operated the vehicle in a manner consistent with a careful and prudent driver under the same or similar circumstances;

(5) Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to confer legal personhood upon an automated driving system. The provisions of this subsection solely establish the standard of care applicable to the operation of the vehicle when the automated driving system is engaged."; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

"reasonable to do so, including, but not limited to, safely negotiating railroad crossings, unless an exemption has been granted by the department of public safety. The department of public safety shall consult with any railroad company operating in this state when considering an exemption under this section that affects the operation of a fully autonomous vehicle at railroad crossings. Any exemption that is granted shall comply with the most recently published edition of the federal highway administration's manual on uniform traffic control devices and any regulations promulgated by the federal motor carrier safety administration;"; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

"304.1020. 1. As used in this section, "hospital zone" means any area upon or around any highway as defined in section 302.010 that is visibly marked by a sign erected by a county or municipality as an area where hospital-related activities are occurring. The term "hospital" shall be as defined in section 190.100.

2. Any county or municipality that elects to establish a hospital zone designation for streets surrounding a hospital may erect signs upon or around the hospital zone that are clearly visible from the highway and clearly identify the boundaries of the hospital zone. Prior to establishing a hospital zone, the county or municipality shall be responsible for determining the boundaries of the zone and shall assume responsibility for all costs associated with establishing the hospital zone. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the maximum speed limit within any designated hospital zone shall be thirty miles per hour.

3. Upon a conviction or a plea of guilty by any person for a moving violation as defined in section 302.010, or any offense listed in section 302.302, the court may double the amount of fine authorized to be imposed by law if the offense occurred within a hospital zone.

4. Upon a conviction or a plea of guilty by any person for a speeding violation under section 304.009 or 304.010, the court may double the amount of fine authorized to be imposed by law if the offense occurred within a hospital zone. However, no person assessed an additional fine under this subsection shall also be assessed an additional fine under subsection 3 of this section.

5. The penalty authorized under subsections 3 and 4 of this section shall be assessed by the court only if the county or municipality has erected signs upon or around a hospital zone that are clearly visible from the highway and state substantially the following message: "Hospital Zone -- Fines Doubled".

6. The provisions of this section shall not be construed to enhance the assessment of court costs or the assessment of points under section 302.302.

304.1023. 1. A person shall be deemed to commit the offense of endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone upon conviction for any of the following when the offense occurs within a hospital zone, as defined in section 304.1020:

2. Upon conviction or a plea of guilty for committing the offense of endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone under subsection 1 of this section, if no injury or death to a pedestrian resulted from the offense, the person shall be subject to a fine of not more than five hundred dollars and shall have four points assessed to his or her driver's license under section 302.302 in addition to any other penalty authorized by law.

3. A person shall be deemed to commit the offense of aggravated endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone upon conviction or a plea of guilty for any offense under subsection 1 of this section when such offense occurs in a hospital zone as defined in section 304.1020 and results in the injury or death of a pedestrian. Upon conviction or a plea of guilty for committing the offense of aggravated endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone, in addition to any other penalty authorized by law, the person shall be subject to a fine of not more than five thousand dollars if the offense resulted in an injury to a pedestrian and ten thousand dollars if the offense resulted in death of a pedestrian. In addition, such person shall have twelve points assessed to their driver's license under section 302.302 and shall be subject to the provisions of section 302.304 regarding the revocation of the person's license and driving privileges.

4. No person shall be cited or convicted for endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone or aggravated endangerment of a pedestrian in a hospital zone for any act or omission otherwise constituting an offense under subsection 1 of this section if such act or omission resulted in whole or in part from mechanical failure of the person's vehicle or from the negligence of the pedestrian.

5. (1) Notwithstanding any provision of this section or any other law to the contrary, the director of the department of revenue or his or her agent shall order the revocation of a driver's license upon the director's determination that an individual holding such license was involved in a physical accident where his or her negligent acts or omissions contributed to his or her vehicle striking a pedestrian within a designated hospital zone where notice and signage were properly implemented. The department shall make its determination of these facts on the basis of the report of a law enforcement officer investigating the incident and this determination shall be final unless a hearing is requested and held as provided under subdivision (2) of this subsection. Upon its determination that the facts support a license revocation, the department shall issue a notice of revocation, which shall be mailed to the person at the last known address shown on the department's records. The notice is deemed received three days after mailing unless returned by postal authorities. The notice of revocation shall clearly specify the reason and statutory grounds for the revocation, the effective date of the revocation, which shall be at least fifteen days from the date the department issued its order, the right of the person to request a hearing, and the date by which the request for a hearing must be made.

(2) An individual who received notice of revocation from the department under this section may seek reinstatement by either:

(a) Taking and passing the written and driving portions of the driver's license examination, in which case the individual's driver's license shall be immediately reinstated; or

(b) Petitioning for a hearing before a circuit division or associate division of the court in the county in which the hospital zone accident occurred. The individual may request such court to issue an order staying the revocation until such time as the petition for review can be heard. If the court, in its discretion, grants such stay, it shall enter the order upon a form prescribed by the director of revenue and shall send a copy of such order to the director. Such order shall serve as proof of the privilege to operate a motor vehicle in this state, and the director shall maintain possession of the person's license to operate a motor vehicle until the termination of any suspension under this subsection. The clerk of the court shall notify the prosecuting attorney of the county, and the prosecutor shall appear at the hearing on behalf of the director of revenue. At the hearing, the court shall determine only:

a. Whether the person was involved in a physical accident where his or her vehicle struck a pedestrian within a designated hospital zone;

b. Whether guidelines involving notice and signage were properly implemented in such hospital zone; and

c. Whether the investigating officer had probable cause to believe the person's negligent acts or omissions contributed to his or her vehicle striking a pedestrian.

If the court determines subparagraph a., b., or c. of this paragraph not to be in the affirmative, the court shall order the director to reinstate the license or permit to drive.

(3) The department of revenue administrative adjudication to reinstate a driver's license that was revoked under this subsection, and any evidence provided to the department related to such adjudication, shall not be produced by subpoena or any other means and made available as evidence in any other administrative action, civil case, or criminal prosecution. The court's determinations issued under this section, and the evidence provided to the court relating to such determinations, shall not be produced by subpoena or any other means and made available in any other administrative action, civil case, or criminal prosecution. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to prevent the department from providing information to the system authorized under 49 U.S.C. Section 31309, or any successor federal law, pertaining to the licensure, identification, and disqualification of operators of commercial motor vehicles."; and
