House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill Nos. 2120 & 1698, Pages 1-2, Section 160.775, Lines 18-23, by deleting all of the said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"telephone, or other wireless communication device, computer, or pager."; and

Further amend said bill and section, Page 2, Line 32, by deleting all of the said line and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(1) A statement prohibiting **and condemning all acts of bullying, violent behavior, and school violence**, defined no less inclusively than in subsection 2"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Lines 46-49, by deleting all of the said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(3) **A statement relating to pupils who engage in self-defense that the school**"; and

Further amend said bill and section, Page 3, by renumbering subsequent subdivisions accordingly; and

Further amend said bill and section, Pages 4-5, Lines 124-134, by deleting all of the said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"7. (1) On a monthly basis, the administration of each school district and charter school shall report to the school board or governing board all acts of bullying, acts of school violence or violent behavior, and crimes that occurred. Such report shall include the results of all bullying investigations and any responses including, but not limited to, a description of any interventions, initiatives, techniques, or discipline provided to all individuals involved in the incident.

(2) The school district or charter school may develop a standardized form to use for such written report and such report shall be formatted to clearly describe each such incident. However, student

information contained in the report shall be made available upon request for review by the board, only for such reasons specified in policy, and in compliance with state and federal student confidentiality laws.

(3) For any month in which there are fifty incidents or more a summary sheet may accompany the report that includes aggregate data, patterns and trends, along with administration recommendations.

(4) The school board or governing board shall review such monthly report in a closed meeting under chapter 610.

(5) Board concerns about any discrepancies, patterns or trends, or other data reported in such report shall be addressed within a timeline established by board policy. Such timeline shall not exceed thirty days of the initial board review, and the board, in conjunction with the school administration, shall attempt to address and resolve substantiated concerns relating to incident discrepancies, patterns or trends, or other board concerns from data listed on such report or report summary."; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

Constitutional Objection to SS#3 SB 888

Pursuant to Article III, Sections 21 and 23 of the Missouri Constitution, I hereby submit this formal constitutional objection to **Senate Substitute No. 3 for Senate Bill No. 888**.

Article III, Section 21 provides that no bill shall be so amended during its passage through either house as to change its original purpose. When introduced, SS#3 SB 888 carried the title “relating to the juvenile justice system.” During the legislative process, the title was amended to read “relating to the criminal justice system, with penalty provisions and an effective date for certain sections.” This amendment substantially broadens the scope of the bill beyond its original purpose. The juvenile justice system is a specific subset of criminal law, while the criminal justice system broadly encompasses adult sentencing law, parole eligibility, felony classifications, and other criminal penalties. By expanding the title from a narrow subject to a broad one, the legislation permitted the addition of provisions that extend far beyond the original purpose of the bill. Such an expansion conflicts with the constitutional requirement that a bill’s purpose not be changed during the legislative process.

Article III, Section 23 requires that every bill contain only one subject clearly expressed in its title. SS#3 SB 888 includes numerous provisions including fingerprinting of juveniles, certification of a juvenile as an adult, juvenile detention, juvenile court proceedings, long-term program treatment, prison terms, dangerous felonies definition, conditional release terms, jail time credit, and other provisions relating to criminal offenses. These provisions regulate separate components of the criminal justice system and are not naturally or necessarily connected to a single subject. Combining these separate policy areas into one bill is legislative logrolling and violates the single-subject requirement intended to ensure transparency and accountability in the legislative process.

For these reasons, SS#3 SB 888 raises serious constitutional concerns under the Missouri Constitution. This bill clearly violates both the original purpose requirement of Article III, Section 21 and the single-subject rule of Article III, Section 23.

Accordingly, I submit this formal constitutional objection for inclusion in the House Journal.

House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 2748, Page 1, Section 167.720, Lines 2-5, by deleting all of said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(1) "Bilateral coordination", the coordinated use of both sides of the human body, including, but not limited to, crossing the mid-line, and symmetrical, asymmetrical, reciprocal, and sequential movements;

(2) "Bone-strengthening activity", physical activity that is primarily designed to increase the strength of specific sites in bones that make up the skeletal system. Bone-strengthening activity produces an impact or tension force on the bones that promotes bone growth and strength;

(3) "Moderate physical activity", low- to medium-impact physical exertion designed to increase an individual's heart rate to rise to at least seventy-five percent of his or her maximum heart rate. Activities in this category may include, but are not limited to, running, calisthenics, aerobic exercise, etc.;

(4) "Muscle-strengthening activity", physical activity and exercise that increases skeletal muscle strength, power, endurance, and mass;"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section by renumbering all subsequent subdivisions accordingly; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 14, by deleting the numbers "2026-27" and inserting in lieu thereof the numbers "2027-28"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 16, by deleting all of said line and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"participate in **supervised** ~~moderate~~ physical activity for the"; and

Further amend said bill and section, Page 2, Line 20, by deleting the word "thirty" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "~~thirty~~ **forty**"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 23, by inserting after the word "**minutes.**" the following:

"Such physical activity shall include muscle-strengthening and bone-strengthening activity for no less than an average of eighty minutes per school week for each activity. Such physical activity shall include bilateral coordination, which prioritizes core, balance, and mobility, to the greatest extent possible and shall be conducted on no less than a weekly basis."; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 28, by inserting after the word "**minutes.**" the following:

"Such physical activity shall include muscle-strengthening and bone-strengthening activity for no less than an average of one hundred twenty minutes per school week for each activity. Such physical activity shall include bilateral coordination, which prioritizes core, balance, and mobility, to the greatest extent possible and shall be conducted on no less than a weekly basis."; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Line 29, by deleting all of said line and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"(d) Students with disabilities shall participate in ~~moderate~~ physical activity as prescribed in this subdivision to the"; and

Further amend said bill, page, and section, Lines 43-49, by deleting all of said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"3. For the purpose of determining whether a student has satisfactorily completed a full course of study each academic year, a school district may elect to designate the time required for physical activity per day, as prescribed in paragraphs (b) and (c) of subdivision (1) of subsection 2 of this section, not to exceed ten

minutes per day for any one course, subject, or class, toward the completion of the student's school term, as that term is defined in section 160.011.

4. Each school district and charter school governing board shall adopt a written policy for daily physical activity of students. Such policy shall, at a minimum, include the requirements in subdivision (1) of subsection 2 of this section."; and

Further amend said bill, Pages 2-3, Section B, Lines 1-5, by deleting all of the said section and lines; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.

Representative Peters offered **House Amendment No. 1**.

House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill Nos. 2035 & 2350, Page 1, Section A, Line 3, by inserting after all of said section and line the following:

- "407.3007. 1. As used in this section, the following terms mean:
- (1) "Artificial intelligence" or "AI":
 - (a) Any artificial system that performs tasks under varying and unpredictable circumstances without significant human oversight or that can learn from experience and improve performance when exposed to data sets;
 - (b) An artificial system developed in computer software, physical hardware, or other computer systems that solves tasks requiring human-like perception, cognition, planning, learning, communication, or physical action;
 - (c) An artificial system designed to think or act like a human, including cognitive architectures and neural networks;
 - (d) A set of techniques, including machine learning, that is designed to approximate a cognitive task;
 - or
 - (e) An artificial system designed to act rationally, including an intelligent software agent or embodied robot that achieves goals using perception, planning, reasoning, learning, communicating, decision-making, and acting;
- (2) "Mental health professional", the same as defined in section 632.005. The term "mental health professional" shall also include any person licensed in a profession regulated under chapter 337.
2. Any person or entity that develops or deploys artificial intelligence in the state shall not advertise or represent to the public that the AI is or is able to act as a mental health professional or is capable of providing therapy services, psychotherapy services, or a mental health diagnosis.
3. Any violation of this section shall be considered an unlawful practice under the Missouri merchandising practices act under this chapter.
4. The attorney general shall enforce the provisions of this section. Any individual may report violations of this section to the attorney general. If the attorney general finds that a violation occurred, the attorney general shall commence a civil action in a court of competent jurisdiction. If the court finds that a violation occurred, the court may grant damages, civil penalties, injunctive relief, attorney's fees, and any such other relief the court finds appropriate. Notwithstanding section 407.100 to the contrary, civil penalties shall be as follows:
- (1) Ten thousand dollars for the first violation; or
 - (2) Twenty thousand dollars for any subsequent violation."; and

House Amendment No. 1

AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill Nos. 3231 & 2531, Page 47, Section 620.6030, Lines 1-2, by deleting said lines and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"620.6030. 1. This section and section 620.6033 establishes an angel investment incentive."; and

Further amend said bill and section, Page 48, Line 53, by inserting after all of said line the following:

"(9) "Rural county", any county in the state of Missouri with fewer than one hundred thousand inhabitants, and such term shall be deemed to include both the farm and nonfarm population thereof. The number of inhabitants specified in this subdivision shall be increased by six percent every ten years after each decennial census beginning in 2030;"; and

Further amend said bill, section, and page, Lines 54-55, by renumbering subsequent subdivisions accordingly; and

Further amend said bill, section, and page, Line 60, by deleting the word **"fifty"** and inserting in lieu thereof the word **"forty"**; and

Further amend said bill, section, and page, Line 62, by inserting after the word **"zone"** the following:

"and the credit shall be in a total amount equal to sixty percent where the investor's cash investment is in the qualified securities of a qualified Missouri business that are headquartered outside of such districts in rural counties."; and

Further amend said bill and section, Page 49, Line 93, by inserting after the word **"zone."** the following:

"During this timeframe, twenty percent shall be reserved for investments in qualified Missouri businesses located within innovation districts and twenty percent shall be reserved for investments in qualified Missouri businesses located outside of such districts, of which not less than ten percent of the total tax credits authorized under this subsection shall be issued to qualified Missouri businesses that are headquartered outside of such districts in rural counties."; and

Further amend said bill, section, and page, Line 101, by inserting after the word **"zone."** the following:

"(6) Notwithstanding any provisions of sections 620.6000 to 620.6033 or any other law to the contrary, the tax credits under this subsection for qualified investments made in qualified Missouri businesses located outside of the innovation districts shall expire on August 28, 2032."; and

Further amend said bill by amending the title, enacting clause, and intersectional references accordingly.
